### SENATE TO OKAY BONNEVILLE BOSS

WASHINGTON, June 10.—(AP)—The house river and harbors committee tentatively rejected today a proposal to make the appointment of an administrator who would have charge of sale and distribution of Bonneville dam power subject to senate confirmation.

It reaffirmed a decision reached yesterday to divide authority over the project at the switchboard by adopting language placing administration of the dam, locks and power generating facilities under the war department.

Chairman Mansfield (D, Tex.) said the latter action virtually assured retention of this feature of the legislation in the committee bill he would introduce.

"We have been getting lots of telegrams opposing this so-called division of authority," Mansfield told reporters.
