NEW ORLEANS IS LARGE PRODUCER IN FUR BUSINESS

NEW ORLEANS (UP)—Louisiana, which produces more fur pelts than the entire Dominion of Canada and Alaska, draws 125,000 pelts yearly from trappers within the city limits of New Orleans.

The New Orleans trapper faces much the same life as his ancestors. Only they did not trap just off a four-strand concrete highway and instead picture shows in town at night.

Trappers lines are run 15 miles from the city's largest office building out in the fifth precinct. Nearly 50,000 muskrat, otter and mink are trapped each season on the property of Col. R. E. de Montluzin, one of the city's landed Creole signiors.

While he labors, fighting beneath his load of traps or catch, wading through waist-deep mud, his children attend the city schools. His wife often visits the beauty parlor or goes to a movie.

Trappers seldom live to an old age. The hard labor wears these small men down.

Although New Orleans' fur catch is estimated at 125,000 skins, the only accurate figure is that of Col. de Montluzin. The colonel's overseer collects six muskrat skins per day as toll from the trappers. The catches on his lands are recorded.
