

SOCIAL SECURITY DECISION SPURS 800 DELINQUENTS

2000 Employers in State Ignore Filing Reports — 11,309 Make Returns

PORTLAND, June 9.—(Sp.)—Collector of Internal Revenue J. W. Maloney today revealed that the supreme court decision upholding the validity of the social security act prompted approximately 800 delinquent taxpayers in his district to make returns under the provisions of titles VIII and IX of that act. The latest payments totaled \$1,059,325.57. Figures in the collector's office showed that 11,309 employers filed treasury form SSI in behalf of themselves and their employees, paying \$273,092.10 in taxes on the wages earned in this district during the month of May. This tax is levied under title VIII of the social security act, which imposes an income tax of one per cent on wages of "every taxable individual" and on "every taxable employer" an excise tax of one per cent on the wages he pays each of his employees.

In estimating that an additional 2000 employers were still ignoring the fact that they must pay the one per cent wage tax due from every employer and employee, Collector Maloney pointed out that the law makes the employer alone subject to penalties for failure to file returns and make payments. The employer is also responsible for the collection of his employee's share of the tax, deducting it from the weekly wages paid.

"Employers of eight or more persons who have not yet filed treasury form 940 and paid the excise tax of one per cent on their 1936 pay roll, as called for under title IX of the social security act, have already incurred a 10 per cent penalty," Mr. Maloney said. "There is no excuse for continued delinquency under title IX. Ample notice is given employers of eight or more that this tax was due from them, and them alone, at the latest, last April 1. The employee does not pay any of this tax."

"Only 2616 employers have paid taxes under the provisions of title IX and I estimate that this falls short at least 20 per cent of the actual number of employers of eight or more persons in this district. When my deputies, in the course of their investigations, discover these delinquents not only the tax but the penalties will be assessed against them. It would be well for this type of employer to remember that officers of corporations are counted as employees for the purpose of taxation."

SAGINAW VALLEY TOWNS LIGHTLESS

FLINT, Mich., June 9.—(AP)—More than 300,000 residents of the Saginaw valley, affected by a strike of Consumers Power company employees, remained without electric service today despite announcement by John L. Lewis in Washington that a settlement had been reached. The strikers indicated service would not be fully restored until their negotiations committee returns from Washington to report the terms of settlement. That will not be until late afternoon.

GREAT CIO GAINS MADE THIS STATE, LEWIS AIDE SAYS

PORTLAND, June 9.—(AP)—Four labor chiefs, describing the committee for industrial organization as the "hope of the American worker," gave the public its first direct report of the C. I. O. drive into the far western territory of the American Federation of Labor at a mass meeting last night.

John Brophy, right hand representative for John L. Lewis, said the C. I. O. had made greater strides in the past six months than William Green's A. F. of L. had in half a century.

Harry Bridges, outspoken leader of the Pacific Coast longshoremen, attacked the teamsters' union for "attempting to defeat the purpose of the I. L. A. warehouse unit."

Bridges, eager to swing the maritime workers away from the A. F. of L., said a dispute such as the one occurring at the Meier and Frank delivery depot could not develop under the C. I. O. The Portland central labor council, acting upon instructions from Green, unseated the I. L. A. warehousemen for refusing to give up jurisdiction at inland warehouses to the teamster brotherhood.

Harold Pritchett, head of the woodworkers' federation, predicted 90 per cent of the northwest lumber employees would join the Lewis organization.

Joe Curran of New York declared the old A. F. of L. sailors' union virtually defunct and that the new national maritime union has 38,000 east coast members who are "bound to affiliate with the C. I. O."

GENERAL MOTORS HITLER ARRANGES FACES NEW WAGE, SURPRISE SPEECH STRIKE PROBLEM IN EAST PRUSSIA

DETROIT, June 9.—(AP)—The first committee for industrial organization strike in the Ternstedt Manufacturing company gave General Motors Corporation another labor problem today.

Two of the eleven Ternstedt plants here were closed by a sit-down which began late yesterday. The company, which manufactures automobile hardware for the parent corporation, has approximately 12,000 employees altogether.

But how many of these were affected by the strike was not known. Reports were that about 3,500 workers on afternoon shifts sat down.

Walter Reuther, president of the west side local of the United Automobile Workers of America, CIO affiliate which has an agreement with General Motors, said the strike was a protest against delay in eliminating the piece-work system and making wage adjustments.

Another automotive plant the Bud West company, also was closed by a strike. About 1,500 of its 2,600 workers walked out yesterday.

The strike, said Loren Houser, UAWA organizer, was due to failure of negotiations to result in abolition of piece-work.

The two strikes were the only spectacular activity along Detroit's turbulent auto-labor front, but interest still was focused on a grand jury investigation of the Ford riot two weeks ago today and agitation for a rent strike in Detroit.

RANGE PROGRAMS IN STATE HELPFUL

CORVALLIS, June 9.—(AP)—The 1936 range program under the agricultural adjustment administration has developed springs and wells in Oregon, constructed fences and encouraged substantial reseeded, a preliminary report showed today.

The improvements have greatly aided utilization of land by providing additional watering places. Workmen have developed approximately 1800 springs.

Six hundred miles of fence aid in controlling grazing herds and 16,000 acres of depleted range are coming into use with new grasses.

The 1937 program keeps stock off certain areas while the grass rehabilitates itself.

The state office reported a large number of cooperators in all sections of Oregon.

HITLER ARRANGES SURPRISE SPEECH IN EAST PRUSSIA

MARIENWERDER, East Prussia, Germany, June 9.—(AP)—The high command of the Nazi party was reported today to have completed plans for a June 19 "Surprise Saturday" speech by Adolf Hitler in a Teutonic knights' castle on the frontier of the free state of Danzig.

Probably confidential, the speech is expected to deal with the problem of Germany's war-created frontiers. These frontiers separated East Prussia from Germany by creation of a Polish corridor with the free city as its geographical head.

But Nazis now dominate the government of little Danzig, land of Teutonic knight conquest of six centuries ago.

A volume of speculation surrounds the news of the coming of Hitler and incident reports of recent mass German troop movements.

An indiscreet county Nazi leader first disclosed the "surprise Saturday" coming of the Fuehrer and 600 high Nazis and started a wave of speculation involving the future of both the free city of Danzig and Polish Silesia.

As indiscreet reports of military massings in East Prussia and just west of the Polish corridor that divides the Nazi Reich.

On the day prior to the address, Rudolf Hess, Robert Ley and other sub-leaders of Germany will visit the free city. Hitler himself will not go there.

Only yesterday, it was learned.

Heinrich Himmler, chief of all German police, appeared unannounced in Danzig and inspected "SS" (Schutz Staffel bodyguard) formations numbering 9000 men.

It was believed he had made police arrangements for the coming of the Nazi bigwig.

Nazi lips generally were sealed after the premature announcement in a Marienwerder newspaper, and for a time it was thought the publicity might have caused a cancellation of the proposed visit.

Higher-ups were flabbergasted because there is a rule that impending Hitler visits to any part of Germany must be kept secret.

SPANISH REBELS BLAMED FOR LOSS BRITISH SEAMEN

Great Britain blamed the Spanish insurgents today for the death of eight British seamen and the wounding of 24 on May 13, when the British destroyer Hunter struck a mine off southeastern Spain.

The London government ordered its ambassador to Spain, Sir Henry Chilton, to protest to Generalissimo Francisco Franco's administration at Salamanca and reserved the right to claim damages.

It said the explosion was "accidental," but a spokesman declared the government understood the insurgents had laid mines in the high seas off Almeria, the scene of the blast, and in other places, and that the Hunter hit one of them.

Incidents of similar nature were in part responsible for withdrawal of Italy and Germany from the international neutral naval patrol of Spain. But there was no indication Britain would follow their example.

Instead, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden was working to bring both the fascist powers back into the neutrality group. In Berlin, official sources predicted Germany and Italy would rejoin the naval patrol by the end of the week.

They left the international organization May 31, the day German warships shelled Almeria, Spanish government port. The previous week, the German pocket battleship Deutschland and the Italian auxiliary vessel Barletta had been bombed by Spanish government planes.

On the Spanish war front, government soldiers strengthened newly-won position on the northwestern edge of Madrid, besieged since last November.

Along the Mediterranean coast, the government stationed a special vigilance fleet and anti-submarine defense, on the heels of two days' shelling of coastal points by insurgent warships.
