In time for tomorrow's meeting, but McGrady, now en route home from Europe, may not arrive until late tomorrow.

Taft, not yet 40, is author of "You and I and Roosevelt," a book in which he takes issue with many New Deal policies. Three years ago he successfully mediated the electric Auto-lite strike at Toledo, an accomplishment that won the approbation of both President Roosevelt and Secretary Perkins.

The possibility that the steel strike which is costing workmen about \$750,000 a day, might spread to the railroads was suggested today in a statement by Alexander F. Whitney, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. He said:

"I told our fellows at Youngstown, Warren, and Canton, O., and in one or two places in Pennsylvania, that they were not required to subject themselves to danger. Under unusual circumstances it is up to the men to decide whether movement of cars is dangerous."

"I told our men that if the railroads undertook to discipline them or ordered them to work under dangerous conditions we will protect them."

Slayer Is a Suicide

VERDUN, Que., June 18.—(UP)—Police tonight believed that Charles E. Herz, 36-year old artist, who allegedly murdered Mrs. Elizabeth Armstrong because she refused to give him money for beer, committed suicide.

SALESMAN MOVIE EXTRA NAMED AS ATTACKER, FREED

LOS ANGELES, June 18.—(UP)—The Los Angeles county grand jury, after investigating for two days a film extra's story she was ravished at a Hollywood "harem" party, refused to vote any indictments.

The jury's action cleared Dave Rose, Chicago film sales executive, whom 20-year old Patricia Douglas accused of attacking her.

The jury's decision that evidence did not warrant prosecution was announced by Deputy District Attorney U. U. Blalock.

The grand jurors deliberated only a few minutes after hearing testimony of two parking lot attendants who took Miss Douglas to a first aid station; at the party ranch, that Rose was not the man they saw with her a few minutes before she reported she had been attacked and asked medical aid.

The parking attendants, Clement South and Asa Carter, followed Rose into the grand jury room. Rose denied Miss Douglas' charges.

Two waiters, Oscar Buddin and Henry Schulte, painted a sensational picture of the party at which, they declared, "anything could have happened."



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
