CONVERSION PLAN FOR BUILDING AND LOAN IS APPROVED

The plan of conversion of the Jackson County Building and Loan association into a Federal savings and loan association and the subsequent merger of the resulting Federal savings and loan association with the Medford Federal Savings and Loan association was formally approved by a unanimous vote at a special meeting of the shareholders held at the association's office, 126 East Main street, on May 28. Conversion from a state to a federal institution will automatically provide insurance for savings accounts of members up to \$5,000 each, through the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance corporation, and will broaden the services of the association. The Jackson County Building and Loan association was founded in 1909.

"Completion of our conversion will probably take place in 60 days," said J. H. Fletcher, secretary of the association. "Federalization will mean a continuation of our association on a strictly mutual basis, with no change in its control or management. Our local shareholders will continue to elect our board of directors exactly as they have been doing since our organization in 1909.

"Each shareholder will receive exactly the same interest in the Federal association as he holds today in our present organization, his proportionate holding being unchanged. "Our officers and directors, in making their decision to federalize, did so with the belief that our association will be equipped better than ever to render a service to this community. First, in providing a safe and attractive place of investment of the savings of our citizens and second, in widening our activity in granting home loans on economical terms to home owners and prospective home owners in this city. Under the new Federal association charter, greater latitude is permitted the association in making home loans both as to the proportionate amount of these loans and the time and method of payments. Federalization bring the association into closer contact with the Federal Home Loan Bank System, which is a large credit reservoir for thrift and home-financing institutions. In addition, through Washington we have access to the fund set aside by the Home Owners' Loan Corporation for investment in sound thrift and home-financing institutions. Should the need for additional funds for home mortgages here develop to the point where more capital is needed than that from the normal inflow of cash from our members, investment can be made in our association from this fund up to \$3 for every \$1 invested locally.

"Federal savings and loan associations were authorized by congress in 1933 to encourage thrift and to provide for home financing in sections of the country where such institutions are scarce. Provision was made for the conversion of qualified existing state-chartered institutions which might desire to take advantage of the same opportunity. To date there are approximately 1249 new and converted federally chartered associations located in 44 of the states of the union and in Hawaii and Alaska, with assets totalling almost \$82 millions.

National uniformity of operating methods is one of the objectives of these thrift and home-financing associations. All federals are mutual in ownership, shareholders participating equally in profits except that special bonuses may be paid to reward regular, systematic investors. Insurance of the safety of investment in savings and loan associations is provided through the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance corporation, a \$100,000,000 government agency under the direction of the Federal Reserve board at Washington. All federal savings and loan associations are required by law to be insured. George A. Moore, field representative of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Portland, attended the meeting and discussed the advantages of federal and loan associations with insurance of accounts. He further stated that the Jackson County Building and Loan association was one of the few associations in the northwest to convert on a 100 per cent basis and he congratulated the officers, directors and members upon having put the affairs of the association in such condition that it could be federalized on these basis.

The association is petitioning for the privileges to retain the "Jackson County" name adapting it to the new association as the Jackson County Federal Savings and Loan association.

All stories must be based upon actual happenings either at home or abroad. It was emphasized by Horace Bromley, past commander and program chairman, who is credited with instituting this new diversion for post meetings. All World war veterans are invited to the meeting which will begin at 8 o'clock. Mr. Bromley said. Nomination of officers for the new year is to be held and for this reason J. F. Fiegel, post commander, has requested a large attendance. A Dutch lunch will be served after the meeting.
