

### 4-H CLUB CORN PROJECT BACKED BY BRANCH BANK

Sixteen 4-H club boys in Jackson county have started work in the last two weeks on a corn improvement project sponsored by the Medford Branch of the United States National Bank of Portland.

Corn is increasing in importance in the county and there is a need for a better quality of earlier maturing seed. It is felt by those connected with 4-H club work that a great deal can be done through the project in selecting and improving Jackson county corn.

In the agreement signed by the bank, the club member, and the club agent, the bank agrees to furnish the club member with enough seed corn to plant one acre. If the boy wants to plant more than that amount, he can secure the seed at cost.

The bank also agrees to encourage the boys in their work, provide suitable facilities for a display of the corn after harvest, and furnish the following awards for the best 25-ear exhibit of corn and completed record book: First—Scholarship to 1938 Summer

School, value \$100.  
Second—\$5.00.  
Third—\$3.00.  
Fourth—\$2.00.  
Fifth, sixth, and seventh—\$1.00 each.

There will also be a \$500 special prize for the highest yielding corn on an acre basis, providing the club member has at least one-half acre.

The 4-H club member agrees to plant and care for at least one half acre of corn, follow recommended practices insofar as it is possible, and complete his project.

The club member may use his own seed if he has it, but if he secures it from the bank, he agrees to return 15 pounds of seed on the ear after harvest. The ears to be selected by the local club leader, the club agent, and the club member.

The county club agent agrees to secure a supply of Early Alberta and Minnesota No. 13 corn for the bank and distribute it to the boys desiring seed. He will also supervise the planting, cultivating, harvesting, and storing of the corn and conduct tours so that every boy enrolled will have an opportunity to visit other contestants' fields.

C. D. Conrad, Jackson County Club Agent, states that this is the first contest of its kind in Jackson county, and that there is a lot of interest being shown for the first year. It is his belief that next year there will be more than twice as many boys entering the contest.

### LABOR RELATIONS BOARD ACTS OHIO STRIKE TURMOIL

YOUNGSTOWN, O., May 28.—(AP)—The national labor relations board took a hand today in the strike which set up picket lines before independent steel mills in six states, took 70,000 workers from their jobs and created growing tension in cities where non-union workmen remained in besieged plants.

Ralph A. Lind, regional labor board director at Cleveland, began an investigation of a complaint filed by steel workers organizing committee charging the Republic Steel Corp. one of three independent concerns involved, with using coercion to "discourage unionization" at Massillon and Canton, O.

Lind will recommend either that the board drop the charges against Republic or file a formal complaint and require the company to answer the alleged violations of the Wagner Act.

The department of labor received daily reports from the strike front, but made no move to bring together SWOC leaders and representatives of the three companies—Republic, Youngstown Sheet & Tube and Inland Steel Corp.

Pickets paced their posts today before mills in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Pennsylvania and New York.

At Warren, O., where a number of men swam a river to reach their jobs at a Republic plant yesterday, John Mayor, sub regional SWOC director, said "the men are getting to the point where they are very reckless."

"There is more tense feeling at Warren than anywhere else," he said, "because there are still a few men in there beside the maintenance crew and our men don't like it."

Jack Saughan, a WPA worker, was shot and wounded at Warren today when a negro fired into a group of pickets, who the negro said, had prevented him from passing the picket line "to go fishing." The negro said he was beaten and cut by the pickets. His shot missed all pickets.

### SUICIDE BLAMES ESTRANGED WIFE FOR MURDER TRY

OREGON CITY, May 28.—(AP)—Sergeant E. C. Snow of the state police said George Huey, about 50, Evergreen, died early today from gunshot wounds which he inflicted himself after attempting to shoot his son-in-law, Ray Hartley, Milwaukee.

Snow said Huey, estranged from his wife, went to the Hartley home, drew a pistol and pushed it in Hartley's ribs. They grappled, Hartley turning the revolver aside as the gun was fired, the bullet barely missing him.

Hartley turned off the lights, Snow said, and soon heard a shot, finding Huey lying on the front porch with a bullet wound in his head.

Deputy Coroner Arnold Bierman said he found a note in Huey's pocket blaming his wife for his troubles.

Snow said the note also said that Huey went to the home to kill Hartley and commit suicide.


