

CRATER LAKE, CAL. AD IN MAGAZINE BRINGS PROTESTS

C. of C. Files Letter, As Does Portland Civic Body — Action Is Requested

An old Oregon-California dispute was resurrected today when Oregon interests started protests against a listing of Crater Lake as situated in the neighboring state to the south. Letters of protest were forwarded this morning by the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce to Time, national magazine, and a national advertiser in Time who had pictured Crater Lake in his advertisement in Time's May 31 issue and captioned the illustration, "Crater Lake, Cal."

A. H. Banwell, chamber secretary, stated that he had this morning received word from Portland interests requesting that some action be taken on the matter immediately.

Southern Oregon residents have long accused California of trying to purloin their most prized scenic attraction, numerous instances having been brought to light which indicated a lack of geographical exactness not justified by the nearly 100 miles of distance separating the famed resort from California's boundary.

PORTLAND, June 1.—(AP)—A national news magazine's mistake of placing Crater Lake in California caused the Portland Chamber of Commerce to complain today.

A two-page advertisement of a tractor company shows tractors working at "Crater Lake, California." The chamber sent its objection to the eastern advertising agency which handles the company's account.

TREE DEDICATED TO JOHN GRIBBLE

A ten-year old evergreen tree in the city park was yesterday dedicated to the memory of John Foster Gribble as part of memorial day exercises by Medford Boy Scout troop 6. John Gribble was killed in an air crash near Randolph field February 11 of this year while in training as an army air pilot. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Gribble of this city.

During his youth in Medford, John Gribble was a member of troop 5 and was present when the tree was planted 10 years ago last February 12. A bronze marker, bearing dedication inscription, was placed at the tree base.

Rev. E. S. Bartlam delivered the dedicatory address and L. Clifton Culp, troop 5 administrator, presented a brief resume of Gribble's life. Col. W. H. Paine, Boy Scout historian for Crater Lake area council and Scoutmaster Culp made arrangements for the services.

Five Die in Steel Riots



Five steel strike demonstrators were killed or injured fatally and at least 105 other persons suffered head and body bruises in a short-lived clash between 200 policemen and more than 1,000 demonstrators in a prairie near the South Chicago plant of Republic Steel. This picture, taken during the height of the fighting, shows some of the thousand men and women fleeing before club-wielding police, while others sprawl on the ground in surrender. Tear gas and guns, as well as clubs, were used in the fight.

CRESCENT TO GET DESTROYER VISIT

A request that a United States navy submarine be sent to Crescent City harbor during the Fourth of July celebration cannot be fulfilled, a letter notified the Jackson county chamber of commerce today.

Instead of the submarine, the commander in chief of the navy will send the U. S. destroyer Dallas, the letter stated. The destroyer will arrive July 3 and remain until July 6. Notification came from D. McD. LeBreton, captain in the U. S. navy and chief of staff of the U. S. fleet. Tide time tables for the Crescent beach are now available at the chamber. It is announced.

KLAMATH JURIST HAS FINAL WORD ON FEHL'S VISIT

SALEM, June 1.—(AP)—Ed Duffy, state parole officer, announced today he would grant permission to Earl H. Fehl, former judge of Jackson county, to go to Klamath Falls to interview Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst relative to two civil suits filed against him.

Fehl, who has been living in Portland since paroled from the state penitentiary after serving a portion of a four-year term for ballot theft, was given his freedom on condition he remain out of Jackson county and to obtain permission before going into the southern part of the state.

Duffy said that if Judge Ashurst, who will try the civil suits involving Fehl, thought it necessary Fehl appear in person, he would likewise grant his permission to attend the trial at Medford June 15.

Fehl's parole will be in force until August 15 when the four-year sentence expires.

Deputy District Attorney Neilson said no suit in which Fehl is a defendant is pending in this county.

The suit of Corinthia E. Stalley against the estate of Ted Heimroth has been set for June 19.

The bill is listed as senate bill 2465.
