

Meanies in No-Referee, No Time Limit, Feature Mat Card Tonight

POPULAR SAILOR TROUT WILL MEET MEAN FRENCHMAN

Record Crowd to See Bouts — Frankie Taylor Faces Dude Chick in Finale

Southern Oregon's grappling circles are agog today as Pete Belcastro and Joe Smolinski, two of the dirtiest meanies to ever dish out a foun punch, mark time for their no-referee, no-time-limit middle event at the Medford Armory tonight.

The greatest crowd to ever witness a wrestling card at the local mansion of misery is expected to turn out for the rematch. Promoter Mack Lillard, keeping an eagle eye on advance ticket sales, predicted today the house would be a sell out. It would undoubtedly be standing room only, he said.

Conspiring with Belcastro and Smolinski to produce what is considered the finest program to be presented this year, will be Cowboy Dude Chick, Joe Smolinski, champion of the world, and Frankie Taylor in the main event, and Elroy Dick Trout vs. Monte LaDue in the "grudge" opener.

Referee Ray Friable will handle all three matches, taking his usual place in the ring in the opener and main event, but watching proceedings in the 15-minute Belcastro squabble from the first row ringside. Friable's only duties in the latter match will be to see to it that the two villains remain in the ring for their expected mayhem and don't become too involved with the ropes. Otherwise, he will be just another spectator. He will award falls, if any, only after one of the grapplers has signified that he has had enough.

The battle was arranged by Lillard following the hectic set-to last week that ended when Belcastro smashed a chair over Smolinski's head, knocking him cold and destroying a good piece of furniture. The Polish Palooka, raging and ranting when he recovered, demanded a rematch, and the Mad Italian, still seething with hate for Smolinski, agreed. There followed plenty of planning with the Medford Boxing commission before that body finally sanctioned the no-referee, no-time-limit bout.

Both grapplers, disliked to the nth degree by regular patrons of Lillard's shows, detest each other like no other two wrestlers who have ever appeared here. They stand alone above the present array of huskies now showing in southern Oregon as true villains, and both have vowed to end, once and for all, the argument as to which is the dirtier. Belcastro is probably the smarter of the two, combining slyness with tremendous variety of painful and punishing holds featuring fingerlocks across the eyes and choke holds. Smolinski, on the other hand, is more powerfully constructed and possessed of greater raw strength. His unorthodox attack is built around the ability to absorb punishment while hammering doubled-up fists to the body and head and choking with wild hands. Both are considered experts at eating their way out of tight spots.

In the main event, Frankie Taylor, ex-Ohio State football star, returns to the local ring after more than a year's absence a greatly improved wrestler. Sailor Dick Trout will get another chance at Monte LaDue, the mustached Frenchman, in the opener. LaDue, ranking near the top in the matter of dirt, used illegal methods to defeat the clean-wrestling sailor two weeks ago, and Trout has made up his mind to dropkick the "Furrier" back across the Atlantic ocean. The opening squabble will start at 8:30 p. m. sharp.

GOOD CROWD SEES RETURN OF HORSE, FAIRGROUND RACE

The boys ran at the county fairgrounds yesterday morning, with a good crowd of horse-lovers turning out to see the first exhibition of the "sport of kings" staged here for several years. The meet was entirely informal, a fact which dampened enthusiasm not in the least. Glory, a fast-stepping bay mare owned and ridden by Mrs. L. O. Dodge, won the 1/4-mile dash in 30 seconds, beating off the challenge of Baldy, owned by Ken Murray and ridden by Art McVeigh. Satan, owned and ridden by Fred Beck, finished in the show position.

In the 1/2-mile dash, George Cox rode his own mount, Smoky, under the wire ahead of a classy field in the time of 38 seconds. Laddy Pradas booked his Sparrow, in second and Lucien Smith, stop Shary, grabbed third. Two horses from the Dodge stable, Freddie, ridden by Art McVeigh and Wink, pockeyed by Fred Beck, were also rank, although the last three finishers were bunched closely.

Next Sunday, the first two horses in both races yesterday will battle it out with a purse awarded the winner, to be made up from a small entrance fee.

Doc Gilten was official starter and timer yesterday.
