

Shriners to Parade Here Saturday; Hold Ceremonial on Banks of Rogue

HILLAH TEMPLE TO HOLD INITIAL OPEN AIR CONCLAVE HERE

Jerry Jerome General Chairman of Committees — Ben Ali Stage Director to Erect Ceremonial Setting

In a beautiful setting of oaks and pines on the banks of famous Rogue river, Hillah Temple will stage an open air ceremonial tomorrow, Saturday, June 5—the first outdoor conclave in the history of the southern Oregon temple. The Elks picnic ground, ten miles from Medford, has been selected for this unique affair and a crew of workmen are busy transforming this lovely spot into a scene of dazzling Arabian splendor on the big day for the wearers of the fez in southern Oregon.

E. C. "Jerry" Jerome heads the several committees in charge of perfecting all arrangements for a ceremonial which promises to set a "new

high" in Shrine history here. An aggressive membership committee, under the capable direction of Noble Lou Wiperman, promises a large class of unregenerated sons of the desert to tread the desert sands of Rogue river's banks, especially heated for the occasion.

Chairman Jerry Jerome has secured the generous cooperation of Noble Lem C. Carter, former Hollywood scene builder and now stage director for Ben Ali temple of Sacramento, to supervise the construction of elaborate scenic backgrounds for the ceremonial work on the banks of Rogue river. Noble Carter and his staff of ten technicians arrived in this city this morning while Thursday an express car brought materials with which to construct a setting that will be 60 feet wide and 50 feet long. The finished job will undoubtedly be one of the finest open air scenic backgrounds ever assembled in this section of the state.

Saturday will be a big day for Hillah Nobles! In the morning, the golf tournament on the famous Rogue River Valley Golf club course will begin at 9 o'clock. This will be the only important morning feature of the ceremonial. During the day, until the hour of 3, nobles will report to Recorder R. E. Detrick at the Hillah information desk in the lobby of the Hotel Medford. After they have been properly registered, the unfortunate victims will be placed in the hands of Candidate Chairman Clatus McCredie. Raymond Reter will be the chairman of the committee to welcome visiting Nobles who will begin arriving in Medford Friday evening.

At 8 p. m. the Hillah Shrine band will present a concert in the Medford park, with added entertainment provided by Hillah Temple's patrol and drum corps in snappy drills. The parade will be formed at 4 p. m. under the direction of Chairman Fred Pick, with brilliantly garbed uniformed units. Shrine dignitaries in costume, the nobility and candidates participating. The line of march will be as follows:

The parade will leave the Medford park at 4 p. m., proceed north on Ivy street to Sixth, thence east to Riverside, south on that street to Main, and return to the city park. Following the parade, the Nobles will make the ten-mile pilgrimage to the Elks picnic grounds on the banks of Rogue river, with transportation details ably handled by Past-Potentate Olen Alenderfer and his committee, where the refreshment committee under the leadership of Leon B. Haskins will dispense good cheer for all. The Nobles' cars will be parked under the watchful eye of Chairman Scott Brill and his committee. A sumptuous repast will be served at 6:30 p. m. with Noble Jimmy Valentine and his committee in charge of the traditional feast.

At 8 o'clock the impressive ceremonial pageant will be featured with the introduction of potentates and dignitaries and other first and third section features.

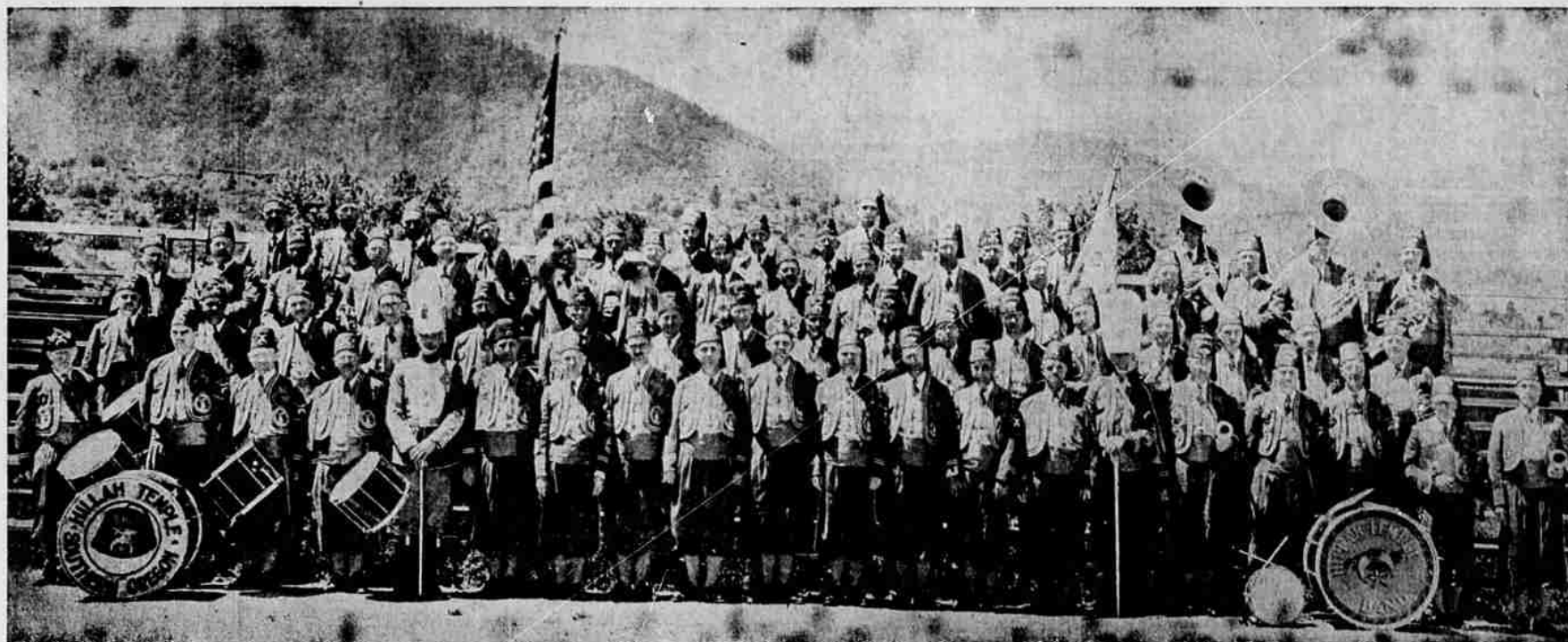

BILL TO EXTEND PWA INTRODUCED

WASHINGTON, June 3.—(AP)—Senator Hayden (D-Ariz.) offered an amendment to the relief bill to extend the public works administration for two years with \$325,000,000 for loans and grants.

Hayden's amendment, introduced as hearings opened on the \$1,500,000,000 relief bill, would give Secretary Ickes full control over projects undertaken.

It would authorize the Reconstruction Finance corporation to cash the PWA's revolving fund which Hayden said would provide \$325,000,000.

The PWA would get no new funds. Hayden's amendment would abolish the rule that federal grants equal 115 per cent of the amount spent for relief labor.

Instead it would fix federal grants at 45 per cent of the cost of the projects. President Roosevelt would not be required to approve PWA projects, as he has in the past.

Federal Reserve Loans. WASHINGTON, June 4.—(AP)—The federal reserve board reported today that last week's loans to brokers and

dealers on securities held by reporting member banks in New York City totaled \$1,140,000,000.

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
