

Dizzy Dean's Suspension Lifted by Frick After Stormy Session

CARD HURLER IN HIGH DUDGEON AT NEW YORK CONFAB

Pitcher Walks Out, But Returns — Listeners Back Up Dizzy in Telegram

NEW YORK, June 4.—(AP)—Despite Dizzy Dean's continued refusal today formally to sign any statement backing up his verbal denial of alleged controversial statements, the suspension of the Cardinal pitching ace was ordered lifted by Ford Frick, president of the National League, effective within 24 hours.

Frick announced lifting the ban, under which he put Dean two days ago as an outgrowth of purported attacks by the pitcher on the league's chief executive and Umpire George Barr, after a chaotic conference at league headquarters.

Dean walked out of the meeting in a rage, at one time declaring he was "all washed up," then was persuaded to return for another compromise attempt at settlement of the dispute. This consisted of a question and answer parley between Frick and Dean, with the pitcher flatly denying he made the critical statements attributed to him at St. Louis and Belleville, Ill.

Frick then announced lifting of the suspension, only to have Dean suddenly turn a further wrench into the peace proceedings. The pitcher shouted it was "not over yet," that he would carry an appeal to Commissioner Landis, regardless, and also "see my lawyer."

Dean's violent reaction, after the second get-together, at first prompted Frick to threaten withdrawal of his decision to lift the suspension.

Dean sought this morning's conference with Frick, armed with a telegram from Belleville, Ill., signed by nine men who attended the father's and son's dinner at the Presbyterian church where Dizzy spoke, and voicing the opinion of the pitcher's talk as "not detrimental to the best interests of baseball."

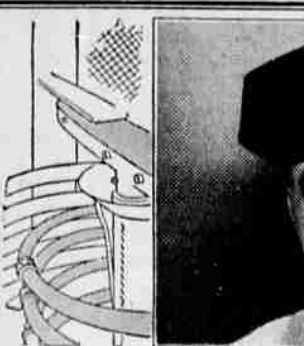
At Belleville, Murray H. Parres, reporter for the Daily Advocate, stuck by his story that Dean called Frick and Barr "the two biggest crooks in baseball," and also referred to the league president as "our great little president—but a pain in the neck to me."

Heads of the clubs, who could be reached, chose to treat the situation as a private affair between Frick and the St. Louis club.

Meanwhile the suspension was costing Dean approximately \$160 per day in salary, based upon his estimated yearly salary of \$25,000.

25 TURN OUT FOR DIAMOND DRILL

Over 25 embryo major league ball players reported for workouts yesterday morning at the new turf field at Medford high school, and were sent through stiff batting and fielding drills by Russ Acheson, Mike Balkovick and Bill Bowerman, instructors.

The youths, all under 21 years of age, were from Medford and vicinity. Many more youngsters are expected to enroll in the baseball school, which is free to all under 21 in Jackson county. Sessions will be held daily, with the players furnishing only their shoes and glove.

A four-team city league will be formed in the near future and will stage regular games in the afternoon. All practice sessions begin at 10 a. m. Later, a school team will be selected from the four teams and will tangle with clubs from other southern Oregon cities.

LEWIS WINS WITH EASE FROM OLIN

ST. LOUIS, June 4.—(AP)—John Henry Lewis, a champion who has outlasted his class, today cast a speculative eye over the heavyweight field.

The Phoenix Phantom practically exhausted the raw material in the light heavyweight division last night when he stopped Bob Olin in the eighth round of a scheduled 15-round title bout.

Lewis received \$15,000 of a \$25,000 gate. Olin, from whom Lewis won the crown in 1935, received 12½ percent and a cracked rib.

The cracked rib was from a crushing right in the fourth round which sent Olin down for a seven count. He went down again early in the eighth, and on the third down Referee Walter Hetmer rushed over to the nonchalant Lewis and raised his hand in token of victory, by technical knockout.



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CRATERS ALL SET FOR FIRST GAME AT HOME SUNDAY

New High Turf Diamond Dedictory Exercises Set; Hitters Added to Squad

Manager Mike Balkovick's fighting Medford Craters, after four long weeks on the road, return home Sunday afternoon to face the second-place Roseburg Pirates in a Southern Oregon league battle that will dedicate the finest high school baseball field in the state of Oregon. Opening pitch is slated for 2:30 o'clock.

Gala inauguration ceremonies will be open action on the green velvet of the turf diamond, planted early this spring. Conway Patton, former major league ball player and Medford's most loyal fan, will hurl the first ball. Capt. Lee Bown of the Oregon state police will attempt to sock it for a bawling, and either Mayor George Porter or Ed Lamport, president of the Southern Oregon league, will catch it if Capt. Bown fans, and Patton doesn't apply too much force.

The greatest crowd to witness a ball game here in years is expected to pack the two covered stands. It will be informed of the batter and the progress of the game by a loud-speaker system donated by Heine Pluhner.

Many prizes for Medford players have been donated by local business firms, and more are expected before game time. Latest offerings are a half gallon of ice cream by the Roxy Anne confectionery to each Crater player taking part in the first double play, and one quart of milk a day for a month by Gilman's Dairy.

Strengthened by the acquisition of Duke Hankinson, a 195-pound heavy-slugging outfielder, and Bob Smith, left-handed first baseman, the Craters figure to present the most powerful club this year. Hankinson and Smith will join the team tomorrow afternoon, arriving from Eugene where they attend the University of Oregon.

Manager Balkovick said today he was still "in the dark" regarding Medford's starting hurler. However, it would be either Larry Pepper or of the amazing curve ball, or Ray Erickson, right-hander with the blazing high hand one. Both youngsters, the skipper reported, have been looking great during practice this week, and both would probably see action on the Crater mound.

Stiff batting drills have been the order of the day as the locals prepared themselves for their first home appearance of the season Sunday.

With the new turf finally solid enough to stand cleats, infield workouts have also taken up a good deal of time each day. The manager said the club would workout today at 3 p. m., and also tomorrow at the same time.

With the expected player-help putting a new light on the situation, Balkovick said that Virgil Swanson would be shifted from first base to the outfield to make way for Smith.

A brilliant fielder, that Hankinson would hold down another outfield spot. Third outer gardeners would be either Malcolm Stine or Dick Sakranda.

In the infield, Wally Rickert will be at the keystone position, Dick Lewis at shortstop, and Dick Hoffman, who has been playing sweet baseball on this base, Balkovick will do the catching.

The Roseburg Pirates, managed by Rudy Ritzman, will probably open with Partzinger, a right-hander, on the mound and Giff back of the plate.

In battling their way into the Southern Oregon league's second place, the Pirates have knocked over Ashland, Grants Pass and Glendale and dropped their lone battle to the league-leading Crescent City Chinooks. The northernmost members of the circuit are composed of flashy and fiery youngsters, and boast the league's finest fielding team.

Baker, right-fielder and cleanup hitter, tops all Pirate batters with a mark of .444, and leads the league in home runs with two. Rhinn, second baseman, is hitting at a .357 clip, and Giff, catcher, is batting .313.

While Medford and Roseburg are fighting it out here, Grants Pass, tied with the Pirates for second place, will travel to Crescent City for a crucial battle with the Chinooks, and Ashland will hop to Glendale.

The boys along the baseball front were picking a nice, quiet second division berth for the Dean-less St. Louis Cardinals today.

At the same time, the talk that wasn't given over to the Dean doings, was directed at the work of another pitcher, Lou Fette, who's been proving himself the surprise package of the Boston Bees and the 1937 National league rookie crop.

Without their great "popper-offer," whether he's right or wrong in his row with Ford Frick, the Cards are anywhere up to 20 games weaker, depending on how long he's going to be on the outside looking in.

With Dean, Fette and the weather man all getting their licks in, the other major league action yesterday didn't create as much stir as a leaf in a breeze. Only four games got by the rain altogether.

Cleveland's Indians renewed their series with the New York Yankees by taking a free swinging 6-2 decision from Lefty Gomez.

The Tigers kicked away enough chances to win three games and lost to the Senators 5-4. The White Sox took over third place from the Tigers in the American league by walloping the Boston Red Sox 11-4.

SACS WIN TIGHT GAME; CROWD TOP

The argument overshadowed the Solons' 12 to 3 defeat of the Seals as they crept to within one game of the Pacific coast baseball league leaders. It was the second win in three games for the Solons in their current crucial series with San Francisco.

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MEDFORD PLACES SECOND IN STATE RIFLE SHOT MEET

Opening in a cold, drizzly rain, the Oregon state rifle match got under way Saturday morning, May 29, with seven Medford shooters on the line. This being the first registered match ever held in Oregon, the top notch small bore artists of Oregon, Washington, California and Montana were on hand.

In the first match, at 50 meters, on the international target, Ivan Waddell placed third for bronze medal and high tyro gold trophy.

S. M. and Shelby Tuttle took high tyro and silver medals in the 50 yard metallic sight "buddy" match with Waddell and St. Clair in next place.

The Carlton match, fired at 100 yards, was a Medford walk-away, with Ed Lull first for silver medal and high tyro gold trophy. Mrs. Tuttle second, bronze medal, and S. M. Tuttle, fourth.

Sunday morning Waddell and St. Clair took high tyro and silver medals in the two man team metallic sight match with Shelby Tuttle in next place.

Shelby Tuttle took second place in the American Legion match for bronze medal.

The main event of the day, the double Dewar, with metallic sights, was lost to Medford by one point over 600. Ivan Waddell placed second for silver medal and high tyro gold trophy, also winning second place on the O.S.R.A. international team, to compete against a team picked by the Small Bore Association of England.

The international match was started at 9:30 a. m. Monday. Here again Waddell, coached by Tuttle, turned in his consistently high score, placing second with a score of 398. The team score was 3,951, nine points above the highest score of previous years.

The 50-yard, any sight match, had the largest entries of any event during the shoot. Shelby Tuttle placed third for bronze medal and high tyro silver medal.

The outstanding event of the afternoon and the final match was the Oregonian 4-man team match and high individual. The Medford team, consisting of Waddell, Lull, S. M. and Shelby Tuttle, took second place with a score of 1,556, four teams competing. In the same match, against a field of old timers from all four states, individual honors, silver medal and high tyro was won by Mrs. Tuttle, with a score of 397; Mrs. Tuttle placing third.

In the grand aggregate of all matches, Ivan Waddell was only two points below the top, winning bronze medal and President's gold trophy as high tyro.

From Medford's viewpoint, the high lights of the match were the constant shooting of Waddell; the high ranking in all matches of the only women shooter, Mrs. Waddell and Mrs. Tuttle; and the ability of Les St. Clair (Gresham) and Shelby Tuttle, two 17-year old juniors, to place with the best shots of the coast.
