Appointment of A. H. Banwell as general chairman of the Northwest Aviation Planning Council was announced in a notice sent out today by Walter W. E. May of Portland, Idaho, Chamber of Commerce and program chairman for the next meeting of the council in Boise June 17, 18 and 19. Mr. Banwell, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, also attended the meeting in support. Mr. Banwell's appointment is an outstanding credit to Medford and will assist substantially in keeping this city in the forefront of aviation development," said Fred W. Heath, chairman of the aviation committee of the chamber of commerce. "Medford's greatest asset is its airport and we have considerable development yet to accomplish there," Mr. Heath declared. "The city is now placed in a position to get what it needs in its airport expansion program. The appointment of Mr. Banwell as general chairman will naturally draw attention to Medford and its airport requirements." Fred W. Scheffel, city superintendent in Boise, attending the meeting in Boise, with him and Mr. Banwell present, Medford will be competently represented, Mr. Heath said, adding that as program chairman of the Portland meeting last fall Mr. Banwell did a difficult task so well that many compliments were expressed regarding his efficiency.
