

### CHAUTEMPS GIVEN UNFETTERED HAND IN MONEY CRISIS

PARIS, June 29.—(AP)—The new government of Camille Chautemps, struggling to save France's financial structure, won a vote of confidence today from the chamber of deputies—393 to 142.

Chautemps won the vote on his demand that chamber questioning of the government be postponed until his urgent demand for sweeping financial powers is disposed of. This demand will be voted on later.

He is asking for the "necessary power" to reestablish France's fiscal structure on a firm basis and restore the country's confidence in itself by ending speculation abuses conserving gold reserves, balancing the budget, watching over prices and "reviving national economy."

The vote came amid talk of new franc devaluation, with the country temporarily and technically off the gold standard.

Chautemps demanded the preliminary confidence vote after some opposition had developed to his request that questioning be put off. Later, the chamber and the senate will vote on the premier's financial and economic program.

### FIRST CONTRACT LET IN ARMY PLANS FOR NEW RADIO STATION

First step in the erection of a new army air corps radio station here will be started in a few days with the dismantling of the two old department of commerce towers on Crater Lake highway east of the city.

Contract for dismantling of the towers has been let by the 9th corps signal office at the San Francisco Presidio to the Trowbridge & Flynn Electric Co. The job will take about a week, Mr. Trowbridge said.

The towers will be shipped to Fort Winfield Scott for erection of the San Francisco waterfront as part of another army radio station of a different type from the new one to be built here, the Mail Tribune was informed.

The new radio station to be erected on the Crater Lake highway site will be one of 29 forming a national communications system linking army planes and ground crews. The system will afford two-way radio telephone communication between planes and stations.

The Medford site was acquired by the army after the department of commerce moved its radio station to a new location south of the city.

### Steel Mail Probe Ended By Senate

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—The senate postoffice committee voted, 12 to 1 today to end its investigation of the mid-western steel strikes without further hearings, or testimony by Postmaster General Farley.

By a vote of 12 to 3 it rejected a plea by Senator Bridges R. N. H. that Farley be summoned for questioning about alleged interference with the mails by pickets.

### BOY SCOUTS TAKE NATION'S CAPITAL

By sundown their tented city was ready for a program ranging from simultaneous flag-raising and night-light pageants to a review next week by President Roosevelt.

A bomb from a trench mortar will signal scouts and their leaders to unfurl 1,634 American, foreign and scout flags tomorrow at 9 a. m., formally opening the jamboree.

### Cricket Invasion Worst In History

PASCO, Wash., June 29.—(AP)—The Mormon cricket infestation this year in eastern Oregon and central Washington is the worst in the history of the region, Arthur Chase, Washington State college entomologist, said.

Ravens and seagulls, which flocked to this area ten days ago to feast on the mammoth bugs, have been joined by numerous crows. Poison has little effect on the crickets here, County Agent Irwin Ingham reported. Birds seem to have the greatest effect.

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### DROP BATES TRIAL IF HE STAYS AWAY

F. A. Bates, "the aged miner of Pools Creek," held in the county jail on a charge of threatening with a weapon, has had his case held in abeyance, on condition that he remain at Albany, Ore., where he is now. Bates spent about three months in the county jail awaiting trial, and was permitted to depart for update. A condition provides if he returns here, the charge will be pressed. Bates signed over whatever interest he has in the Black Channel mine to his daughter.

Bates was alleged to have threatened W. D. Russell, who was working on the property. Bates is past 80 years of age, and was a minor figure in the Banks-Pehl turmoil of four years ago.
