

CHIEFS OCCUPIED BY PANEL TALKS IN STATE PARLEY

Problem of Service Limits, Arson Probes and Vocational Education Aired—Dinner Set for Tonight

Fire chiefs from all parts of Oregon participated in a panel discussion at headquarters here this morning as their annual state convention progressed into its second day. William Wymer of Salem, state supervisor of apprentices, conducted the program which had been prepared especially for the convention by O. D. Adams, state director of vocational education who was unable to come here because of a prior engagement at another meeting in Marfield.

The question discussed was: "Should we give fire protection to districts which are not inside the city limits but are supplied with city water?"

Six Present Question
Six representative delegates were chosen to discuss various viewpoints on the question. They were P. E. Tallman of Corvallis, Ray Tillman of Portland, E. W. Taylor of Salem, Ialo Stephens of Roseburg, Tom Carlson of Bend and Jack Moore of Tillamook. After their talks a general discussion was held.

Ways and means were discussed for meeting the situation of serving outlying districts, such as annexation as practiced by Los Angeles, charging the districts for service and insurance coverage. It was pointed out that the city taxpayers pay for the fire department and that police and health departments are not expected to render service outside the city.

Mr. Wymer was assisted in conducting the panel by Winston D. Purvine.

Arson Probes Discussed
After a recess Lieut. Clyde Warren of the state police answered questions regarding arson investigations, describing the procedure to follow from the fire chief's point of view, what evidence to look for and how to preserve it.

The session discussed vocational educational work for firemen. Mr. Moore giving a demonstration of the methods of teaching used at the Salem fire school conducted under the auspices of the state board for vocational education.

Feature on this afternoon's program was the suppression of a set fire behind the fire hall by a crew using an old Jacksonville hand-pumper. A shack built for the purpose was set on fire and the old pumper went into action as a Universal news camera clicked.

The official convention banquet will be held in the Hotel Medford at 7 o'clock tonight. The public is invited. Jay Stevens, California state fire marshal, will be the principal speaker. A musical program will be given during the dinner.

Medford Wins Event
Eugene won two of the three hose drills held yesterday afternoon on North Ivy street between Main and Sixth streets. Medford took the event. The drills extended along two blocks.

The first event ended in a tie between Eugene and Medford at 2 minutes and 23 seconds each but the local team lost when a five-second penalty was imposed for a leaky coupling.

Second contest was won by Medford in 1:49 against 2:09 for Eugene. Eugene came back to win the third in 1:08 against 1:35 for the locals.

Hundreds Watch
Hundreds of spectators watched the contests. Each event carried a \$25 cash prize contributed by fire appliance manufacturers. The Medford team was composed of volunteers while the Eugene aggregation was made up entirely of professionals.

Each team was composed of four men. The Medford contestants were Virgil Swanson, captain, Jack Schmitt, Ray McDonald, George Schreever, Al Geren and Verne Woods. The Eugene team was composed of Ray Hicks, captain and assistant chief of the Eugene fire department, Howard Dixon, Lester Barker and Claude Bradway.

Practically all of the delegates and their wives attended the ball at Dreamland last night and reported having had a jolly evening. Several specialty dancers were presented on the stage, a firemen's chorus wearing chiefs' attire in a hose drill ballet making a great hit with the visitors.

Chorus Members
In the ensemble were Norma Burdell, Mary Milestone, Loraine Swope, Tiny Jarvis, Helen Lawrence and Jerry Jackson, with Jewell Deter giving a solo firemen's tap as part of the number. Miss Deter, who trained the dancers and staged the presentation, also gave a jazz toe dance.

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Douglas Pickell and Clifton Jones presented a black-face tap number. Visiting women were taken this afternoon on a sight-seeing itinerary which included a visit to the House of Mystery on Sardine Creek.

About 150 delegates and their wives were registered for the convention today, representing close to 30 cities.

"This is proving to be one of the best conventions we have ever held," said Jack A. Hayes, deputy state fire marshal. "This speaks well for Chief Roy Elliott's organization direction and for Medford's splendid civic spirit. We are all very grateful for the fine co-operation and assistance we have received on all sides."

Cars for conveying the visitors have been donated by the Lange, Abbey and Skinner motorcar companies and drivers have been provided by the Medford Corporation, Timber Products company and Copco.

The three-day convention will be brought to a close tomorrow morning with the election and installation of officers and selection of a city for the 1938 convocation.

Tomorrow's final business session will convene at 8 a.m. Prior to the election, committee reports will be submitted and other new business transacted.

In the afternoon the visitors will be taken on a sight-seeing trip to Crater lake national park.

TEAMSTERS HALT BEER DELIVERIES

PORTLAND, June 25.—(AP)—The Teamsters' union, boycotting beer carrying the red label of the brewery union, refused to distribute about one-third the supply of "suds" destined for Portland's thirsty today. About 90 per cent of the beer involved in the jurisdictional dispute comes from California. The teamsters claim the American Federation of Labor has given them the right to transport all beer from its point of manufacture.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 25.—(AP)—Federal Judge Michael J. Roche refused today to interfere in what he termed a jurisdictional dispute involving two unions seeking recognition as the bargaining agency for California brewery workers. He dismissed the petition of the California state brewers institute for a ruling whether the institute should bargain with the brewery workers' union or the International Brotherhood of teamsters.
