## FISHING FAIR TO GOOD IN VALLEY LAKES THIS WEEK

Fishing at Pelican bay is reported as fair. Lake of the Woods is also considered fair.

Fish lake was considered very good last Sunday. So far this season the largest fish have been caught using spinners for lures; however, cluster eggs are also bringing in their share of the water beauties.

Some good catches of bass at Hyatt dam have been reported. Still fishing with worms for bait has been the most successful.

Salmon fishing in the Rogue river is about over, very few catches having been reported this week.

All roads leading to Fish lake, Lake of the Woods, Hyatt dam and Pelican bay, excepting the Dead Indian road, are open and passable without the use of chains.

Fishing at Diamond lake has been considered fair to good. The reports coming in were that very large fish were being caught; the most successful anglers using spinners and trolling. Cluster eggs were also used with varying success. The road is open to two-way travel to Diamond lake from the Union Creek side, and is open to within one-half mile or less to the summer homes.

Due to the exceptionally warm weather of the past few days, the woods are becoming susceptible to the fire menace again, and care with fire should be the aim of all forest users. Camp fires should be kept to a minimum. When one is built it should be completely extinguished before it is left by using water to drown out every spark.

## STOCK RANGES OF STATE BENEFITTED

CORVALLIS, June 4—(AP)—Improvements from the AAA program will result in more wealth from Oregon's range lands for future generations. N. C. Donaldson, secretary of the state AAA office, said today after a preliminary survey of the work done in 1936 and being continued this year.

Approximately 1500 springs were improved, 90 pit reservoirs built and 25 new wells drilled under the program.

## W. M. LEWSADDER, FORMER MINISTER, CALLED TO REST

William Milton Lewsadder, beloved resident of Talent, Oregon for the past six years, passed away at the family home at 4:45 o'clock Thursday afternoon after a very short illness, due to a paralytic stroke.

Mr. Lewsadder was born at Covington, Indiana, March 19, 1888, and was aged 71 years. He spent his early life in Indiana, and also gained his early education there, later entering Battle Creek college at Battle Creek, Mich.

Upon the completion of his education he met and was united in marriage to Miss Myrtle McReynolds at Wellman, Iowa, May 14, 1902. They recently celebrated their 35th wedding anniversary.

He had before his marriage entered the ministry and raised up his first church at Monmouth Ill., in 1902.

After proving his very capable ability he was ordained in 1903. He had charge of churches in Wisconsin, Ohio, Utah and California, and was forced to retire in 1923 because of a nervous collapse. Since his residence in southern Oregon he has been quite active with the Seventh Day Adventist church at Ashland. A man of sterling Christian qualities, and was loved by all who knew him.

## Many Crates Needed For Ditsworth Crop

Last week the Timber Products ran one-half day extra shift to prepare the lumber for the Ditsworth and Vaughn strawberry crop, and the Monarch Seed and Feed company furnished 79,000 berry cups, according to W.
