

### SONS GRADUATES GAIN POSITIONS IN NEARBY SCHOOLS

Over Sixty Per Cent Already Placed—Remainder Expect Posts When Other Boards Select Teachers

SOUTHERN OREGON STATE NORMAL SCHOOL, Ashland, June 24.—(Sp.)—Graduates of the Southern Oregon State Normal school who have secured teaching positions for the school year 1937-38 total more than 60 per cent of the class of 1937. Since a large number of school boards have not elected an unusually large placement during the summer is predicted, and President Walter Bedford expects that last year's record of practically one hundred per cent placement will be reached before schools open in the fall.

Joyce Baniak of Medford has been offered a contract to teach the third grade and music in the public schools of North Bend, and Bernice Martin of Glendale was selected for the third grade in a nine-teacher school at Nyssa. Two of the more desirable positions in Jackson county have been filled this week by Arba Ager of Portland and Bernard Applegate of Ashland, who will teach in the Jacksonville and Talent schools, respectively.

Eight other graduates have been signed up for the schools of Jackson county. These include Arietta Tyrell of Medford at the Lake Creek school, Alicia Applegate of Ashland at Butte Falls, Wanda Heinze of Ashland in Thompson creek school, Beatrice Werth of Ashland at the North Phoenix school, Melvin Smith of Sams Valley in the upper grades of the Table Rock school, Robert Frenette of Medford at Gode Hill, Hazel Moffet of Medford in the Uniontown district, and Gladys Butterfield of Milton for the intermediate grades of the Evans Valley school.

Klamath county contracts have been given to Betty Cason, Ronald Gander and Ruth Hale of Ashland, Rosa Ragland of Modoc Point, Helen Brown of Malin and Connell Napier of Klamath Falls.

Seven teachers will go into Douglas county—Mrs. Edith Bowman of Oakland and Helen Fox of Lakeview; at Glendale, Florence Johnson of Glendale; at Glide to teach upper grades and coach athletics Ted Schopf of Portland; in the Garden Valley school at Wilbur, Arna Geer of Grants Pass; at Hanes school near Elkton, Esther Spayde of Ashland; at Carnas Valley in the upper grades, James Baughman of Ashland.

Two to Lane County. Two teachers have contracts in Lane county—Wilma Hatch of Eugene at the Zion school, and Emily Spencer of Bend at the Crow school. Frances Weaver of Ashland will teach at Sixes; Mrs. Rosella Cline of Klamath Falls at Arago; Rachel Bones of Myrtle Point in the Gravelford school in Coos county.

Other positions in Coos county have been secured by Anita Gill of Myrtle Point at Charleston, Eleanor Menegat of Lakeview and Cherie Mae Bartwell of Riverton in the graded school at Bright.

Josephine county schools have taken Ila Mae Higginbotham of Central Point at Selma, Freda Baumgartner of Brookings at Kerby, Anita Feldmaler of Grants Pass in the Oak Grove school, Amy Gilmore of Murphy at Wilderville, Lois Dix of Grants Pass at Cave Junction, Mrs. Inez Bayless of Ashland at Murphy, and Gladys Brantley of Grants Pass in the Dixie school.

Among the earliest positions to be filled was the one secured by Phyllis Sparr of Ashland for the second grade and music at Mill City, while Florence Herderson of Nehalem was recently offered the Mist school in Columbia county. Roberta Nourse of Ashland has been hired to teach in Crook county with her sister, Kathleen, who taught there last year.

### ACCUSED CULTIST OPENS DEFENSE IN MANN ACT TRIAL

Fat Follower of Father Divine Eager to Take Stand in Answer to Young Girl's Claim of Seduction.

LOS ANGELES, June 24.—(AP)—Fat, rotund John Quest Hunt, disciple of negro cult leader, Father Divine, opened his defense today against the federal government's charge that he brought 17-year-old Delight Jewett from Colorado to California and debauched her.

As the government closed its case Judge Leon Yankech denied a defense motion for acquittal and commented: "I am satisfied that the facts here are such as to justify the jury in finding all defendants guilty on both counts of the indictment. The evidence shows that Hunt satisfied his lust at the expense of this mere child keeping up a pretense that it was being done in the name of holy religion."

Others Accused

Also indicted with Hunt were H. B. Smith, Mrs. Agnes Gardner and Mrs. Elizabeth Peters.

Paul J. Cotter, agent of the federal bureau of investigation, was the last prosecution witness. He said Smith told him Miss Jewett's parents were not notified when she left Denver and came with Hunt to his Beverly Hills home. He said Smith also told him Hunt spent \$50,000 in a period of four months, buying, among other things, costly clothing for Miss Jewett.

Testifying that she was seduced by Hunt, Miss Jewett told the jury that as the Virgin Mary, she was to have gone to Honolulu to give birth to a new redeemer.

"Mr. Hunt was Jesus the Christ, I was the Virgin Mary, and I was to have my new redeemer in Honolulu, but they didn't tell me when," she testified.

"Who was to have been the holy ghost?" interrupted Judge Yankech. Spectator Ousted

A courtroom spectator uttered and was ordered out.

"Who was to have made the Hawaiian trip with you?" asked Jack Powell, federal prosecutor.

"Several cult members and Mr. Christ—I mean Mr. Hunt," Delight answered.

The prosecutor asked her if she made a stop at Grant, N. M., with Hunt on the alleged automobile trip from Denver to California.

"It was at Grant that Mr. Hunt told me that I was to give birth to immaculate conception to a new redeemer," she said. "He warned me that the whole world probably would turn against me when it happened and that I would be an outcast. Then he told others in our party what he told me and they looked real pleased."

Enter Brush Salesman

Concerning her previous testimony that a brush salesman entered Hunt's Beverly Hills home last Christmas day, when she said, she and Hunt first had sexual intercourse, Miss Jewett testified that others there called him Joseph.

Hunt's attorney, Hugh MacBeth, asked her: "Isn't it a fact that you were glad when you learned Joseph was not to be the father of the redeemer you were to bear?"

"I guess so," she answered.

At one point in the questioning MacBeth, who is Liberman's counsel here, asked Judge Yankech: "Is the immaculate conception, as interpreted in theology, a violation of the Mann act, your honor?"

"The immaculate conception is not at stake," the judge replied. "We are concerned with the matter of transportation for immoral purposes. The government must show the immoral purpose of the trip."

Hunt, nattily attired, expressed anxiety to take his stand as the government was winding up its case. "I love nothing better than to tell the truth," he said during a recess. "Truth is a wonderful thing."

"Peace!" echoed a follower nearby. "It is truly wonderful!"
