ASHLAND INFANT BODY GOES NORTH

Body of the unidentified new-born baby found in an Ashland infant hospital room Monday afternoon was taken to Portland early this morning by Assistant District Attorney George W. Neilson.

The body is to be examined in Portland by Dr. Frank Menne, pathologist of the University of Oregon medical school and an outstanding authority on criminology. It was understood Mr. Neilson would remain in Portland until Dr. Menne completed his examination so that he could inform the pathologist fully regarding the circumstances surrounding discovery of the body.

Authorities today said they were continuing their investigation, exploring every angle of the baffling mystery. It was said that nothing further had been heard from Miss Irene Simons, the nurse in whose room hospital executives stated the body was found. Miss Simons, authorities said, informed an Ashland friend yesterday that she would be back about the middle of next week. It was not known whether she was yet informed of the discovery of the body.
