'WHITE BOOK' OF SPANISH REGIME SCOURGES ITALY

'Most Scandalous Violation of International Law Is Revealed in Secret Documents of Italian Dictator'

GENEVA, May 28.—(AP)—The Spanish government today accused Italy of the "most scandalous violation" of international principles since the World war in a League of Nations "white book" intended to show the fascist state as a "truly belligerent power" in violation of the league covenant.

The "white book" is a compilation of documents, one of them purporting to be a "secret" and "most urgent" order from the Italian war office to the corps command of the general staff. The documents allegedly were captured from Italian soldiers fighting on the side of the insurgents in Spain.

The "white book," published today, said Italy was guilty of "the most scandalous violation perpetrated on the European continent since the World war of the principles which are the basis of any judicially organized international community."

It added: "By behaving in a manner indicated by the documents produced in the 'white book,' Italy has helped to prolong the war in Spain; has violated article ten of the league covenant and has acted as a truly belligerent power."

The alleged "secret" and "most urgent" Italian war office document produced, with a Rome date of January 6, 1937, states its subject is "volunteers for any destination."

The purported order reads: "In confirmation of telephonic orders. Whole of personnel, officers, non-commissioned officers and troops of royal army and of MVSN (volunteer militia of national security) ready for purpose of OMS (military operations in Spain) should be supplied with badges of ranks and with stars (for royal army) or with licitor's pastes (for the militia)."

"These distinguishing marks should also be kept during the period of concentration in port and embarkation; they should not be taken off until troops have embarked for destination indicated."

A purported divisional order dated March 15, 1937, said: "Tell the men Duce is highly pleased with the work of his blackshirts. Explain to all the enormous losses suffered by the enemy in men, materials, airplanes shot down, towns destroyed by artillery and aviation."

JAPANESE AFTER PUREBRED SHEEP

RETAIL TRADE UP, WARMER WEATHER TO AID BUSINESS

NEW YORK, May 28.—(AP)—Retail trade approached more nearly its usual stride for the season this week, although the new labor strife and other factors operated to keep distribution down. Dun & Bradstreet said today in the weekly review of business.

Leading centers reported an increase in sales from 2 to 5 per cent over the preceding week and for the country as a whole volume was estimated up from 10 to 20 per cent over last year.

Wholesale buying spread to a greater number of branches, the agency said.

"Preparations for trips and outings cover the lengthened week-end combined with warmer weather to push retail sales more briskly upward," the survey stated.

Labor upheavals in both steel and automobile producing districts curtailed retail sales in the middle western states, reducing the increase over 1936 to 12 to 20 percent, the agency said. The margin in the northwest was unchanged from the week before but 15 to 20 per cent better than a year ago.

Percentage gains over the 1936 comparable in other major geographic areas included Pacific coast 15 to 20.

COUNTY PTA PLANS SUMMER ROUNDUP FOR HEALTH EXAMS

As an aid to the successful adjustment of beginning pupils to the change from home to school environment, the Jackson County Parent-Teacher association is completing plans for the fourth annual "summer roundup" of all pre-school children in the county for health examinations.

Examination of adenoids, tonsils, hearing, sight, etc., is carried on by Jackson county health department personnel in co-operation with P. T. A. units. Mrs. R. B. Miller, Medford chairman, points out that authorities declare the first year of school life the most difficult for the child. The many changes in the child's life at that time put a strain on his capacity and his adjustment may be added or hindered by his general physical condition, she said.

"It is our aim," Mrs. Miller said, "that all children entering school be as nearly perfect physically as possible. The roundup is a major health project of the national congress of parents and teachers and includes examination in the spring of all children who will enter school in the fall for the first time; correction of all remedial defects during the summer; and a checkup in the fall."

Examinations will be held in the 25 schools in the county having P. T. A. units, under the direction of Dr. C. I. Drummond, county health physician. Mothers of children entering school next fall are contacted by individual unit chairmen. Following the thorough examination, the physician recommends treatment if necessary and advises a visit to the family doctor and for correction of any defects. Arrangements are made to care for those unable to have private attention.

Examinations for Medford units will be held in the county courthouse, Jackson school scheduled for June 15 and Washington, June 16. Health department personnel will go to outlying districts to conduct tests there. Appointments are desirable, Mrs. Miller stated, and may be secured, along with any further information, by calling the county health department.

"As a result of this project, more children are entering school every year as free as possible from defects and protected against disease," Mrs. Miller said. She declared the roundup has had a definite part in the recent advance of conservation of child health and in making the nation conscious of the need for special attention conscious of the need for special care until all parents grasp its significance," Mrs. Miller believed. "Parents who apply themselves intelligently to the task of guiding and protecting their children during the formative period will be rewarded, for

the early years are most significant in the growth and development of children. It is during pre-school years that the foundations are laid for health of mind and body."

All parents are urged to take advantage of this service. P. T. A. officials state.

Scalloped Sea Food

2 or 2½ cups tuna, crabmeat, lobster or left-over cooked fish
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
1½ cup Borden's Evaporated Milk

2 tablespoons diced green pepper
Buttered bread crumbs
