

APPLICATION FOR DRIVER'S LICENSE TILL MONTHS END

Applications for the renewal of automobile driver licenses will be received daily at Medford city hall for the remainder of the month beginning tomorrow. It was announced today by Ward McReynolds, state examiner.

The additional public service is to make it more convenient to renew licenses and to avoid congestion in a last-minute rush, McReynolds said. All licenses will expire on June 30 and the time for renewal is drawing short, he pointed out. The new licenses, costing the usual \$1, will be good for two years.

It was indicated that police will begin the checking of driver licenses immediately after June 30 and the usual penalties will be imposed for non-possession. The present licenses, McReynolds stressed, will not be valid after June 30.

From now until the end of the month renewal blanks may be filed at city hall and an official receipt will be issued. The work will be in charge of Leonard Mayfield who is coming from the Salem office.

JACKSON COUNTY B. & L. ACCOUNTS WILL BE INSURED

After completion of its pending conversion to federal charter, expected within a few weeks, savings banks in the Jackson County Building and Loan association will be insured by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance corporation, an agency of the United States government.

Officers of the institution announced today. Every investor in the institution will be fully protected against loss up to \$5,000. It was explained.

The protection of long-term savings presents a different problem than does that of demand and time deposits in banks, where funds must be available for payment on short notice. A special agency of the national government, the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance corporation, was established in 1934 to provide such insurance. It has a capital of one hundred million dollars subscribed by the government. In addition, it is building up a reserve fund from premiums paid by the insured institutions. The privilege of insurance is extended to well managed, financially sound institutions of the savings, building and loan type which meet strict eligibility requirements.

All Federal savings and loan associations are required to be insured. The insurance corporation, being a mutual institution, is operated for the benefit of insured associations and their members. More than 1,600 savings and loan associations now have its insurance protection.

NO FIRE GUARDS ASSIGNMENTS YET

No fire guards have yet been assigned to duty in the Rogue River national forest, it was stated today by Karl L. Janouch, supervisor.

Not since fire guards were first employed in 1910 has it been so late in the year that observers had not been assigned to duty, Mr. Janouch said. Forest development projects have been hindered by the weather, he added.

The forest floor is still well soaked and fishing and camping conditions are exceedingly poor, forest headquarters stated. Conditions were likely to remain poor over the week-end, it was said. The service advised against fishing and picnic parties in the forest areas.

FORESTRY GUARDS TO WEAR UNIFORM

When the 65 guards of the Rogue River national forest take to the field this year they will be dolled up in new uniforms designed to identify them with the United States forest service. It will be the first time they have ever worn complete uniforms.

ASHLAND INFANT EXAM COMPLETED TOMORROW, CLAIM

PORTLAND, June 18.—(AP)—Dr. Frank Menne, pathologist of the University of Oregon medical school, said today examination of the body of the new-born infant, found in an Ashland Community hospital room last Monday, would not be completed until tomorrow.

Deputy District Attorney George W. Nelson of Medford brought the body here to acquaint Dr. Menne with details of the mystery and conduct tests in the hope of finding clues as to the manner of the child's death. The body's state of decay hampered progress, Dr. Menne said.

There were no new developments to report today, Police Chief Charles P. Talbot of Ashland said. So far as he knew, he stated, no further word had been received from Miss Irene Simons in whose room authorities said they found the body. She was still expected to return next week from the mid-west whether she went on vacation June 1, the chief asserted.

NO LAND SWAN IS AIRLINER TAKES PASSENGERS HERE

Prevented by rain squalls and treacherous cross-currents from landing at Swan Island airport in Portland, a southbound United States Air Lines mainliner out of Seattle set down on the Medford airport landing field yesterday and today to transfer and take on passengers from a Boeing transport which returned to Portland after following the 21-passenger plane here.

The big plane came in at 11:23 this morning and took off at 12:02. It was piloted by Capt. Ralph Birden; Harvey Berger was first officer and Miss Dorothy Herren, hostess. With eight passengers aboard bound for California, the Mainliner picked up seven more from a 10-passenger Boeing transport that had followed it down from Portland. The latter plane was piloted by Capt. Bert Ball; Postcock was first officer and Miss Putman, hostess. After transferring its California-bound passengers to the Mainliner, the smaller plane headed back for Portland, empty.

The same procedure was followed yesterday, the Mainliner landing at the local port at 11:11 and taking off at 12:06. Six passengers were transferred from the smaller plane to the Mainliner to continue south, while seven passengers from the
