DUST AIDS AUTO THIEVES ESCAPE
Klamath Falls, May 28.—(AP)—City police recovered a stolen car last night after a bullet-studded chase along a country highway but the joy-riding thieves had escaped before the officers caught up with their quarry.

The police caught the car running a stop sign shortly after its theft had been reported by the owner, W. H. Sims. They pursued the machine down the Midland road, firing several shots that struck the tail light and punctured the body but failed to stop the driver.

FAVORS WPA FOR RELIEF PROJECTS
WASHINGTON, May 28.—(AP)—President Roosevelt estimated today the \$503,000,000 earmarked by the house for flood control and projects in the \$1,500,000,000 relief bill would give employment to only 100,000 whereas if expended through WPA 630,000 would be given relief jobs.

He told a press conference that relief and public works should be separated in considering the \$1,500,000,000 bill and forecast many individual projects would be straightened out before the house passes the measure. He said he would be willing to discuss the matter with individual house members if they desire it.

House leaders, trying to reverse a defeat on earlier provisions of the \$1,500,000,000 relief bill, appealed to the president to help bring about a compromise.

NORRIS BEHOLDS POWER BUGABOO
WASHINGTON, May 28.—(AP)—Senator Norris (Ind., Neb.) asserted today "some way must be found" to prevent private utilities from delaying PWA financing of electric power projects by "malicious" injunction suits.

The Nebraska, long a champion of public power development, spoke in the senate after intimates had predicted he would propose legislation soon to restrict injunctions against federal financing of public power plants.

Such injunctions are involved in a case appealed to the supreme court by two power companies which lost in a lower court their contention that certain government grants in Iowa and Alabama should not be allowed.
