

LADY PARACHUTE JUMPER TO GIVE AERIAL THRILLS

Tiny Dorothy Barden, noted parachute jumper, is expected to contribute greatly to the thrills in store for Rogus valley residents at the air carnival to be held at Medford municipal airport July 2.

Miss Barden has been engaged to present her famous delayed jump in which she leaps from a speeding airplane at seven or eight thousand feet with a sack of flour. She will fall for three or four thousand feet before opening her parachute.

During her head-long plunge toward earth, she will release the flour so that spectators, watching the cloud of white powder, can easily follow her course.

During her spectacular career, Miss Barden has made more than 300 parachute jumps from dizzy heights. It is said she has developed remarkable skill in guiding her parachute to a definite spot where the spectators can get a close view of her landing.

Before starting her hazardous leap, Miss Barden was a postal clerk and rural mail carrier in Bridgeport, Neb. She was the first woman to procure a parachute packer's license, a rating issued by the U.S. department of commerce only to those experts in the difficult task of packing the silk parachute into the small bags worn by pilots and jumpers. She now resides in Sacramento, Calif.

"We searched all over the country for the best woman parachute jumper and we found her in Miss Barden," said Max Peirce, president of Medford chapter of the National Aeronautics association, sponsor of the air show here, and head of the Oregon Aviation Development Committee, Inc., sponsor of the whole state tour which includes aerial carnivals in ten cities. "The tour will start here."

"Miss Barden's spectacular leap is only one of 25 many daring feats and interesting exhibits that will form the three-hour program of Medford's show," Mr. Peirce said. "In addition to the stunts, there will be a display of all types of planes which may be inspected from dawn to dark."

DINING ROOM AND CRATER LK. LODGE OPENED EARLIER

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., June 18.—(Sp.)—Heralding the approach of the 1937 travel season, the Crater Lake Lodge and dining room were opened for business June 8, to be followed by the general resumption of park activities July 1.

Park Superintendent David H. Canfield announced today.

In past years the park cafeteria has been opened prior to the dining room, necessitating a lengthy walk for food. The new policy makes it possible to obtain food and lodging under the same roof. Cafeteria prices and service are available in the dining room, which will serve meals only after the park cafeteria is opened. Housekeeping cabins will be opened to the public as soon as snow conditions permit—probably the latter part of June.

Plows have maintained open entrance roads from Klamath Falls on U. S. highway 97 and from Medford on U. S. highway 99 throughout the past winter, despite snow depths which ranged from 10 to 20 feet on the level and in drifts. Parking space is adequate to provide for scores of automobiles in the rim area. Comfort station facilities are available.

East and north entrance highways are blocked with snow, but are expected to be open to travel shortly before July 1. The 35-mile rim road around the lake will be open to traffic at the same time. Portions of this scenic drive are undergoing reconstruction, but motorists will not be faced with difficulties in making the circuit.

The mile and one-half Crater Wall trail to the shore of the lake will be open July 1, followed by the resumption of launch excursions on the water. Rowboats will be available for angling in the heavily trout-stocked waters. Campers will find accommodations available this month at Annie Spring, six miles from the crater rim, due to earlier melting of snow. Gasoline is to be available at the park headquarters service station June 15.

Building material costs in the same areas were 8 per cent higher than in April, 1936, and labor costs advanced 15 per cent.

Home rentals climbed 7 per cent in Portland, and 6 per cent in Seattle.

The event was scheduled for next Sunday at Umpqua park in Roseburg, and plans were being made to entertain sportsmen from all parts of the state.
