

DISCUSS PLANS OF SPANISH VETERANS MEET HERE JULY 11

Plans for the annual convention of United Spanish War Veterans were carried forward at a committee meeting in the Hotel Medford this afternoon. The state encampment will be held here July 11-14.

Reviewing the plans with the committee were Hugh S. Rogers of Hillsboro, state commander, and Dr. George F. A. Walker of Portland, assistant adjutant and past department commander.

Mr. Rogers said that reports he had received from poets in all parts of the state indicated that this year's encampment would be the largest the organization has ever held.

"All are eager to come to Medford and an exceptionally good encampment is anticipated," Mr. Rogers stated. "I know the Medford committee has worked hard and its plans and arrangements are most satisfactory. We are delighted to have Medford as host city."

HOUSE COMMITTEE OKAYS EXTENSION OF PWA TWO YEARS

WASHINGTON, June 4.—(AP)—The house appropriations committee recommended legislation today to extend the public works administration for two years and authorize it to use approximately \$256,000,000 for loans and grants.

The measure, although making no direct appropriation from the treasury, would renew the agency's power to use the \$95,000,000 unobligated balance in its revolving fund for grants and authorize it to sell an additional \$40,000,000 of its securities for this purpose.

A similar proposal was made yesterday to a senate appropriations subcommittee by Senator Hayden (D. Ariz.).

He would have the reconstruction finance corporation cash PWA's revolving fund, so as to provide \$325,000,000 for continuing PWA on an active basis.

Only projects already approved by PWA's examining division would be eligible for either loans or grants under the extension measure.

The bill provides for expiration of PWA on June 30, 1939.

SITDOWNS BOOST IDLE LIST; 5 AUTO PLANTS SUSPEND

(By the Associated Press) Sit-down strikers opened new assaults on the nation's automotive industry today, leaving an estimated additional 20,000 workers idle, and disorders in a Michigan lumber strike resulted in the death of one and injuries to five others.

Sit-downs in the automobile industry boosted the nation's idle to near the 100,000 mark.

Tentative peace moves in the steel walk out, with an estimated 73,000 out, proceeded but strikers and sympathizers barricaded a freight train, bound for a Republic Steel plant in Warren, Ohio, and halted a postal ruling there refusing delivery for cartons of food addressed to men still working in the plant.

Five big automotive units in Michigan were closed by sit-downs which threw 17,000 out of work. Companies affected were Chrysler, two units, Packard, De Soto and Fisher bodies.

At Detroit, personnel director Harry H. Bennett of the Ford Motor company, notified authorities he would appear Monday before a one man grand jury investigating a riot outside the Rouge plant when a union organization campaign got under way last week.

First reports of committee for industrial organization activity in the northern mine ranges of Minnesota and Michigan brought claims of progress in the C.I.O. campaign to tie up supplies for steel firms by unionizing ore diggers.

INJUNCTION SUIT PORTLAND LABOR ROW POSTPONED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4.—(AP)—The legal battle over the right of the Portland central labor council to oust the local warehousemen's affiliate of the International Longshoremen's association under instructions from the American Federation of Labor was postponed today until next week.

Circuit Judge Jacob Kanzer ordered the postponement at the request of Gust Anderson, secretary of the council, who asked time to confer with William Green, A. F. of L. president, regarding employment of attorneys. It was understood that George Vanderveer, labor attorney of Seattle, may enter the case.

The warehousemen sought an injunction to restrain officials of the A. F. of L. and the Portland council from interfering with the right of their delegates to participate in affairs of the council.

The council voted to oust the union when it refused an order from Green to reject the jurisdiction of the teamsters' union.

The controversy grew out of the strike at the Meier and Frank department store warehouse of 1 L. A. warehouse union members. The council refused to support the strike.

Judge Kanzer announced he would set the time for the hearing Monday afternoon.

STEPMOTHER GETS 12-YEAR TERM FOR DEATH OF CHILD

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 4.—(AP)—A sentence of 12 years in the Oregon state penitentiary was imposed in circuit court here this morning by Judge Carl E. Wimberly upon Cordella Hopkins, 22, of Canyonville. Mrs. Hopkins had pleaded guilty to a charge of involuntary manslaughter, growing out of the death of her four-year-old step-daughter, Barbara Irene Hopkins, April 17. As the manslaughter law requires both fine and imprisonment, the sentence included a fine of \$2.

Judge Wimberly said in passing sentence that he had studied the case very carefully, reading the report of physicians who conducted the autopsy, the transcripts from the preliminary examination and coroner's inquest, and the confession signed by Mrs. Hopkins. He said arriving at the penalty to be imposed he had considered the fact that the woman had pleaded guilty, the fact that there was evidently some mental disturbance, and also the fact that the law passed by the recent legislature, allowing time off for good behavior, reduces a penalty approximately one-third.

Mrs. Hopkins in her confession and plea before the court, admitted striking the child with the handle of a table knife. Blows upon the head, according to the autopsy report, resulted in a hemorrhage which caused the girl's death.

Leonard Hopkins, father of the child, was indicted by the grand jury on a charge of assault and battery to which he pleaded not guilty. His trial will start Monday.
