

Battle Royal to Start Fireworks in Armory Wrestling Arena Tonight

PRIVATE GRUDGES ADD INTEREST IN TONIGHT'S CARD

Belcastro-Dragon Feud Expected to Be Continued—Taylor and LaDue Also Have Squabble to Settle

Mass mayhem, more politely termed a battle royal, will take place in the Medford armory tonight when Promoter Mack Lillard sends six of his current grapping hunkies into the arena at once with orders to disregard life and limb and aim for the fourth row ringside.

Those who will put the ring foundations to the supreme test are the Black Dragon, Pete Belcastro, Monte LaDue and Dale Haddock, all villains of the first water, and Frank Stojack and Frankie Taylor, gentlemanly wrestlers but capable.

It will be the last card in the armory until July 12, and advance ticket sales indicate the fourth straight capacity house. Grapplers and fans will take a vacation next Monday evening.

Automatic Matching
The battle royal, in addition to providing the expected spectacle of wholesale slaughter, will take the match-making worries off the furrowed brow of Promoter Lillard. Directly following the free-for-all, the grapplers will return to stage their regular matches, the first two eliminated meeting in the opening bout, the next pair tangle in the middle affair and the two remaining will face each other in the top main event. All squabbles will be for two out of three falls of a one hour time limit.

Feuds Take Interest

Taking first rank among several personal beefs is the Belcastro-Black Dragon feud, which had its bloody beginning last week when the Mad Italian from Weed, Cal., upset 60 dope buckets and gave the hooded demon a nifty beating, resulting in the latter unmasking to the delight of paying customers. For that severe beating received from a guy he had always hated anyway, the Black Dragon has called upon all his prehistoric ancestors to witness his retaliation.

Another private set-to that should cause considerable fireworks is the Frankie Taylor-Monte LaDue squabble. Both grapplers hate each other like poison, principally because of a couple of terrific bouts in Klamath Falls, and both have vowed that they will shoot the works tonight.

WILD HEAVE GIVES CRATERS 4-3 WIN OVER LUMBERMEN

Sakraida Romps Home With Winning Run When Glendale Shortstop Throws High to First in Ninth

A wild throw to first base in the last half of the ninth inning by Dwight Catherwood, Glendale shortstop, enabled Dick Sakraida to score from third base with the tally that gave the Medford Craters a 4-3 win over the Loggers yesterday at the high school field. It was the Craters' second straight victory, and was the final game of the first half Southern Oregon league schedule.

Great clutch pitching by Larry Pepper, who relieved Ray Erickson on the Medford mound in the eighth inning with two Loggers on and nobody out, contributed heavily to the victory. The brilliant curve baller retired the side without a run and set them back in the ninth, to win his third victory of the year.

Shortstop Throws Wild
With the score knotted at 3-3 in the last of the ninth, Sakraida walked after Pepper had struck out, went to second while Dick Lewis was being tossed out, and reached third on a wild pitch. Carpenter, Glendale hurler, purposely walked Wally Rickert to get at Duke Hankinson. Hankinson bounced an easy grounder down to shortstop; Catherwood scooped it up and threw high over Pierce's head at first, and Sakraida romped across the plate with the winning run.

After hurling shutout baseball for six innings and allowing only two hits, Medford's young Ray Erickson faltered in the seventh frame and the Loggers tied the score. Two glaring errors by Duke Hankinson at third base didn't help any, he booting Avery's ground ball to start things. Pierce drew a free pass and then Avery set sail for third base. Balkovick made a perfect throw to third, but Hankinson was asleep at the switch, failing to cover the bag. Arthur tripped to left center scoring Avery and Pierce and Pete hammering a single to left sending Arthur over with the tying run.

Danger Soon Over
When Catherwood and Stewart, first two men up in the eighth, rapped clean singles, Manager Balkovick waved Erickson to the showers and sent in Larry Pepper. Avery, immediately moved the two runners up a base with a sacrifice, and it looked bad; only one out, Pepper, however, fanned Pierce with sweeping curve balls and forced Miller to ground weakly to Bob Smith on first, and the danger was over.

Louie Carpenter, lanky hurler from the class D Arkansas-Missouri league, allowed 10 hits but kept them well scattered except for the first inning when the Craters scored three times on four safeties.

In that initial stanza, Sakraida, leading off, got a base on balls, and went to second on Dick Lewis' single down the third base foul line. Wally Rickert laid a beautiful bunt down the third base line and there wasn't even a play made for him. It loaded the bases. Sakraida scored when Hankinson hit to shortstop but Dick Lewis was tagged out between second and third. Bob Smith singled to center counting Rickert and when Hankinson also tried to score on the play, he was thrown out by 20 feet. Lyle Russell, the 18-year-old Crater sensation, then lopped a triple into left to score Smith.

Hit's Bear No Fruit
From then until the ninth inning, Medford drew a solid string of home-collars, although getting two hits in each the fourth, fifth and sixth innings, sloppy baserunning was an important factor in keeping the Craters away from home plate.

Erickson, using his fast ball to advantage, set the Loggers down with two hits until the seventh. Arthur singled in the second and Avery doubled in the fourth; otherwise the

Loggers were completely at the right-handers' mercy. Russell in right field and Sakraida in center pulled two great catches for Medford and Catherwood knocked down a terrific line drive from the bat of Dick Lewis to force a runner at third.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 28.—(AP)—Don Budge, America's red-headed Davis cup ace, eliminated Vivian McGrath of Australia, 6-3, 6-1, 6-4, in the quarter-finals of the all-England tennis championships today but his tiny compatriot, Bryan M. (Biby) Grant of Atlanta fell before the sound strokes of Henry Wilfred (Bunny) Austin of England, 6-1, 7-5, 6-4.

Budge's triumph came after Helen Jacobs of Berkeley, Calif., the defending title-holder, and Alice Marble, United States champion from San Francisco, had gained the quarter-finals of the women's division.
