U. S. Steel Declares \$2 Share Dividend

NEW YORK, June 29.—(AP)—Director of United States Steel corporation today declared a dividend of \$2 a share on the \$7 preferred stock, reducing arrears to \$1.24 a share. On May 25 a dividend of \$2 a share on the senior stock was declared. The latest payment called for distribution of \$7,205,030. It cut the arrears, accumulated during the worst depression years, from a peak of \$18.25 a share.

- By Mrs. Alexander George DINNER SERVING FOUR Carrot Ring and Creamed Mixture Sliced Buttered Beets Bread Peach Jam Head Lettuce Russian Dressing Dutch Cherry Cake Coffee (Hot or Iced) Carrot Ring 2 cups cooked carrots. 3 eggs. 2-3 cup soft bread. 1 cup milk (hot). 1 tablespoon minced parsley. 1 tablespoon minced onions. 1-3 teaspoon salt. 1/4 teaspoon paprika. Cook carrots in boiling water until very tender when tested with a fork. Drain thoroughly and while hot press through a coarse strainer. Add to the rest of the ingredients. Pour into a buttered ring mold. Set in a pan of hot water and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. Let stand five minutes in the water. Unmold carefully and fill with creamed mixture. Creamed Mixture 4 tablespoons butter. 4 tablespoons flour. 1 cup milk. 3 hard-cooked eggs. 2-3 cup cooked peas. 1/4 teaspoon minced pimentos. 1/4 teaspoon salt. 1/4 teaspoon paprika. 1/4 teaspoon celery salt. 1 egg yolk. Mix butter and flour. Add milk and cook until a creamy sauce forms, stirring constantly. All eggs, peas and seasoning. Cook two minutes. Add yolk. Mix and serve immediately. Dutch Cherry Cake 1 1/2 cups flour. 3 tablespoons baking powder. 1/4 cup granulated sugar. 1/4 teaspoon salt. 3 tablespoons fat. 1 egg. 1/2 cup milk. Mix the flour, baking powder, sugar and salt. Cut in the fat and add egg and milk. Mix lightly and pour into shallow pan, well greased. Spread with topping. Topping 4 tablespoons butter. 2-3 cup light brown sugar. 2-3 cup seeded cherries. 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon. Mix the ingredients and spread on the soft dough. Bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve warm with cream, lemon or cherry sauce.
