

CHAMBER VOICES APPROVAL BONDS TO FIX STREETS

Arnsperger Declares Best Interests Demand Conserving Pavement Investment

County Chamber of Commerce today voiced approval of the \$50,000 bond issue and special tax levy proposal on which Medford citizens will vote at a special election Friday.

The tax levy would not exceed two mills a year for five years, 1938 to 1942 inclusive. Funds from both the bond issue and the special tax levy would be utilized solely for the repair and reconstruction of paved streets.

"It is for the interest of the community and especially the city to conserve our paved streets," said Olen Arnsperger, president of the chamber of commerce.

"No city can go forward and carry out necessary improvements or conserve what improvements it already has without spending money. Medford is going forward and therefore the repair of its paved streets is imperative.

"There is no doubt that the streets are badly in need of repairs. Even tourists from other states have come to our office to complain about the inconvenience and danger of driving over Medford's streets. Our own citizens, of course, likewise complain, and with justification.

"A chamber of commerce director who spoke to me today, said that our streets were a disgrace for a city that is inviting tourists and bringing conventions here, to say nothing of our own citizens who must use the dilapidated streets every day.

"The small amount of the bond issue and special tax levy is negligible in comparison with the improvement and general good it will bring to the city and with the value of removing a source of irritation, inconvenience and danger now faced not only by tourists and other visitors, but by our own citizens as well.

"The chamber of commerce believes that every citizen who is interested in the future welfare and development of Medford should go to the polls Friday and vote the necessary funds for repair and reconstruction of our paved streets. We are faced with an emergency and delay will cost the taxpayers a great deal more at some future time. The streets must be repaired and it is cheaper to do it now.

Mr. Arnsperger declared that no matter how they vote, citizens should go to the polls and express themselves Friday. He pointed out that the chamber's Americanization committee has always urged the citizens to register their convictions at the polls.

LANE SLAYER OF DEPUTY A SUICIDE AS ARREST NEARS

GROWERS ADVISED TO APPLY SPRAYS FOR FRUIT PESTS

EUGENE, Ore., June 15.—(AP)—Besieged in his ranch house near Wendling by state police and deputy sheriffs for five hours, Dionysius Crispo, about 50, shot and killed himself last night as officers launched an attack on the barricaded dwelling with tear gas bombs.

Crispo, a Mexican, was wanted on a charge of shooting and killing Deputy Sheriff Hollo Wicks when the officer sought to arrest him after a neighborhood quarrel in which Darrell Stollberg was wounded.

Captain Walter Lansing of the state police, who brought tear gas bombs from Salem while the house was guarded by other state police and deputy sheriffs, said that two shots were heard after the first bomb was thrown, and that Crispo's body was found on the second floor of the dwelling.

The officers said that Wicks, unarmed, went to arrest Crispo after Stollberg reported being shot and wounded in a quarrel with the rancher over a pile of refuse in the latter's yard. Crispo was alleged to have shot the officer from a distance of 50 feet, later taking refuge in his house.

A crowd estimated at 1000 persons gathered during the siege, automobiles being lined up for nearly a mile.
