Three Teams Game Apart In National Race—Cincy Hurler Hot.

ST. LOUIS, June 26.—(AP)—The New York Giants today set the stage for tomorrow's Dizzy Dean-Carl Hubbell duel by whipping the Cardinals 8 to 3 to even the series at one-all.

The victory left the Cards a game back of the league-leading Chicago Cubs, and the Giants in third place, another game behind.

TREASURY SEEKS REVISION OF TAX STRUCTURE, 1938

WASHINGTON, June 26.—(AP)—Treasury officials disclosed today they will ask the 1938 congress for a thorough overhauling of the tax structure, designed to make further changes unnecessary for many years.

Authorities said they hope to eliminate any existing inequities, clarify the tax statutes and close all revenue "leaks." The tax system was not properly coordinated during the fiscal emergencies since the depression, they said.

The treasury is making an all-inclusive study of federal levies with a view to enactment of a new general revenue law. This is apart from the current congressional investigation into tax evasion and avoidance.

Some of the so-called nuisance taxes may be eliminated, authorities said, particularly where the expense of collection almost equals revenue.

Careful study is being given to the income tax and the new surtax on undistributed corporate profits, but officials said recommendations for revisions have not yet been drafted.

IRWIN CAPTURED, ADMITS MURDERS, CLAIM OF PAPER

die. It said he told them he went to the Gedeon apartment to wait for Ethel. Mrs. Gedeon came in and finally ordered him from the apartment, the paper continued, when he told her why he was there.

He confessed, the paper added, that he hit her and strangled her. She put up a terrific fight, the paper quoted him.

The Herald and Examiner added that Irwin said Veronica came in a short time later, he held her for nearly two hours on a bed before he killed her, and then killed Byrnes before he left.

The search for Irwin turned to Chicago today after Cleveland, O., police "definitely" identified as Irwin a youth who boarded a Chicago-bound bus there.

Police here and throughout the mid-west were notified by radio to be on the lookout for the long-missing 29-year-old youth after Cleveland authorities said he fled from a cheap hotel room a few hours before a kitchen girl at another hotel notified them of his whereabouts.

The kitchen girl, Henrietta Koelacki, 19, said the youth had been working at a downtown hotel as a doorman and had used the name of "Robert Murray."

Last night, she said, she was thumbing through an old detective story magazine while in the hotel kitchen, saw a picture of Irwin and noticed the similarity to "Murray's" features.

She playfully asked the youth, she said, what his real name was and later asked if he ever heard of Robert Irwin.

Indifferently, he answered "no," she said, walked out of the kitchen and was seen no more.

The Herald and Examiner said Irwin told in detail how he killed each person.

GAME COMMISSION PROMISES PROBE APPLIGATE FISH

water users of the Applegate valley. E. W. Kubli, local farmer appeared before the state game commission in Portland Saturday in an endeavor to abolish fish screens permanently in irrigation ditches of this district.

Fish screens, in use intermittently here since 1909, have long been an obstacle to farmers, and it is the consensus that there are not sufficient fish in the Big Applegate river to justify the expenditure and trouble of screens. None installed within the last year are operating at present.

Kubli, who left by plane Saturday morning, expected to appear at a special meeting of the commission and present the major reasons why screens cannot be maintained successfully here; namely, that the silt moss carried in the muddy river water locks in them and that the great variation in water levels in the ditches prohibits rotation of the wheel.

"If you can hold an equal amount of water in the ditch all the time it is fine," Kubli said, "but right now our north side ditch carries 1,000 inches of water, while in dry season, it has only 100 inches. We put a screen in our ditch last year, but we couldn't make it work."

In stating that the Applegate should be classified as a non-fishing stream, Kubli said that nine-tenths of the stream area is fenced and inaccessible to the public. He also said that the water is low and stagnant in the summer and not desirable for fish.

In commenting on exaggerations which have been made regarding the large numbers of fish turned on the fields to die after coming through irrigation ditches, Kubli said he offered to turn his ditch dry this spring and install a screen if a member of the game commission could find a fish. The game representative

didn't accept the offer. Kubli planned to take to Portland a sample of the Applegate river water containing an average amount of silt and trash to present at the meeting.
