

PIRATES BUMPED FROM RACE LEAD WHEN GIANTS WIN

NEW YORK, June 7.—(UP)—The Pittsburgh Pirates who had been on top of the National league since May 2 were knocked off their perch today when the New York Giants handed them their fourth straight setback, 9-5.

Rain fell during the last four innings of play and a 30-minute halt had to be called in the ninth. Hal Schumacher, who had held the pirates to eight hits until the delay was relieved by Carl Hubbell who retired the last two men, Blanton, Weaver and Hoyt were reached for 13 hits, including a home run by Gus Mancuso. The Giants went into first with a full game lead.

The Chicago Cubs remained stationary in third place by splitting a double bill with the Boston Bees. Guy Bush, a former Cub, kept 12 hits well scattered to win, 7-1, for Boston in the opener. Berger homered for the Bees.

Leroy Parmelee held the Bees rimeless until the ninth when Gene Moore hit a home run with a man aboard for the Bees only runs as the Cubs won the nightcap, 7-2.

The St. Louis Cards took a doubleheader from the Philadelphia Phillies, winning the first game, 7-2, and being awarded the nightcap on a 9-0 forfeit because of continued stalling by Philly pitchers in the fourth inning when it looked like the curfew law would stop the game before it reached the regulation length of four and one-half complete innings. Two men out in the fifth when umpire Sears declared the forfeit for "dilatory tactics."

Behind the seven hit pitching of Johnny Vandermeer the Cincinnati Reds had no trouble downing the Brooklyn Dodgers, 9-2, after Alex Kampouris banged a home run with the bases loaded in the third inning.

BRADDOCK TAKES A BIRTHDAY REST

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., June 7.—(UP)—Three thousand fight fans here to see James J. Braddock, heavy-weight champion, in training, today saw three champions in the ring at the same time.

Braddock wrestled ten minutes with Everett Marshall, a heavy-weight wrestling champion, with Barney Ross, holder of the welter-weight boxing title, as the third man in the ring.

"He's in perfect shape," Marshall said afterward, when asked about Braddock's condition. "He could step into the ring with Joe Louis right now, instead of waiting until June 22."

Braddock then boxed six rounds. Maxie Roedel, of Dallas, went two rounds with him, Jack McCarthy of Boston, two, and Henry Cooper of Brooklyn and Charlie Massera of Pittsburgh one each.

The champion will celebrate his 31st birthday today at Washington Park race track in Chicago, where James J. Braddock day has been proclaimed.

Braddock also will refrain from boxing on Tuesday, but plans stiff workouts on Wednesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

PORTLAND DROPS PAIR TO PADRES

(By United Press) The Pacific Coast league's largest crowd of the 1937 season, estimated at between 14,000 and 15,000 fans, saw the San Francisco Seals and Sacramento divide a Sunday doubleheader to leave the Seals one game in front of the Oaks.

Both games were bitterly fought, with the Seals winning the opener, 3-1, for Sam Gibson's 11th straight win of the campaign, and Sacramento taking the windup, 4-3, to win the series, four games to three.

San Diego moved from fifth to third with a double win over Portland by scores of 12-1 and 8-5. Lefty Wally Hebert hurried the Padres to their opening win, holding Portland to seven hits. In the windup, the San Diegans came from behind in closing innings to eat Bill Radonics from the mound and win.

Portland won the series, however, four to three.

After the Angels had won the opener, 9-6, by falling on Floyd Olds for five runs in the fifth, Ludolph hurled the Oaks to a 2-1 victory in the nightcap.

The Missions and Seattle divided with Seattle winning the series, five to two. Leroy Herrmann blanked the Indians until the ninth for a 7-1 victory.

In the second game Paul Gregory, Seattle righthander, registered his second win of the series and his seventh of the year with a 6-5 win over the Reds.

COOLER WEATHER STEMS FIRE LOSS

PORTLAND, June 7.—(AP)—Temperature, humidity and the wind slipped back toward normal today and stemmed the ravaging flames riding through the state's forests.

Five hundred fire fighters surrounded flames on the 5000-acre burn near Scappoose. Forest officials could not estimate the damage. The flames cut deeply into valuable second growth timber. The trees would have been ready for market in another ten years.

The 1500-acre fire in the Cobbs-Mitchell logging operation at Valsetz appeared under control. Three hundred men mobilized to check the red menace.

The United States weather bureau forecast a drop in temperatures with an accompanying rise in humidity, thus lessening the fire hazard.

Fog blankets wiped out the fire danger along the coast.

CHISOX WIN TWO; YANKEES BEATEN BY BRIDGES HIT

NEW YORK, June 7.—(UP)—The Chicago White Sox pulled up into a virtual deadlock for second place with Cleveland in the American league by licking the Philadelphia Athletics twice, 6-1 and 6-5. Lyons held the A's to four hits in the opener and effective relief hurrying by Clint Brown saved for second after the Mackmen had scored three times in the last two innings.

The leading Yankees were beaten, 5-4, by the Detroit Tigers. Tommy Bridges, third Detroit pitcher to face the Yanks, drove home the winning run in the ninth with a single to right. Red Ruffing went all the way for New York, giving up nine hits for his first loss. Fox homered with two men on for Detroit, and Joe DiMaggio delivered a roundtripper with one man aboard for New York.

St. Louis and St. Louis split a couple, the Red Sox winning the first, 6-5, with Marcum keeping 12 hits scattered and the Browns taking the finale, 3-2, behind the effective eight-hit hurling of Bonetti.

After the Washington Senators had won the curtain raiser, 8-6, from the Cleveland Indians, rain halted the nightcap in the second inning with the tribe trailing, 4-0. It was the hitting and fielding of Al Simmons that featured the Senator victory. He saved the game in the ninth with a leaping one-handed catch of Otdill Hale's liner against the left field stands, then doubled to start a three-run Washington rally in the tenth. He got another two-bagger and triple in three times at bat. Weaver was the winning pitcher; Harder, the loser.
