OR take the matter of developing Medford as a convention city. Conventions don't just come of their own accord.

As a result of its energy and intelligence in this direction, the local chamber has made Medford one of the most popular convention cities in the entire state.

For example: From the 20th to the 23d of this month, the state convention of the Lions club will be held here, immediately after, from the 24th to the 26th, Medford will be host to the Oregon State Fire Chiefs association.

Other conventions scheduled during the year include: the State Spanish War Veterans; the State Horticultural society; the Oregon State Fire Insurance Agents association, etc., etc.

Now what do these conventions mean? They mean invaluable advertising throughout the state, for Medford and Jackson county, they mean thousands of dollars distributed here from which every individual in the community, directly or indirectly, benefits.

And if it were not for the chamber of commerce these profits would not be enjoyed,—at least not to the extent they are enjoyed. This isn't ballyhoo, it's a plain statement of fact.

THERE is an old saying the good servant is worthy of his hire. Well the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce has been a good servant to the people of Medford and surrounding territory during recent years and is worthy of enthusiastic support, moral and financial, from ALL.

How About Civil Service?

TOMORROW Dr. Leonard D. White leaves Washington and returns to his chair at the University of Chicago.

Who in heck is Dr. Leonard D. White? Oh he's another one of those "perfersers."

But he happens also to be a Republican—or was at last report,—and for the past three years has been Commissioner of Civil Service in the Roosevelt administration.

THERE is a general idea abroad—or was during the last campaign—that one James Aloysius Farley, P.M.G., destroyed the civil service, some time ago, and if any deserving person wishes a government job of any importance he must be a 100% Roosevelt man first, and a good friend of some influential Democratic congressman, second.

According to press dispatches Dr. White believes otherwise. He grants the practically-minded James would like to do that very thing, but thanks to President Roosevelt's opposition, and his devotion, to the principle of the "merit system," Jim hasn't been able to get as far as is popularly supposed,—and there is little chance of his ever doing so.

DR. WHITE in his three years of service has accomplished two important things. He inaugurated junior civil service examinations and he established a federal system of "in service" training.

Only college graduates are eligible to the junior civil service examinations, the men getting the highest ratings get the jobs. Nearly 8000 young men took the first test two years ago, and only 3000 were accepted, political affiliations were not mentioned. In the second examination 22,000 took the examinations, 8000 were accepted. Salaries started at a minimum of \$1620 a year.

Other words in the last three years, 11,000 young men have secured government jobs in the Roosevelt administration, selected solely on merit with no regard for political pull or political affiliations.

More than that, Dr. White also established a system whereby these young men in the public service, can be trained during that service, at the American university in Washington and thus secure promotion, a long step toward a permanent and efficient civil service SYSTEM.

THERE are always two sides to a question although in politics too frequently only one side is known.

A great deal has been said about Farleyism in the administration. Nothing about the accomplishments of Dr. White.

We think it only fair—and an aid to a true understanding of the real situation,—to balance up the Farley black, with a dash of the Leonard D. White.
