DUST BOWL FOLKS CHEERED BY RAIN; HOLD HIGH HOPES

BOISE CITY, Okla., June 10.—(AP)—Rain is splashing in the "dust bowl" but the question mark still hangs over this problem area. The people all say rain will bring this country back, but no one is certain. The dust still blows. These are the high southern plains and the atmosphere is greasy for moisture. Sweeping winds quickly absorb top soil moisture and soon dust is swirling upward and on-ward. But for these people dust is easy to take if it rolls in between rain storms, or even showers. Within three weeks, rains - variously estimated today at from 3 to 10 inches - have fallen. The people have new hope. They have their chins up now.

The "dust bowl," government agencies say, constitutes a 90,779,555 acre expanse, 102 counties in parts of Oklahoma, Texas, Kansas, Colorado and New Mexico, although the worst area is in 12 counties in the corner of each of the five states. The large area accounts for the variance in rainfall.

ORDER PROBE OF RELIEF POLICIES

WASHINGTON, June 10.—(AP)—The senate authorized today creation of a special committee to investigate unemployment and relief policies and to formulate permanent programs for handling them.

Without a record vote, the senate approved a recommendation of its audit committee to appropriate \$10,000 for the purpose. The inquiry will be made by a special committee of five. The resolution proposing the inquiry was offered by Senator Hatch (D-NM), who has been seeking action on it for more than a year.

It would authorize Vice President Garner to name the committee to investigate "problems of unemployment and relief, including an estimate of the number of persons now unemployed by reason of labor saving devices, mechanical and otherwise."

The committee would be directed to obtain all facts possible related to the problems to aid congress in enacting corrective legislation.

WHEAT CROP BEST IN SEVEN YEARS

WASHINGTON, June 10.—(AP)—The agricultural department estimated the 1937 wheat crop today at between 824,000,000 and 849,000,000 bushels, one of the largest crops in seven years.

The department's crop reporting board, in its first glance of the season at the prospective crop, estimated winter wheat would amount to 648,397,000 bushels.

It made a rough estimate on the basis of intended acreage that probable production of all spring wheat would be between 173,000,000 and 200,000,000 bushels.

The predicted production of winter wheat would compare with a crop of 519,013,000 bushels in 1936 and a five-year average of 623,220,000 bushels.

Last year's spring wheat production was 107,448,000 bushels and the five-year average was 241,312,000 bushels.
