

### COUNTY 4-H CLUB DELEGATES WILL ATTEND OSC MEET

Jackson county 4-H club delegates numbering 37, will leave for Corvallis by train next Monday morning at 8:31, where they will attend the annual 4-H club summer school. C. D. Conrad, Jackson county club agent, states that this is the largest delegation ever to attend the school from Jackson county.

Chaperones accompanying the Jackson county delegation will be Miss Norma Smith of Applegate, Miss Lucille Lambert of Ashland and Mr. and Mrs. Conrad.

The summer school is held in the Oregon State Agricultural college campus for two weeks each year during the month of June. It is the outstanding 4-H club activity of the year which enables club members from all over the state to gather for instruction in subjects related to agriculture and home economics, besides affording opportunity for recreation and organized play.

Conrad says that the Jackson county scholarships are being sponsored by the local Granges, banks, business firms, other organizations and individuals. A complete list of these donors is not available, but will be published soon.

Fourteen hundred boys and girls from Oregon attended the school last year and it is expected that more than 1800 will be there this year.

A general assembly of these boys and girls will be held each day from 2 to 3 o'clock and will be broadcast over radio station KOAC.

Radio programs by the county delegations will be broadcast every day except Sunday, from 7 to 7:45 p. m.

### INSURGENT SPAIN STUNNED BY LOSS OF GENERAL MOLA

VICTORIA, Spain, June 4.—(AP)—Insurgent Spain was stunned today by the death of Gen. Emilio Mola, generalissimo Francisco Franco's ablest commander, in the crash of a fog-bound airplane on the Bucayan front where his tactical genius had brought his armies within sight of besieged Bilbao.

Flags were half-staffed throughout insurgent territory. Officers in uniform wept openly as the news of his death was broadcast.

All public activities were suspended and newspapers called his loss "irreparable for Spain." Franco, in a special decree, posthumously awarded the commander of all insurgent armies in northern Spain the grand cross of San Fernando, Spain's highest military honor.

The same penetrating Baque for which had temporarily held up the advance of Mola's armies, caused his death. Two staff officers and two pilots died with him.

Mola's body was thrown 25 yards from the wreckage and was so badly mutilated it could be identified only by the tan waterproof cloak which was his characteristic outer garment.

At midnight a minute of silence was observed throughout insurgent territory, after which all radio broadcast the Marcha Real, national anthem of the Franco troops. It was the first broadcast since all radios were closed down after announcing Mola's death with a brief eulogy.

An official announcement said troops on the Bucayan front, "learning of the death, demanded that the offensive against the government should be resumed with the greatest energy."

### BIDS OPENED FOR HIGHWAY PAVING

PORTLAND, June 3.—(AP)—The Oregon state highway commission received bids on six highway projects, and heard protests from Multnomah County Truckmen's associations on the purchase by the state of trucks for use on the Wolf creek and Wilson river highway projects.

Jackson county—Grading and paving Phoenix-Bear creek section, Pacific highway 342 miles, Jacobsen-Jensen company, Portland, \$159,771.

Closing time for bids to classify bids is 1:30 p. m.

### PAIR FINED FOR FAULTY BRAKES

Fred J. Snyder, 28, of Klamath Falls, was fined \$2.50 and \$4.50 costs in justice of the peace court yesterday for not having sufficient brakes on his car. He pleaded guilty before Judge William R. Coleman and said he would have the brakes brought up to standard.

Melford M. Hood, 27, of Central Point was fined \$5 and costs for speeding an empty truck on the Pacific highway near Jackson Hot Springs. He pleaded guilty. State police said he was traveling 58 miles an hour down grade when he was stopped.

Frederick W. Berwert, 20, of route 2, was fined \$2.50 and costs for not having sufficient brakes on his light truck.

### JEWISH CITIZEN OF AMERICA DIES AS NAZI TRAITOR

BERLIN, June 4.—(AP)—Helmuth Hirsch, 21-year-old Jewish citizen of the United States, who had never been in America, was executed by a mechanical guillotine at dawn today for an alleged treasonable plot under the explosives law—presumably a plan to kill Adolf Hitler.

Execution occurred in Ploetzensee prison, despite four clemency appeals by United States Ambassador William E. Dodd.

Hirsch went to his death by the guillotine with a 20-year-old German, Oscar Denner, condemned like himself on a charge of high treason.

The grim mechanism was substituted only recently for the traditional axe.

American diplomatic and consular officials, in pleading vainly for Hirsch's life, urged clemency on those grounds:

1. That he was a citizen of the United States, where the death penalty is not given for an intended act.
2. He was very young and probably influenced by older people.

Ambassador Dodd asked to examine the evidence in the case, including one allegation that Hirsch tried to dynamite the party headquarters of Julius Treicher and kill this high anti-semitic aide of Der Fuehrer.

He was told, however, that this was secret and that no one could see the transcript until the sentence has been carried out.

No American official was present at the actual execution.

Hirsch was sentenced last March 20 after a trial under the explosives law.

### JUVENILE HIKERS HAVE PASSPORTS

PORTLAND, June 4.—(AP)—A pair of youthful brothers had a good answer for police when they were arrested on the street after hitchhiking from South Dakota to Oregon.

They carried a letter, notarized by the sheriff of their home county, saying "The bearers are not runaway boys but are hiking to Oregon to meet their father and are supposed to have sufficient funds for food and shelter."

The boys were Rex and Charles Clifton, 13 and 10, respectively, who said they left Deadwood, S. D., last Friday. They had 67 cents between them.

Their father hitch-hiked to Zig Zag on the Mount Hood loop three months ago and a 17-year old son joined him a month ago. The mother and two daughters, 16 and 2, are on their way.

Leonard applied for enlistment at the Medford recruiting office on May 23 and was tentatively accepted on that date. After passing the final army tests he was enlisted on May 28 for service with the army air corps with station at Hamilton field, San Rafael, Calif.
