

City Bids Welcome To Oregon Fire Chiefs' Association Convention

3-DAY CONCLAVE OPENS TOMORROW, 200 TO TAKE PART

Public Banquet, Dance and Hose Drills On Program — Talks Will Be Given On Hazards and Prevention

Medford will be host to the second state convention of the week when the 18th annual conference and fire school of the Oregon Fire Chiefs' association opens a three-day session here tomorrow.

It will be the first time that the fire chiefs have convened in Medford for their yearly conclave. It follows closely the annual district or state convention of Lions International which was brought to a close last night.

The fire chiefs' convention is designed to be of interest and educational value to the lay person as well as the firefighters, and the public is therefore invited to attend some of the sessions and special events.

Chief Invites Public.

What is believed to be of special interest to the public is the banquet to be held in the Hotel Medford at 7 o'clock Friday evening. Featured speaker will be Jay Stevens, California state fire marshal, secretary of the Pacific Coast Fire Chiefs' association and of the International Fire Chiefs' association and a leading American authority on fire prevention. Mr. Stevens' address is regarded as of great value to persons concerned with eliminating property losses through fire prevention.

A musical program will be presented during the dinner by an ensemble of accordionists. B. L. Barry, chairman of the Medford civil service commission, will preside.

"We should be delighted to have as many of the townsfolk as possible to attend the banquet," said Roy Elliott, chief of the Medford department and host to the convention. "We believe that everyone will have a good time and profit very materially by Mr. Stevens' talk."

Tickets for the banquet may be procured at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

Dance Will Be Held.

Another event to which the public is invited is the ball to be held at Dreamland on East Main street Thursday night. Dancing will begin at 9 o'clock to music by Les Price's nine-piece orchestra. As an entertainment feature several specialty dances will be presented on the stage by pupils of Eve Hanson's studio.

partments will contest for supremacy and the awards and honors that go to the winners. Considerable excitement is expected to develop.

The drills will be held on North Ivy street between Main and Sixth streets. The program includes several different evolutions and most of the afternoon will be taken up by the contests. It is anticipated that the hotly contested drills will attract many spectators.

Deputy Marshals Aid.

Business sessions will be held at fire headquarters. It is estimated that 200 delegates will attend, with several guests being present from other states.

Oregon State Fire Marshal Hugh H. Earle sent his regrets at being unable to attend the Medford convention. He wrote to Chief Elliott saying that he always makes a special effort to attend the state meetings and that only his absence from the state would keep him from coming to Medford. Mr. Earle is attending a convention of insurance commissioners in Philadelphia, Pa.

The marshal's office has endorsed the conference and fire school, deploring that the organization has materially reduced fire losses in the state through prevention measures. Mr. Earle provided for the presence of three of his deputies at the convention here. One of them, Jack A. Hayes, arrived yesterday morning to assist in the final preparations for the conclave.

To Entertain Visitors.

A program of entertainment has been arranged for the visitors and their wives, sightseeing trips around southern Oregon being one of the features. Social affairs have been planned for the women during business sessions.

Registration of delegates begins tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock in fire headquarters. An hour later the meeting will be formally opened by L. L. Mohr of The Dalles, association president. An address of welcome will be given by Mayor George W. Porter.

REAMES IN LINE FOR PARTY HEAD

KNOCK KNEES AN AID IN DANCING SUCCESS ROGERS AND ASTAIRE

PASADENA, Calif., June 23.—(P)—One of the secrets of the dancing success of Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers was disclosed to the California Osteopathic association convention here today.

"They're knock-kneed!" "Their dexterity, or the grace of ballet and athletic artists like Theodor Kosloff or Franchon Wilke," said a speaker, Dr. William P. Macdon of Pasadena. "It is due to the fact that they are knock-kneed. The anatomy of the pelvis, thighs, knees and legs put these members in knock-kneed position when they properly support weight."

Knock knees also are an asset to a lineman of a football team. R. Madsen said, citing Ed Widseth, University of Minnesota tackle Birger Rind of Norway, eight years a world champion ski jumper, also has them.

"The power of a football lineman," said Dr. Madison, "is dependent on getting a wide base of support—feet planted fairly wide and thighs held together. He must have a firm grip and direct this force up through the thighs which tend to be held in a position favoring knock-kneed."

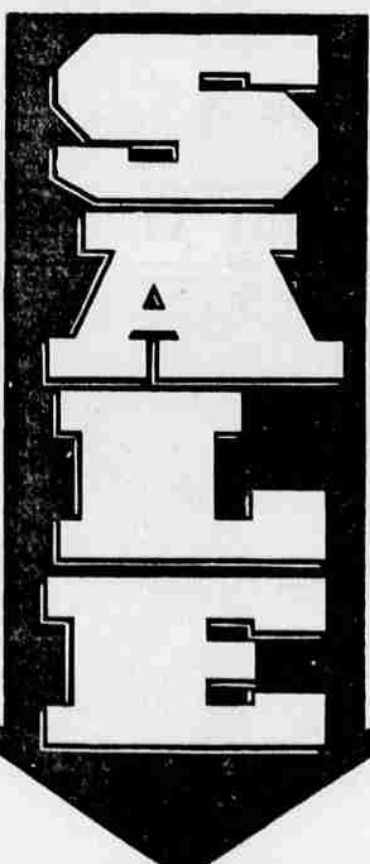
