

MEXICAN MINING TOWN BURIED BY DAM AVALANCHE

MEXICO CITY, May 28.—A hurriedly reinforced army of rescue workers dug through millions of tons of rock-studded mud today in a frantic effort to reach the more than 100 dead estimated to have been buried beneath an avalanche that crashed down on the mining town of Talpujans.

A bursting dam, high in the mountains of the Talpujans Sierra of northwestern Michoacan state, loosed

the 3,000,000-ton mass on the sleeping city shortly before dawn yesterday.

Reports from El Oro, 15 miles away, said the death toll might go as high as 500 when the last of the once golden silt had been cleared from the three square miles it buried.

The dam held back the "tsunamis" left after gold had been washed out in the cyanide metal processing operations of the Dos Estrellas Mining company.

Dispatches to the newspaper El Excelsior said the slide buried or destroyed more than 400 houses in the town which has a population of 10,000. Water backed up behind the mass to increase the damage.

Thirty bodies had been recovered at dawn while Rafael Reyes, secretary to Hoken E. Niberg, general manager of the company, said the dead could be "conservatively estimated at more than 100."

All operations of Dos Estrellas, the second largest mine in Mexico, were halted and nearly 3,000 employees joined Red Cross and labor department detachments from Mexico City in relief work.

They turned great jets of water from pressure hoses and pipes on the silt to tear it away so the buried bodies could be reached.

Three days of pouring rain had weakened the dam which buckled about 3 a. m. yesterday, sending the accumulated mud of years roaring down the bed of a narrow ravine upon the sleeping town, a scant half mile below the workings.

The legend shows that after his rejection of Christ he returns to his home in the city of Jericho only to find that his only son, Azor, a boy of eight and the treasure of his father's heart, had been killed in an accident. Darkness surrounded him until his beautiful young wife, Asenath, suggests that Jesus of Nazareth could help them and she urges her husband, Ben Azel, to go and bring Christ to their home for, having heard that He had raised Lazarus of Bethany to life after he had lain four days in the grave, she believes that He has the power to restore their son to life. Ben Azel, remembering his recent rejection of the Christ, feels that he cannot now call upon the Galilean for assistance. His wife reminds him of the Galilean's willingness to forgive and persuade him to go to Jerusalem in search of Jesus. He goes only to arrive in time to witness the crucifixion. He returns, feeling that all is darkness but, while he is telling Asenath the hopelessness of his journey, a messenger comes bringing the tidings that Christ is risen from the grave. They slowly come to the realization that, as Jesus is risen from the dead, so their son, Azor, too, shall live again.

Captain Durham will play the part of Ben Azel, the rich young ruler; Mrs. Mary Bell takes the part of Asenath, the wife of Ben Azel; Charles McGonigle plays Zachaeus, tax collector of Jericho; Evan Gay plays Nason, steward of Ben Azel; Jaul Wilcox is Blind Bar Timaeus; Mrs. Captain Durham plays the part of Hadassah, daughter of Bar Timaeus; Eldora Roberts and Mrs. Dianus Meyer are handmaids of Asenath; Josephine Roberts plays the part of Azor, eight-year-old son of Ben Azel and Asenath.

Special scenery, lighting and costumes have been designed and made

by members of the local corps. The play is scheduled for 7:45. There will be no admission charge.

AMERICANS DRAW 276 PASTEBOARDS IRISH SWEEPSTAKE

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, May 26.—(AP)—American fortune-seekers held more than half of the lucky tickets whirled from the rolling drum of fortune in the Irish Hospital sweepstakes up to the lunch recess today.

Of 544 tickets on the English derby, the Epsom Downs classic to be run next Wednesday, 276 went to the United States and 28 to Canada.

Tickets on 34 horses in the race were drawn, leaving 44 more—including Oya II, one of the favorites—to come.

Each of the horse ticket holders, whether the horse wins, loses or even fails to start, is assured of \$2350. Owners of tickets on the horse which comes home first stand to win \$150,000; for the second place horse, \$75,000, and for the third place horse, \$50,000.

The first six tickets were from the United States.
