

WHEAT AND STOCK PRICES DROP TO NEW LOW POINTS

CHICAGO, June 12.—(AP)—Wheat prices dropped almost 3 cents a bushel today to the lowest level in six months. The \$1.06 per bushel close for July wheat was 1/4 lower than a week ago and the lowest the contract has been since the last of November. It compared with a peak of almost \$1.30, reached only two months ago.

NEW YORK, June 12.—(AP)—Handicapped by fears of spreading strikes, stock market leaders took another turn on the downside today and many fell fractions to two or more points to new lows for the year.

It was one of those slow Saturday sessions which have been plaguing commission houses of late. Transfers amounted to 387,220 shares compared with 342,440 a week ago. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 4 of a point at 65.6. That for 15 utilities dipped 2 of a point to 40.7; a bottom mark since Oct. 24, 1936. Of 615 issues appearing on the ticker tape, 407 declined, 64 advanced and 144 were unchanged.

ASTORIA LEADER DIES SUDDENLY

ASTORIA, Ore., June 12.—(AP)—Harry Burke, 61, Astoria postmaster and property owner and prominent Democrat, died of a heart attack today while dining in a local hotel with Mayor John Pembroke and a party of friends.

Burke had appeared in the best of health, taking part in the state postmasters' convention earlier in the day.

M'DONOUGH FREE, FACES NEW QUIZ

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—(AP)—Police graft investigators today prepared an exhaustive set of questions to fire at Peter McDonough, ball bond broker and central figure of the inquiry who obtained freedom from jail by testifying before the grand jury.

The seven minutes he was before the jury was spent in denying he was connected with evidence investigators said linked him with a \$1,000,000 annual graft payoff.

McDonough, whose firm was termed a "fountainhead of corruption" by Special Investigator Edwin Atherton, was questioned concerning alleged conversations with Police Sergeant Michael Gaffey which Atherton said he recorded by tapping telephone wires.

The elderly broker denied he talked to the officer, as did the sergeant some days previously.

UNION BASED ON 'JUSTICE' PLANNED

DETROIT, Mich., June 12.—(AP)—Formation of a new labor union, the Workers' Council for Social Justice, incorporated, was announced here tonight by officers who said it solicits Ford Motor company employees and other automobile workers.

Organization of the new union was disclosed in a full-page advertisement in a Detroit newspaper, the announcement saying the union was "based upon Christian principles of social justice."

George F. Addes, secretary-treasurer of the United Automobile Workers of America, at once issued a statement, asserting:

"The name of the Workers' Council for Social Justice, Inc., smacks of Communism, its program of company unionism, and its officers of company stooges."

BOY WILL CLAIM ESTATE LEFT BY 'BOUNTY' CAPTAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—(AP)—Six-year-old Charles J. B. Christian called for tiny Pitcairn Island today to claim the inheritance established more than a century and a half ago by his great-great-grandfather, Fletcher Christian, who led the crew of the British ship *Bounty* in mutiny.

Fresh from the pavements and schools of the city, Charles said he was thrilled at the prospect of living on the South Sea island made famous in history and literature as the spot where the *Bounty* mutineers and a handful of Polynesian men and women set up a colony.

At Pitcairn Charles will "go native," living the simple life of descendants of the colony's founders, who comprise the island's entire population.

Mrs. Edna Christian, the boy's mother, said she had hoped for years to take Charles to Pitcairn and had finally borrowed the passage money.

Charles' inheritance is a little frame house on a small tract of land with fruit trees, palm trees and a beach. Mrs. Christian plans to augment their income by writing and by selling sea shells to a San Francisco wholesale dealer.

Mrs. Christian, whose husband died two years ago and whose ashes she is taking to Pitcairn to fulfill his last request, was on relief here for some time. Charles was in ill health, and she said she hopes his "going native" will build him up physically.

BOY BANK BANDIT WEEPS ON STAND

SPOKANE, June 12.—(AP)—The case of Le Roy and Stanley Knapp, young brothers on trial for the slaying of W. E. Walker during a bank holdup, went to the jury tonight.

The defense suddenly reacted today after only three witnesses were presented.

Stanley, who admitted killing Walker, was the last on the stand. Previously his mother and father had pleaded to the jury for another chance.

Stanley, who broke down and cried as he talked, told the jury how he stood behind Walker, put the gun in his back and told him the bank was being robbed.

"He turned around with a surprised look on his face, there was a flash and he grabbed his side," the boy said.

"For a minute I didn't realize what I had done."

HOPKINS FAVORS SPENDING POLICY

WELLESLEY, Mass., June 12.—(AP)—A declaration that the nation had "no choice other than carry on with a policy of protective spending against depression" came today from Harry L. Hopkins, federal relief administrator.

He coupled that assertion with a warning that demolition of the works progress administration program before the unemployed are absorbed by industry "will save business a few pennies in taxes, but for every penny saved from Uncle Sam, it will have to give dollars to future depressions."

GARNER TO LEAVE FOR TEXAS HOME

WASHINGTON, June 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt will lose his leading "no" man among his close advisers when Vice-President Garner leaves tomorrow for home.

Garner, according to those in a position to know, speaks his mind more freely to the chief executive than almost anyone else in the administration. He has been particularly valuable to the president because of his long congressional experience.

Presidents of the United States, like other executives, hear "no" from their associates and advisors more often than "no."

Garner has learned through years of public life to say "no" about as emphatically as it can be said. And those close to him assert he has not held his tongue when he went to the White House.

MATTSON SUSPECT, JAILED IN TEXAS, BEARS LIKENESS

QUITMAN, Wood County, Texas, June 12.—(AP)—A 30-year-old Frenchman who County Attorney Bascom Gist said admitted he was in Tacoma, Wash., last December and left there four days after the kidnaping of Charles Mattson was held by officers here tonight.

Gist said the man "answered the description" of the Mattson kidnaper as given in a composite picture supplied by police.

The suspect was picked up in railroad yards at Mineola early today and was questioned continuously through the day. He denied, Gist said, any connection with the abduction of the 10-year-old son of Dr. W. W. Mattson. When arrested he was wearing a white cap and was heavily bearded.

Frank Blake, chief of the federal bureau of investigation in Dallas, refused to comment. Gist had said federal agents in Dallas had ordered the suspect held but Blake answered queries with "I can't say anything about that."

The suspect said he was working at a Tacoma tourist camp last December 27, when the Mattson boy was kidnaped. On New Year's day, Gist quoted him as saying, he left the city, hitchhiking his way.

He said, according to Gist, that he jumped a French ship out of Bordeaux, France, at Philadelphia.

Sheriff J. R. Douglas and Constable Wesley Taylor worked with Gist in questioning the man.
