moved swiftly to avert a clash between 200 back-to-work volunteers and pickets at the Brier hill plant of Youngstown Sheet & Tube company.

These thousand spectators watched as police sent home the anti-strikers, who arrived with their lunch pails.

"There isn't going to be any work," a police captain shouted. "The mills are staying closed. Go home!"

Grumbling, the men departed.

In Warren, 14 miles from Youngstown, pickets threw down their clubs and sent home all but a few of their number after Sheriff Roy Hardman told them the guardsmen were coming.

CLEVELAND, June 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's steel mediation board held a second conference with John L. Lewis today and called the executives of four strike-affected companies to another meeting tomorrow.

With the seven-state walkout in "status quo" through the intervention of the president and the Ohio National Guard, Chairman Charles P. Tatt of the mediation board expressed optimism as to the board's chances of bringing a settlement.

Tatt said the steel executives, before they left their first meeting with the board yesterday, told him of their willingness to come back at the board's request. A spokesman for the steel men said previously they had no intention of returning voluntarily.

Tatt said the decision of Youngstown Sheet & Tube and Republic not to reopen their Youngstown plants this morning also contributed to the chances for a settlement.

Lewis said he would return by plane to Washington, but would return to Cleveland at the board's request.

13 ARE SELECTED FOR CITIZEN CAMP

Thirteen youths will comprise the Jackson county quota for the citizen's military training camp to be held at Vancouver Barracks, Wash., from July 1 to 31. Capt. Carl Y. Alternates are Frank J. Gritsch, John L. Applegate, Dan A. Hull, Warren P. Law, Paul W. Hughes and Earl C. Parrish.

The candidates must arrange for transportation so that they can report at Washington Barracks by July 1. Capt. Tengwald said.

INFANT WAS MATURE IS FIRST CONCLUSION REACHED BY DOCTOR

Dr. F. G. Menne of the medical department of the University of Oregon, has advised the district attorney's office, that his uncompleted examination of the body of the unidentified infant found in a room in the Ashland Community hospital a week ago, shows it to have been a matured baby.

Dr. Menne also informed the district attorney that his tests have not progressed to the point where any definite determination could be made whether or not external force had been used and that examination is extremely difficult owing to the advanced state of decomposition of the body.

No further word has been heard from Irene Simons of Thompson, North Dakota, a nurse who occupied the room in which the body was found, the district attorney said. She advised Ashland friends a week ago she would return the middle of this week. She has been on a vacation visit to her parents in North Dakota.

Chief of Police Charles P. Talent yesterday filed with the district attorney a number of affidavits, bearing on the case, from Ashland residents, the nature of which were not made public.

Deputy District Attorney George W. Neilson said that any further action in the case would await the final report of Dr. Menne, which is expected for a week or ten days at the earliest.

Ill. and Medford. He was a member also of Masonic bodies and the Shrine and the First Methodist Episcopal church here.

He once served as an assistant attorney general of Oregon and served several times as a special prosecutor for the state. He was the first chairman of the Medford city planning commission, chairman of the building committee during construction of the First Methodist Episcopal church and for two years was president of the Oregon State Building and Loan league.

Mr. Boggs is survived by his wife, two sons, Oliver C. Boggs, Jr., of Medford and Dwight Stanley Boggs of Portland; five sisters, Mrs. George Wilson of Los Angeles, Mrs. Frank Prunk of Los Angeles, Mrs. Geo. A. Miller of Urbana, Ill., and Mrs. I. A. Love of Danville, Ill.; a brother, Stanley Boggs of Urbana, and a grandson, Charles Carter Boggs.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon in the Conger chapel. The Rev. E. S. Bartlam, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church, will conduct the rites. The body will lie in state at the chapel from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m. preceding the services. After the services the body will be sent to Portland for cremation.

PATIENT TO APPEAL DAMAGE VERDICT IN MILLER, BATES CASE

Notice of appeal to the state supreme court has been filed by Jeanne R. Wood, in her suit for damages against Dr. Harvey Miller and Mrs. Louise Bates, his office attendant. A circuit court jury in the trial returned a verdict for \$750 against Dr. Miller, but upon instructions of the court, exempted Mrs. Bates.

The bill of exceptions filed with the appeal objects to the release of Mrs. Bates from damages and alleges that the testimony in the case shows negligence on her part.

The plaintiff, who is 71 years old, charged in her complaint that she sustained abdominal burns while under treatment from Dr. Miller, and that Mrs. Bates applied the electrical apparatus, and attended it. Negligence was alleged. The court held Mrs. Bates acted under instructions of Dr. Miller and that he was responsible for her acts. The appeal is based upon this contention only.

The defendants, in an order signed by the court, are given until July 15 to file briefs.
