exhibit after the pictures of the body had been removed from the photos. In rebuttal testimony for the state Capt. Lee M. Bown of the state police identified a transcript of a statement made and signed by Fields when he was questioned after the shooting. Capt. Bown testified that Fields had said Mow pulled off his hat and coat and threw them on the floor. In his testimony Fields declared he did not know what Mow did with the hat and coat after he had taken them off.

Capt. Bown also testified that Fields had stated that the boys had popcorn. The defendant denied that he saw any popcorn or that one of his sons threw a bag of popcorn at him after the shooting.

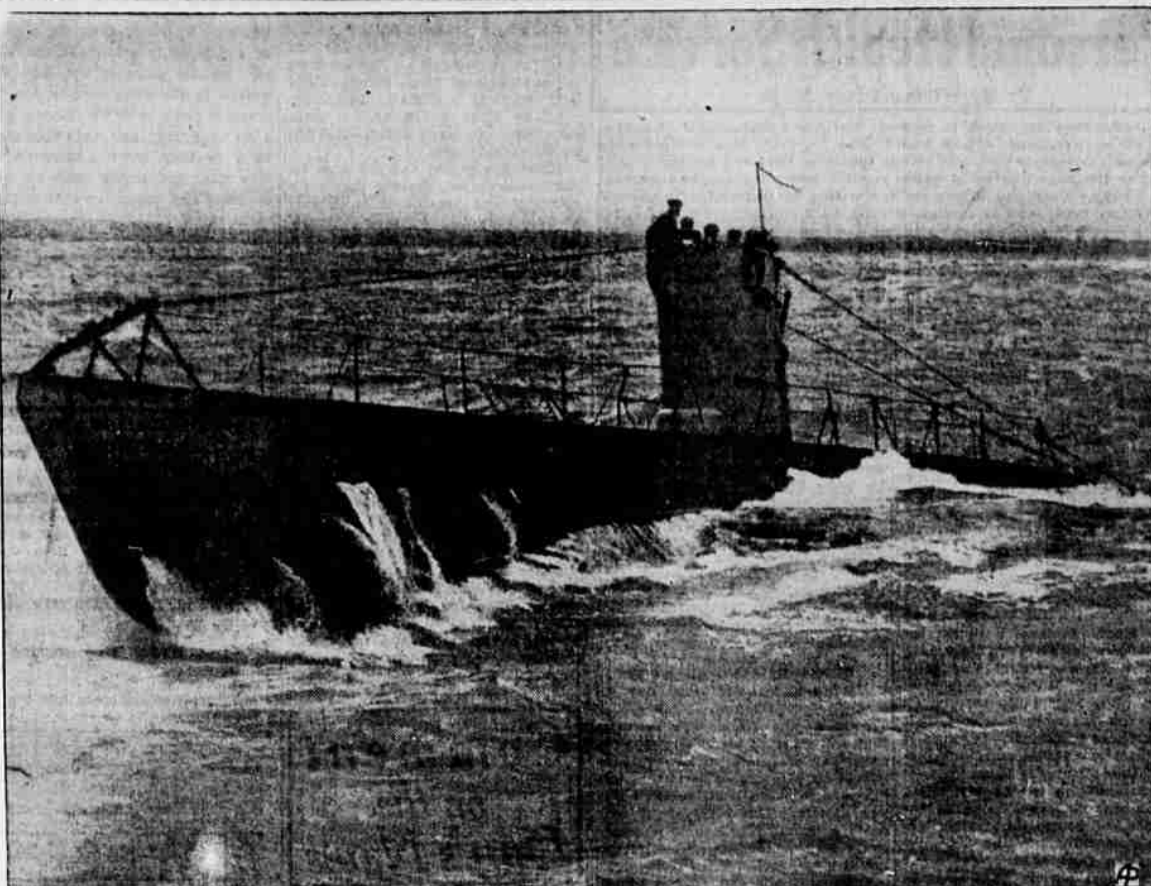
William H. Fields, 15-year-old son, said in rebuttal testimony that his father, while cleaning a revolver one day at their Ashland home as Mow passed the house, asserted he would shoot Mow if he did not fear hitting someone in the street. He also testified that his father once chased Mow in Ashland with a baseball bat. In cross-examination Fields denied both accusations.

Under cross-examination Fields said he did not recall making any statements regarding popcorn or what Mow had done with his hat and coat.

Fields admitted he had once slapped his wife when she doubted his statement that he had not received his pay check, she saying that Mow had told her he had been paid. Granting that he had hit her "pretty hard" Fields said he went to see Police Chief Charles P. Talent of Ashland to ask him if he had done wrong. He quoted Talent as saying: "If you had done that long ago you'd be better off today." This statement caused the audience to laugh.

Fields acknowledged that he was jealous of his wife, saying: "There isn't a woman I think more of."

Both sides rested late yesterday afternoon and George W. Nelson, assistant district attorney, began summation for the state. Summations were resumed this morning.

52 FIRE GUARDS, LOOKOUTS LEAVE FOR FOREST POSTS

About 52 fire guards and lookouts dispersed to summer positions in the Rogue River national forest today following completion of the 3-day fire guard training camp conducted Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at the Carberry CCC camp.

About 70 persons, including instructors, visitors and guards attended. H. C. Obye, assistant supervisor in charge of fire control of the forest, was in charge of the camp session. Instruction at the annual school centered on best and latest methods of fire detection, control and suppression. The fire guards for whom the camp is conducted make up the summer fire protective force in the Rogue River forest.

Due to the rainy weather now pre-

vailing, a number were not sent directly to lookout stations but will be employed on trail, telephone and other maintenance work until a weather change brings fire danger, Obye said.

Instructors at the camp included Superintendent Karl Janouch; Paul Brinson, junior forester; Rangers J. P. DeWitt, Simeri Jarvi, Lee C. Port and Hugh Ritter; and Owen Aydelott, assistant ranger, besides Obye.

A feature of the camp was the appearance of outside speakers at Monday and Tuesday evening meetings. Monday night speakers were Sgt. William Ellenberg of the local state police force who spoke on game law enforcement and Dr. Charles Kinsolving of the Applegate CCC camp who discussed first aid.

Coyie Briggs, local official of the Standard Oil company, addressed the lookouts Tuesday night on salesmanship as applied to forestry.

SWIM POOL DEATH HELD ACCIDENTAL BY CORONER JURY

(Continued from Page One.) R. H. Cadwallader, his father, testified that young Howard could not swim a stroke.

It was brought out that, contrary to report, Howard had not suffered an attack of spinal meningitis last year, but had had a light case of smallpox. An autopsy performed later the following day indicated his heart was in good condition. Several bruises were discovered on his head, but it was impossible to determine whether he had received them Saturday in the swimming tank or whether they were received previously.

Witnesses who testified were J. C. Johnson, investigating state police officer; Dr. W. G. Bishop, who pro-

nounced Howard dead on arriving on the scene a few minutes after the youth was taken from the water; Dr. William F. Holt; Dorothea Moore, Rodney Ford, Harold Farmer and G. F. Hancock, CCC boys who helped administer artificial respiration; Ed York, a friend; Elmer Settell; Mrs. Ora L. Fowler, manager of the Natatorium; Gerald Fowler, junior lifeguard; Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Cadwallader; Kathryn Mead, head manager at the pool; Louise Klumpff; George Dennani; and Emerson Merrick, owner of the Natatorium.
