FERRELL BOYS, ONE HURT, OTHER NOT GOING GOOD, SOLD

Washington Mound Ace, Who Talks Like Dizzy, and Chapman Join Boston

BOSTON, June 10. — (AP) — Eddie Collins, general manager of the Boston Red Sox, today announced a "straight swap" of Wes and Rick Ferrell and Melo Almada of the Sox for "Buck" Newsum and Ben Chapman of the Washington Senators.

The Ferris form the only brother battery in major league baseball. Wes won 20 games for the Sox last year, but has been going poorly this season. Catcher Rick Ferrell is at present out of the game, recovering from a broken hand.

"Buck" Newsum was a mainstay of the Senators last year, winning 17 games.

Some have called Newsum the Dizzy Dean of the American league because of his volucious statements.

Almada recently has been patrolling center field for the Red Sox, filling in for Cramer, also out with a lame wrist. Earlier he replaced the ailing Jimmy Fox at first base for the Sox. Recently he has been in a batting slump.

Chapman, speedy outfielder for the Senators, was obtained by them from the New York Yankees last year in exchange for Jake Powell. He batted .318 for Washington last season, and is recognized as one of the best basemen in the league.

VILLIANS TANGLE ON ARMORY CARD; TAYLOR RETURNS

The bitterest grappling feud in southern Oregon will be resumed next Monday night in the Medford armory when Pete Belcastro and Joe Smolinaki face each other in a no-referee, no-time-limit squabble billed for the middle event.

Frankie Taylor, an old favorite, will return after over a year's absence, to tangle with Cowboy Duke Dick in the main event. Promoter Lillard states that Taylor is a vastly improved grappler, and weighs about 205 pounds now. He is an ex-Ohio State football star.

In the opening bout, Sailor Dick Trout will get another crack at Monte LaDue, the dirty Frenchman who almost broke his leg two weeks ago to win in straight falls.

Last Monday, Belcastro and Smolinaki put on the greatest exhibition of plain and fancy brawling ever seen in the local ring, with the Mad Italian winding things up by clouting the Polish Patooka over the head with a chair, breaking the furniture in a hundred pieces and apparently making little serious impression on the Patooka's cranium other than momentarily stunning him.

Following the fracas, which had a huge crowd in hysterics, Smolinaki said, "There's only one thing I want. And that is to get that wop in the ring again. I'll beat him to a pulp."

Promoter Lillard said that there would be no referee in the ring to interfere with the expected mayhem. The official will be outside the arena and make himself known only when the two meemies become entangled in the ropes, or fight themselves into the spectators. The only way a fall will be called will be for one grappler to shout uncle.

There will be no time limit to the match, the "dirty" boys going until it is proved one, and for all just which is the tougher.

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BLACK BOMBER IN AUTO MISHAP; TO GET GOING OVER

Illinois Board to Stage Physical Exam — Louis' Workouts Unimpressive

CHICAGO, June 10. — (AP) — Joe Louis was due for a double-barreled going over—including an official search for automobile accident injuries—by the Illinois state athletic commission today at his Kenosha, Wis., training quarters.

Chairman Joe Triner, George Getz and Dr. Frank Lagoria, the commission's physician, had planned to devote this afternoon to seeing for themselves how far the brown bomber has progressed in preparing himself for the battle with Champion James J. Braddock at Comiskey Park June 22.

The visit assumed more serious proportions after Louis' automobile, with the bomber himself aboard, rammed another car after yesterday's light workout. Triner was assured by telephone that the negro challenger had escaped injury but wanted to have Dr. Lagoria's professional judgment. The mishap occurred when Louis' car, driven by Carl Nelson, negro policeman-bodyguard, crashed into one operated by Davis E. Hamilton for the battle with Champion James J. Braddock at Comiskey Park June 22.

CHICAGO PROS TIE; SHOOT BELOW PAR ON FIRST ROUND

BIRMINGHAM, Mich., June 10. — (AP) — Ripping two shots from par as they toured the rain-soaked course together in sensational style, big Ed Dudley of Philadelphia and Frank Walsh, rival Chicago pro, passed a pair of 70's today to take the lead in the first round of the U. S. open golf championship at the Oakland Hills Country club.

Dudley missed a five-foot putt on the home green for a chance to gain the lead. Big Ed's round included an eagle on the 491-yard eighth, where he dropped a 15-foot putt. He three-putted the fifth and missed a putt of barely a yard on the 14th but got birdies on the 13th and 16th as well as the home hole.

Walsh finished sensationally with an incoming 34, two under par, thanks to birdies on the 13th, 16th and 18th. His putting offset some wildness off the tees.

Walsh and Dudley took the pace-setting spot from Mike Turnesa, Elmford, N. Y., who came home with a sub-par 35-36-71.

Turnesa, playing so steadily he was never off the fairway, dropped an eight-foot putt for a birdie on the 18th to slice a stroke off par, under weather conditions that found a big majority of the early starters in trouble.

Tony Manero of Peabody, Mass., the defending champion, apparently was feeling the title pressure as he shot the outgoing nine in 38, one over par. Tony steadied after a bad start. He dropped a 12-foot putt for a birdie on the eighth to help make up for mistakes on three of the first four holes.

Orville Framsted, Crescent City's speedy outfielder, took over the Southern Oregon league batting leadership last Sunday as a result of two hits against Grants Pass. He boasts a mark of .533 from 8 hits in 15 trips to the plate.

Earl Ray, Grants Pass leftfielder, jumped from tenth to second by getting two hits in three tries in the same game. He is hitting at a .438 clip. Lefty Baker leads the Roseburg Pirates with .409; Don Montgomery heads Ashland batters with a mark of .400; Stewart leads Glendale with .364, and Dick Hoffman has the best average of Medford hitters with .357.

Ray also leads all others in runs scored. He has dented the plate seven times.

Lefty Koll and Ralph Deo, both of Crescent City, have won three and two games respectively with no defects to head all pitchers. Bob Hardy, Ashland, Carpenter, Glendale, and Tynan, Roseburg, have all won a single game and lost none. Phil Griga, Grants Pass righthander, has worked in the most games, winning three and dropping two.

FANS JEER DIZZY, REMAIN TO CHEER; 'GREAT CARL' SLIPS

They laugh one day and cheer the next—depending on whether Dizzy Dean is popping off or pitching.

When he's doing the former, the folks seem to forget about his elbowing ability, and look on him as sort of a side-show.

But when he gets out there on that hill, and really puts his mind to foggin' 'em in, as he did yesterday in pinning back the ears of Carl Hubbell and the New York Giants, the crowd tips its hat.

From the greeting Dizzy received before yesterday's game, it begins to appear that the faithful, generally, and the New York fans in particular, are getting mighty tired of his outbursts.

A packed polo grounds let out one big "boo" and followed it up with a varied assortment of jeers for most of the game. But when it was all over, and Dizzy had polished off the Giants with three hits and one unearned run, the crowd roared approval of the pitching perfection he displayed in the opener of the doubleheader.

Outside of Dizzy's top-flight flinging, the double bill, and particularly the advertised Hubbell-Dean duel, produced two outstanding developments.

1. That the promise of a fight will still pack them in anywhere;

2. That something serious is happening to Hubbell, who less than two weeks ago was being hailed as invincible.

The Hub-Diz rivalry was supposed to repeat a performance of last month's "battle of St. Louis" when Dean's "duster" precipitated a general free-for-all in his last meeting with Hubbell and the Giants.

A near record week crowd of 55,000 paid its way in to see yesterday's doings. They didn't get any first swinging, but they were treated to a flock of baseball as the Giants followed up the opener defeat to take the nightcap 3-2 on Harry Danning's ninth inning pinch homer, to hang onto the league lead.

The real winner, however, was Horace Stoneham, and the Giants front office had a lot of fun counting the gate.

The opening game marked the fourth straight time Hubbell has been baited out. A week ago Monday the Dodgers ended his record string of 24 straight. Yesterday the Cards clouted him for 13 hits in eight innings. Things don't look altogether hopeful for Bill Terry and his terriers.

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Trojans Favored to Win Team Honors

BERKELEY, CAL., June 10. — (AP) — University of Southern California's Trojans were favored today to take team honors in the national collegiate A. A. track and field championships without difficulty, June 18 and 19, after the withdrawal of Don Lash, University of Indiana's great miler.

Lash had been favored to win both the mile and two-mile runs and the points he was expected to earn figured to place Indiana at or near the top of the list. Lash passed up the N. C. A. A. meet for an invitational affair at Princeton the same week-end.

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
