

ANNUAL SHOW OF GARDEN CLUB AT COURTHOUSE OPEN

Flower Fanciers Exhibits of Roses and Flowers Closes Tomorrow.

The rose and her contemporaries went on trial today at the Jackson county court house as the annual show of the Medford Garden club turned stern corridors into a fair-land of flowers and the auditorium into a rose garden, irresistible to the eye. Some of Medford's most prominent flower fanciers are judge and jury and an early decision was expected by Miss Jane Snedden, club president, this afternoon.

The parade of flowers was still going on, when the doors were closed by the judges shortly after 11 o'clock. The show opened to the public at 2 o'clock this afternoon to remain open through today and tomorrow.

Peonies, flaunting petals of palest pinks to deepest reds, are probably first to greet the eye, because modesty is not a virtue with them. The onlooker will soon see, however, that every flower of the garden is represented, and that the roses, this belated season, have achieved a beauty, which undoubtedly surpasses all former years, according to Mrs. A. E. Reames, chairman of the rose division.

Particularly inviting in the garden, recreated on the stage of the auditorium by Mrs. H. D. McCaskey, one of the valley's most prominent rose fanciers. There the miniature beds are lined with privet hedge, all enclosed with picket fence, where ivy grows. Choice roses mingle with other garden flowers to complete the invitation "come into my garden."

Equally lovely in the corridors is the pool and rock garden, arranged by Mrs. Lillian Salade, using plants and shrubs from Topsisde, home of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred E. V. Carpenter. There the detail is remarkably well reproduced from the little seed pods, still clinging to an iris, to the lily, reigning queen of every garden pool.

The arrangement of the corridors, designed by Mrs. Alfred S. V. Carpenter, forms a striking setting for the displays. Some of the arrangements in yellow on the "arrangement" table drawing more than their share of "ahs." A yellow bowl with yellow Madonna has been used to achieve an unusually lovely result.

A miniature house and garden with floor plan accompanying it, to prove its practicality, was entered by Charles Vochies, a non-competitive display, its only reward to be praise, and it was getting an abundance of that today.

Particularly interesting among things rare is an iris entered by Mrs. L. E. Williams. It apparently got away and tried to disguise itself by becoming half orchid and half lady slipper. A lovely primula pulcherrima, arranged in copper, is recognized as one from Mrs. Reames' gardens. Close by are the tiniest cat tails in existence, brought from a Japanese estate on the peninsula. A jack in the pulpit also falls in the rare division.

And to Earl Higgins go congratulations for entrance of a very beautiful magnolia or "tulip tree."

Other displays, too numerous to mention, bringing pansies, poppies, columbine, sweetpeas and all their companions into the scene, will be given their deserved recognition when the judges make their report.

PRESCOTT CCC TO GO TO WINEGLASS

Civilian Conservation Corps company 3864, now stationed at Camp Prescott, will be transferred to Camp Wineglass in Crater Lake National park, about June 15 for the summer months. R. M. Kent, project superintendent, reported today. The company will be stationed at Crater Lake until October when it will return to Camp Prescott.

It is probable that a spike camp of 25 men will be established about July 1 at Coker State Park near Medford on the Crater Lake highway to carry on a number of necessary improvements, including the construction of a water system and picnic ground facilities. During the summer of 1936 a spike camp was maintained at Prospect where it engaged in fire hazard reduction work on several state-owned tracts.

Camp Prescott was built during the summer of 1935 and occupied in November of that year by Company 1652 from Illinois. The development of Prescott Park is being done under the general supervision of the National Park Service in cooperation with the city of Medford.

338 NEW LAWS TO GO IN EFFECT IN STATE ON MONDAY

against the bill by Representative Hannah Martin which would make it illegal to possess or operate pinball machines, marbles and other similar devices.

The petitions carried more than 18,000 names each. The law required a total of 12,512 signatures of voters. These said signatures were obtained in every county of the state but Hood River and Lake.

George C. Stanley of Eugene filed the petitions against the measure which would prevent price-cutting by retailers below the cost of production or set price. These petitions carried 14,608 signatures. No other referendum petitions are out. The secretary of state announced.

The laws becoming effective Monday range from providing duel representation of men and women as precinct heads, and open noon-hour schedules for various county court houses, to capital punishment by lethal gas rather than by hanging.

One of the new laws make reports of motor accidents confidential and prohibits disclosure of their contents. It was expected this act would be tested in court on the grounds that official reports are open to the public.

Artificial coloring of sausages and casing will be prohibited after Monday, good time credits will now be available to penitentiary prisoners, and the criminal syndicalism law will be repealed, but in its stead will be a penalty for conspiracy.

to enlarge the supreme court unless older justices retired, that the country in recent weeks had seen forests while a lot of people in Washington were likely to see trees instead of a forest.

His forest remark was understood by his hearers to have reference to court reform generally; the trees relating to the number of new judges needed.

Talks About Trees

Asked flatly about a possible compromise on two new judges instead of six as he originally proposed, the president said the inquiry was talking about trees while he was talking about court reform.

"How many trees make a forest?" someone asked.

He smiled but did not answer. The president said an illustration of the need for court reform was given by the high tribunal last week in adjourning until October without deciding four cases important to the country. He listed them as the TVA case, which had been decided only partially before; the PWA cases, involving the right of the federal government to lend money to municipalities for power projects; and the securities commission case.

Cites Cases

He did not mention the fourth case specifically. He did say, however, the court had made no suggestion for remedying the situation which he said was preventing the government from prosecuting the Aluminum Company anti-trust suit.

In this connection he said the supreme court had been always looked on as a father of the lower courts, yet in the Aluminum company case, in which the government was enjoined in the lower courts from pressing its suit in any jurisdiction outside of western Pennsylvania, the government was receiving no help.

Mr. Roosevelt said under the law there was no method of carrying the case up to the highest court except through the circuit court and it may be several years before a final decision is rendered. The pending court reorganization bill, he said, would permit a quicker method.

The president said in the PWA case six decisions, all favorable to the government, had been rendered by circuit courts. Nevertheless, he added, the supreme court quit for the summer after deciding to defer arguments on these until fall.

The president said both sides also had wanted an early decision in the securities commission case.

He noted the court had cleared its docket except for six other cases in which arguments had been completed, but that these were put over for resumption next fall.

Talking at length to the scores of newspapermen, the president said he looked up the law on supreme court terms and found that it provides for one term annually beginning in October, but the court itself could decide when to recess.

He commented to reporters that the people wanted speedier decisions and large cases cleaned up in six months instead of periods ranging up to three years and more.

FLUHRER STARTS WORK, TWO FLOORS FOR OFFICE SPACE

Work was started today on the reconstruction of the second and third floors of the W. H. Fluhrer building at Main street and Central avenue.

The remodeled floors will provide about 25 business and professional offices which will be ready for occupancy August 1, Mr. Fluhrer said. Several office leases have already been signed, he added.

The new exterior of the building will be completed within 30 days, Mr. Fluhrer related, there remaining some tile and other work to finish.

Like the exterior and the remodeled ground floor, the two upper stories will be modern throughout, the decorations to follow the ultra modernistic trend, the owner stated.

Specialists on medical and dental office design have been consulted so that the new offices will be arranged for the utmost convenience and serviceability, Mr. Fluhrer said. The offices, he added, will be arranged to suit the tenants.

An elevator is to be installed with a cupola atop the building for its housing, Mr. Fluhrer explained. The entrance lobby will be tiled, he said. Improved features will include air conditioning to maintain proper temperatures summer and winter; an automatic sprinkler system to water the roof in summer to prevent the penetration of heat through the top; steel framed windows of the new no-graft ventilation design; hardwood floors throughout; mahogany woodwork; and outside ventilation for all offices in addition to air conditioning.

Mr. Fluhrer said he had purchased the 99-year lease of the third floor which was held originally by the Odd Fellows lodge.

The architects are Clark & Keeney. Construction is under the supervision of C. E. Borg. About 25 men will be employed.
