

LUCKNER SAILS ON PEACE TRIP AROUND WORLD

Wartime German Raider Expects to See Ex-Prison Mates in New Zealand—Plans Lecture Programs

HAMBURG.—(UP)—Count Felix Luckner, famous German wartime raider, who has departed on a world cruise in his new sailing vessel, Seeteufel, is looking forward to shaking hands with his old friends of "prison days" in New Zealand.

"The 'lifers,'" Count Luckner said, "I expect will still be there." He referred to prisoners he knew while an inmate of a New Zealand prison when re-captured following his escape. "These men were serving life terms. 'After all,' Luckner added, 'they were fairly good company, and I wish to shake hands with them again.'"

After his visit to New Zealand, Count Luckner will proceed to Australia where the Australian Boy Scouts have organized an extensive lecture tour for him.

Where Luckner will go from Australia is not definite yet. "It may be to South, Central or North America," he said.

May Visit Panama. His route as mapped thus far includes:

The Azores, the Island of Saba in the West Indies, the Panama Canal, the Cocos Islands, the Galapagos, one of the Pitcairn Islands, Tonga, the Fiji Islands, Samoa, New Zealand and Australia.

"I always wanted to visit the Island of Saba because of its scenic beauty," Luckner declared, adding that he had heard so much from friends who knew this picturesque out-of-the-way place.

At the Galapagos, Luckner wants to try his hand at "manu" hunting and wants to harpoon a few sharks. Thence he will set sail for one of the Pitcairn Islands.

From Pitcairn, Luckner will visit the former German colony of Samoa. "Wherever I go I shall deliver lectures on Germany's will for peace," he said.

Luckner's new Seeteufel is a 200-ton sailing vessel equipped with auxiliary motor and with nautical instruments and wireless sets which are the last word in these fields. The Seeteufel formerly was an Icelandic fishing craft. It has been remodelled according to the plans of Luckner and of his first officer, Kreuger. Luckner is particularly proud of the "air-conditioned" stateroom and cabins.

The crew of the Seeteufel will number eight and there will be two passengers, Countess Luckner, who has accompanied her husband on most of his cruises after the war, and Mrs. Kreuger, the wife of the first officer.

Count Luckner was the scourge of merchant shipping over the world during the war. He slipped through the Allied blockade in the North sea in a disguised windjammer and was said to have destroyed half a million tons of Allied shipping.

HARLOW'S BODY TO MAUSOLEUM REST

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., June 11.—(AP)—Jean Harlow's body will be interred in the mausoleum at Forest Lawn Memorial park, a spokesman for her family said today.

The decision was reached after the star's mother, Mrs. Marino Bello, her father, Dr. Montclair Carpenter, her aunt, Miss Jettie, visited Miss Harlow's coffin last night.

Death came to the actress Monday, induced by uremic poisoning. Since her funeral Wednesday, the body has remained in a temporary vault at the memorial park. There will be no further services, it was stated.

HEAVY RAINS IN HILLS PAST WEEK SLOWS UP FISHING

The following recreational bulletin was issued today by Rogue River national forest headquarters:

"Heavy rains have fallen generally over the entire forest during the past three days, with probably the heaviest precipitation at Lake of the Woods, where two inches have been recorded. This has raised all streams flowing from the forest and consequently the prospects for stream fishing for the next two or three days are poor.

"All side roads leading from the highway above Prospect are muddy and unsafe for travel. Forest camps in the Union Creek area are ready for use. The Diamond Lake highway is in good condition. Fishing is reported good at Diamond Lake.

"Fishing is expected to be poor in the Applegate streams this weekend. Roads into the higher country are muddy and the Ashland peak loop remains closed by snow.

"Fish lake has been yielding some good catches of eastern brook trout during the past few days and is expected to remain good. Some limited catches of silverides have been made at Lake of the Woods recently. Roads in this section are again in very poor condition but passable. The Dead Indian road leading from Ashland to Lake of the Woods has not yet been opened. It may be traveled to Deadwood, thence to Lake of the Woods by Big Elk and Fish lake.

"Fishing at Upper Klamath lake near Rocky Point has been fair to good during the past week, depending largely on weather conditions. Several good catches of bass and sunfish have been taken at Hyatt lake recently and it is expected to remain good for some time.

Sheriff Syd I. Brown was notified of the robbery this morning. LONDON, June 11.—(AP)—Ernest Aldrich Simpson kissed the Bible in King's court today and swore a voluntary oath that he had received not a cent to stand aside in the divorce that freed Wallis Warfield to marry his former monarch, Edward of Windsor.

Emphatically, in clipped phrases, the mild-mannered ship broker declared he had not been paid and that he had not received a promise of money or other consideration for failing to defend the action brought by his American-born former wife.

His avowal was followed promptly by an apology from Mrs. Joan Sutherland, through her counsel, and withdrawal of Simpson's suit accusing her of slanderously repeating gossip that

HOLD HICKS FOR STEALING SADDLE

Leo F. Hicks, 34, of Lakeview was in Jackson county jail today awaiting trial in district court for the alleged larceny of a saddle, chaps and rawhide rope owned by E. W. Kubil of Applegate.

Hicks was indicted secretly for grand larceny by the grand jury on May 25. He was arrested Tuesday at Lakeview by Sheriff Herbert H. Carroll of Lake county and brought here Wednesday by Sheriff Syd I. Brown.

Arraigned yesterday before Judge H. D. Norton, Hicks pleaded not guilty and bail was set at \$1000. The alleged theft occurred last January 6. Sheriff Brown quoted Hicks as saying he bought the saddle chaps and rope, valued at \$125, from a man he did not know.

BETTER TONE FOR WOOL MART SEEN

BOSTON, June 11.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"There is a little better tone in the wool market today, due chiefly to the increased interest in medium wools, especially in the bright wool steaks. Where operations are more active, it would be difficult today to produce much merchantable medium bright wool of the Ohio-Michigan type at less than 41 cents delivered basis. There has been some buying in Texas of fine 12 months clips at 92-95 cents, clean basis, landed mills.

"In the Boston market, there has been comparatively little business done, although pullers report bids nearer to their ideas of value on short combing wools of the finer type. New business in piecegoods is limited but the backlog of orders at the mills is still fairly substantial.

"Foreign markets are rather slow. Australian clearance sales this week were 5 to 7 1/2 below the close of the regular season, as was also the Liverpool East India sale.

"Mohair is slow but very firm." The bulletin will publish the following quotations:

Scoured basis: Oregon, Fine and F. M. staple 97-98; fine and F. M. clothing 99-92.

Mohair: Oregon, 65, 67 cents.
