France Halves Request For Chair Tomb At Sea

PARIS. — (UP) — The Marquis d'Urre d'Aubals was a curious man when alive, but when his will was read after his death, the court was astounded. It was surprising enough for a marquis to leave \$60,000 to the French postoffice, but the conditions accompanying this gift were a little too much for the court. First, the marquis demanded that his body be embalmed. That was simple enough and the undertakers had done so before the will was unsealed. Then the marquis demanded that a small house be constructed on the shore of the Mediterranean, placed on a high point, with walls of glass facing toward the sea. The body should be placed in this room, with a radio set and family portraits to keep it company. Authorities decided that the marquis must have liked the sea. They constructed the little house at the little port of Carro and equipped it with a special radio set which gives signals to passing ships to avoid the dangerous rocks that endangered the coast at this point. The lifeboat at the rescue station off the reef of Rogues de Carro also was named after the marquis. But the final request was too much for officials, for the marquis asked that his body be placed sealed in the room from where it could look out on the angry sea. Perhaps the men who executed the will were suspicious and feared the baleful effects of a dead man's eye. Anyway, the marquis' body reclines now with only a glass window in the coffin above his face. Seamen in the tiny port are thankful for the marquis' gift to them but they feel better knowing he is asleep and not sitting watching them.

Business Men Perform In Texas Civic Circus

GAINESVILLE, Tex. (UP)—Glowing for a circus is serious business. Take Bill Basinger's word for it. Basinger, weight 250 pounds, is the star clown for the Gainesville community circus, a civic show that has gained renown in its eight-year existence. Basinger operates a Gainesville restaurant. "Half of 'em who take up clowning drop out," said Basinger. "It's too hard work. You've got to take this business of being funny seriously. A man can walk a tightwire and there it is. But the clown must sell every gag. People dare you to make them laugh." One night late in April, Basinger closed his cafe at the end of a day and drove to the tent for the opening night of the three-ring circus. He put on white makeup and a grass skirt around his ample midriff. From the performers' tent, he rode into the arena behind Pezzy, an educated pony. Once inside, Peggy staged a sit-down strike and Basinger pushed her; around the arena for the rest of the act. The crowd of 2500 roared. Dr. S. M. Yarbrough, Benny Saylors, an accountant; T. J. Vaughan, an attorney, and A. T. Wells, high school mathematics teacher are the other regular clowns. The show has about 120 performers and technicians, and
