

RAIN HITS GRAIN OVERLOAD, SPEED, HAY, STRAWBERRY LACK OF LICENSE, CROP OF VALLEY NET COURT FINES

Moisture Does More Good Than Harm, Says Fowler — Deficiency Is Cut.

Some damage to hay and fall grain crops of the valley has resulted from heavy rainfall of the past few days, County Agent R. O. Fowler stated today. Extent of the damage cannot be immediately determined, Fowler said.

The heavy downpours have knocked down grain in all parts of the valley but portions of the crop may recover, it was pointed out. The precipitation has been of aid to truck farmers for the most part, Fowler said, except in the case of strawberries which have suffered to varying degrees. No orchard damage has been noted.

The rain has been more beneficial than harmful, Fowler concluded.

Over half an inch of rain fell yesterday and last night, this morning's weather report stated. Continued rain was expected in the forecast of unsettled weather tonight and Friday with showers tonight and slightly warmer Friday.

Yesterday's rain reduced the seasonal precipitation deficiency to its lowest point since October, 1.09 inches. A total of 15.22 inches has fallen since September 1 and a June total of 1.08 inches is recorded, bringing a monthly excess of .81 of an inch.

Weather officials stated that, while the amount of rain thus far in June is not unusual, a continued downpour such as that of the last few days is not generally expected at this time of year. Precipitation during this month ordinarily takes the form of thunder showers or heavy falls of very short duration, weather men report.

Paul G. Manning, 36, of San Francisco, driver for the Pacific Truck Express company was fined \$20 and \$4.50 costs by Judge William R. Coleman in justice of the peace court this morning for operating an overloaded truck.

His truck was weighed by state police yesterday on the scales south of Medford when Manning was en route from Portland to Redding with a load of produce. His legal limit of 48,500 pounds was overweight by 8,700 pounds, police told the court.

Ketel L. Paris, 32, Roseburg, also a driver for the Pacific Truck Express company was fined \$5 and costs yesterday for speeding at 48 to 50 miles an hour while he was traveling north on Pacific highway near Phoenix.

E. G. Coleman, employed at the company's office here, appeared for both Manning and Paris and entered pleas of guilty.

John L. Rogers, 49, an itinerant, was fined \$1 and costs this morning for operating a truck without a driver's license. He pleaded guilty and was given until July 1 to pay.

Rogers and his family were traveling north from California in the truck on which was constructed a house. He was pouring gasoline from a jug into the tank near Phoenix yesterday when a state trooper stopped to offer assistance and discovered that Rogers had no operator's license.

Rogers was quoted as saying he would stop in Medford for the night and he was given a citation to justice court. He continued north, however, and was arrested near Rogue River, police reported. Rogers told the court he would return to California and go to work. He said he had simply neglected to get a license in California where a driver's license may be procured without cost.

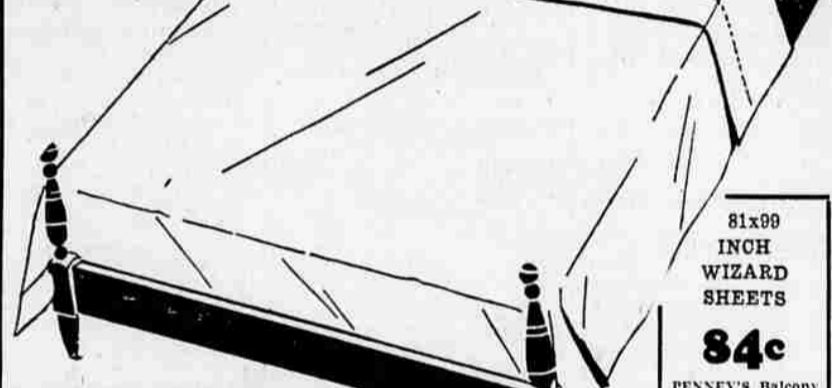
