Grover Tyler was pilot of the Mainliner. Co-pilot was Weldon Rhodes and hostess was Miss Jackie Ganser. No difficulty was experienced in the landing or take-off of the big craft.

This was the third Mainliner using the Medford airport in the past ten days when landings could not be made in Portland.
