FORD PLANT RIOT PROBE CONTINUES; ASK WAGE BOOST

DETROIT, June 8.—(AP)—Accounts of last month's melee at the Ford Motor company plant were sought today from participants on both sides while the North Automobile workers mapped further plans in automotive labor bargaining. Common Pleas Judge Ralph W. Liddy, pursuing his one man grand jury investigation, called into the hearing several union women and two men said to have aided in beating union representatives off Ford property. Attention centered also on the union's projected resumption of negotiations with General Motors corporation for increased concessions in wages and working conditions. One of the "tentative" demands is a blanket wage boost of 10 cents an hour, entailing a \$50,000,000 annual aggregate. Testimony on the May 26 Dearborn plant riot was expected from Oscar Jones, negro, former pugilist, and Wilfred Comment, both of whom Prosecutor Duncan McCrea has said were members of the Ford service department. The investigation seeks to determine whether employees of the service department, also known as plant "police" had a hand in routing unionists from Ford property. Harry H. Bennett, Ford personnel director who testified briefly yesterday, has denied that service men took part in the fight attendant upon the union's effort to circularize plant workers. Edsel Ford, company president, will testify upon his return from an eastern business trip.
