The services will be solemnized at 4 o'clock this afternoon by Dr. Sherman L. Divine. Invitations to 420 relatives and friends of the families have been issued.

Bride and groom will take their vows against a background of blue and pink, with accents of white. Delphiniums, gladiolus, stock and fern will be combined with white tapers in a colorful floral setting.

Preceding the service, Eva Hazzard Marsh will play an organ solo. The bride and groom will be accompanied by Miss Mary Kem who will sing "O Promise Me" accompanied by Mrs. Marsh. Miss Jeanette Field is to play traditional wedding music on the organ during entrance and departure of the wedding party.

The bride will wear a classic gown fashioned in redingote style with a train and Chantilly lace yoke and collar. Her floor-length veil is to be caught at the head with a circlet of seed pearls. She will carry a Job's Daughter Bible and a white orchid.

The bride's attendants are to be Miss Coralie Breitmayer, maid of honor; Miss Joan Elliott, sister of the bride, junior maid of honor; and the Misses Margaret and Janet Mann, Virginia Lindley, Betty Vilm, Phyllis Phythian, Wanda Milledge, Shirley Chadwick and Barbara Leigh Swinson, bridesmaids. The bridesmaids will wear pink net redingotes with blue accents and matching net turbans and the maids of honor will be similarly gowned in blue net. They will carry blue delphiniums and pink rosebuds.

John Koppen will attend the groom as best man. Ushers are to be Russell Ulrich, Melvin Anderson, Harvey Field, Jack Wood, Cyril Sanders, Dick Sligh, Kirk Eldridge of Portland and Dolph James.

The young couple will receive at the bride's home following the church service where the bride will cut the wedding cake. During the reception, Harvey Field will sing, accompanied by Constance Moore. Assisting about the rooms will be the Misses Barbara McGreen of Portland, Lois Herman, Constance Moore and Jeannette Field.

Bride and groom will leave after the reception at a two months' transcontinental trip to New York, Miami Beach, Atlantic City and other resorts and points of interest. They are to go by the northern route, and will return through New Orleans and other southern cities to California, continuing north.

They will make their home in Portland.

American Legion Auxiliary

Mrs. Joseph H. Thompson of Beaver Falls, Pa., president of the Fidas auxiliary, sailed for France June 2 to preside at the meeting of the organization's executive committee, to be held in Paris, June 10 and 12. At the meeting plans for continuation of the Fidas auxiliary's work for better international understanding and good will were to be drafted.

Mrs. Thompson is the second American woman to serve as president of the women's auxiliary to Fidas, the interallied veterans' federation and represented the United States at the founding of the Fidas auxiliary in 1925.

"Friendship and understanding are two powerful forces; constructive forces from which spring peace and happiness," said Mrs. Oscar W. Hahn, national president, in her June message to the auxiliary.

"Hatred and distrust have been the historical attitude of the people of one country for those of another."

"In America, for the first time on a large scale, it was demonstrated that peoples of different nationalities can live together in peace and understanding. International hatreds brought over from the old world could not endure in the close contacts of the new country."

"Now comes Fidas with its hope of teaching peoples of different nationalities in their own countries to know and understand each other. Fidas is striving to replace the destructive propaganda of hate with education in friendship."
