

LABOR OPPOSITION ELIMINATES LUSK FROM JUDGESHIP

McColloch, State Democratic Chairman, Has Inside Track for Federal Plum

PORTLAND, June 11.—(AP)—Information from the national capital today left many supporters of Claude McColloch, Klamath Falls attorney and state democratic chairman, will succeed the late Judge John McNary on the federal bench.

A special dispatch from the Oregonian's Washington bureau, said Attorney General Homer Cummings and Postmaster General James Farley cleared the Klamath man's name and would send it to President Roosevelt today or next week.

Although Cummings said, labor's opposition was not a deciding factor, Judge Hall Lusk of Portland has taken second place to the democratic leader, Senator Berry of Tennessee wired Ben T. Osborne, secretary of the state federation of labor, that the name of Henry Hess, La Grande, had been eliminated and urged labor to support McCulloch.

"First, last and always, we are against Lusk. I don't know how many volumes I have written to Washington about him."

"Judge Lusk's record in handling injunctions shows some of them to be most drastic and with no reason under the sun except that the judge doesn't like labor. His record stands out like a sore thumb."

"In one case he wrote an opinion in 20 words and it cost us \$3500 to go to the supreme court where it was knocked into a cocked hat."

"Anyone can see what labor would be up against with a man like that on the federal bench for life. If the recommendation is for Lusk labor will appeal to the United States senate; Senator Berry of Tennessee and others will lead our fight."

NEW YORK, June 11.—(AP)—Substantial support was withdrawn from the stock market today as fresh labor disputes dampened the courage of trading circles.

With growing strikes putting brakes on production in independent steel centers, and walkouts threatened elsewhere, holders relinquished leading issues for losses of fractions to three or more points.

There were mild buying intervals in which small recoveries from the lows of the day were recorded, but these were few and for the most part short-lived. The close, though, found extreme set-backs reduced in some instances.

Weakness of General Motors was a depressing factor. This usually prominent performer slid into new bottom territory for the year. Chrysler also was in supply, along with U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Republic, Wheeling Steel, Vanadium, American Steel Foundries, Inland Steel and Youngstown Sheet & Tube.

Volume picked up a bit over Thursday, transfers being around 700,000 shares.

FARM, LABOR AND BUSINESS SHOULD JOIN SAYS TABER

THE DALLES, Ore., June 11.—(AP)—Business, labor and agriculture must form a trinity and work for common ends if the American system is to survive.

Louis J. Taber, National Grange leader, told the Oregon Grange convention yesterday. He said history has shown that no nation can prosper with farmers verging on insolvency and the farm interests must be included in any forward looking program.

He urged the farmers to take full advantage of research and scientific methods to keep pace with the fast tempo of the times, to unify all groups and assure legislative equality.

He described collective farming and corporation methods as "unthinkable" under the American system.

The Grange head recommended establishing equality in tax levies and including state and federal workers in the new tax incomes.

He predicted an increase in taxation when the national debt is liquidated.

B. F. Irvine, editor of the Portland Journal, said farmers would rise when pressed too far and applauded Grange efforts to improve their lot. He pointed to the necessity of call-
