

# EXPECT MOVE BY FRANCE TO BRING DUCE, HITLER BACK

(By the Associated Press.) A new effort to end the Spanish civil war was drafted officially today by France as non-intervention powers seemed on the verge of winning Germany and Italy back into the neutrality naval patrol.

France suggested that the "hands-off Spain" committee, as soon as Germany and Italy resume cooperation with it, seek an end to the nearly year-long Spanish strife by:

1. Reinforcing the control plan to bar foreign fighters and arms from Spain.
  2. Withdrawal of all foreign soldiers now in Spain.
  3. Mediation between the Spanish government and insurgents.
- In London, meanwhile, the return of Italy and Germany to the committee, necessary for an effective patrol and for France's plan, seemed assured. An official British spokesman predicted they would agree to Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden's four-point plan today and said "no points of disagreement" marked a conference Eden held with the French, German and Italian ambassadors.

Germany and Italy left the patrol and committee table when their warships in the international fleet were bombed by Spanish government planes.

German warships bombed Almeria. The fascist states insisted on the right to defend their ships and on freedom to retaliate against attacks. Eden's plan proposes broader guarantees for the protection of neutral warships and "consultation before action" in the event of new incidents.

Clashing skies in northwest Spain signalled a new insurgent attack against Bilbao, besieged Basque capital. Aerial forces of Gen. Fidelio Davila dropped tons of explosives on the city's steel and reinforced concrete "last line" defenses.

The bombardment was to test the strength of the little "Maginot line" and prepare for a charge by insurgent infantry, poised for what the insurgent command hoped would be the final thrust in the nine-week campaign.

Government reports said an air squadron defending Bilbao wrecked the insurgent air base at Logrono, 30 miles southeast of Gen. Francisco's northern headquarters at Victoria. Four insurgent planes were said to have been destroyed.

Fleets of armed trawlers were sent by the central government to patrol the Mediterranean off the Catalan coast, to protect shipping against insurgent raids.

Many important national figures in the field of aviation will be in attendance, among who are Major General Oscar Westover, Chief of the United States air corps (left); Col. Edgar S. Correll, president of the Air Transport Association of America (second from left), and C. N. Monthlett, executive vice-president of the Boeing company (center right). A. H. Banwell, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce (right) has been selected as general chairman of this important meeting. Banwell will preside at all sessions of the three-day conference. Monthlett entered the army air service in 1917 and was instructor at Kelly and Taylor Fields, later becoming chief of the airplane section of the engineering division at McCook Field. For three years he was on the aerodynamics sub-committee of the national advisory committee for aeronautics.

# HIGH WAR LORDS OF SOVIET FACE TREASON TRIAL

MOSCOW, June 11.—(AP)—Eight once-trusted red army generals were called to secret trial today as co-conspirators in a treason plot.

They face swift execution without the right of appeal, under the law. An official communiqué said everyone had pleaded guilty.

A military tribunal heard them behind locked doors at a secret meeting place, and the Russian press called them "black, traitorous fascist spies" who schemed to wrest the soil from the peasants and the factories from the workers.

The trial, the third great treason case in less than a year, differed from the others in that the generals were not accused of "Trotskyism."

Sixteen who were shot last August and the 13 last January were convicted of conspiring for a counter-revolution with Leon Trotsky, himself once the supreme command of the red army and now in exile in Mexico.

Friday, the communist party newspaper, proclaimed in stirring rhetoric that no mercy would be shown and that there would be no delay in "getting the defendants before a firing squad."

The editorial did not specify to which foreign power the men were supposed to have offered military secrets, but it eliminated all except Germany and Japan, allies in an anti-communist treaty.

Emil Bendickson, formerly manager of Safeway market at Sixth and Bartlett streets, opened a new market in the Liberty building this week. All new equipment has been installed. Emil's market will feature U. S. government inspected meats, according to Bendickson.

# BALDOCK, OREGON HIGHWAY EXPERT, TO ATTEND MEET

SALEM, June 11.—(AP)—Oregon's early construction of highways designed on a selective speed basis resulted in the selection of R. H. Baldock, engineer, as one of 12 road experts to confer in Chicago later this month to formulate design policies for reconstruction of highways.

The group will attempt to outline designs to eliminate the obsolescence caused by changes in dimensions, weight and speeds of motor vehicles, Baldock said, and to make the highways safe in themselves.

Oregon not only was the first state in the union to design modern roads on a selective speed basis but was first in establishing transition curves. The federal government called the meeting.

With Baldock, who will leave June 19, will be S. H. Probert of the department, who will represent the west at Ames, Iowa, at a meeting called by the American association of highway officials to study uniform cost accounting.

# JAIL POPULATION SET LOWEST MARK

Only four inmates were in the Jackson county jail this morning, smallest number since the courthouse was first occupied in August, 1932, Sheriff Syd I. Brown said.

The prisoners were Robert Farnsworth, under an indeterminate two-year state prison sentence for theft of a calf; Nelson E. Cannon, Medford youth awaiting trial on an involuntary manslaughter charge; Howard E. Gibson, serving a sentence of 90 days and \$150 fine for driving while drunk; and Leo F. Hicks, awaiting trial on a grand larceny charge.

# PARK COMMITTEE HOLDS CHAMPOEG A STATE PROJECT

WASHINGTON, June 11.—(AP)—The national parks historic site committee disregarded whatever national significance Oregon's historical Champeog park might have and recommended today its development continue as a local project.

The board is of the opinion the importance of the Champeog area is of state rather than national character and recommends the site for development as a state area. The board suggests proponents contact state and local authorities in an effort to work out its development locally.

The state formed its provisional government in the park in 1843. "Just enough learning to misjudge," quoted Senator McNary by Byron in scribbling a notation of the report.

The committee's report located Astoria across the river in Washington.

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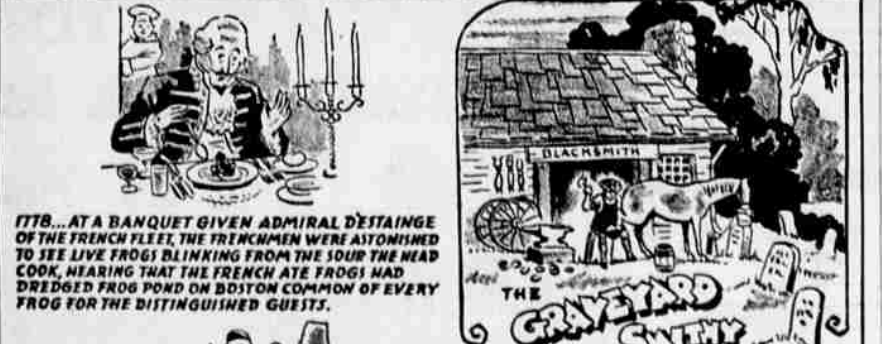
