

LITHIANS TO DON WHITE UNIFORMS FOR CELEBRATION

ASHLAND, June 30. — (Sp.) — A smiling clad marching order of Ashland Lithians will participate in the Greater Ashland celebration parade here July 17, according to plans made at a meeting of the reorganized club Monday night.

Uniforms will be all white, with coats omitted from the regalia until fall. A committee consisting of V. D. "Bert" Miller, H. L. Claycomb and Fred Taylor was appointed to order the cream-colored trousers, white shirts, white shoes and straw hats.

Grand High Five William M. Briggs appointed Millard Grubb, Dan Kay and Roy Frazer on a committee to study an offer made by Karl P. Nims, secretary of the club and manager of the Twin Plunge, whereby the Lithians will sponsor dances at the outdoor floor at the Plunge this summer for the benefit of the club's exchequer.

Other business at the meeting included authorization for the officers to make plans for a social meeting and the appointment of Henry Erdem as a committee of one to reorganize the famed Lithian male octette.

Plans were made to invite other similar organizations to participate in the Greater Ashland celebration, and letters were to be sent by Nims to the Medford Craters, Grants Pass Cavemen, Yreka Miners, Klamath Falls Pelicans, Umpqua Chiefs of Roseburg and the Eugene Radicators.

It was decided to hold regular meetings on the third Thursday in each month, with the first Thursday subject to special gatherings.

NEW TOURIST CENTER TO BE CONSTRUCTED UNION CREEK AREA

Approval of plans for the construction of a new restaurant, hotel and store building by Edward W. Regnier at Union Creek was announced today by Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue river national forest on which Mr. Regnier is a permittee.

The new structure will be replaced by the building that was destroyed by fire some weeks ago. It is planned to have the restaurant and store operating in two months, the hotel rooms to be completed later.

The new building will be set back a considerable distance from Crater Lake highway, with parking space provided in front. It will be a two-story structure of rustic design to harmonize with the general architecture of the United States forest service. The building will have a frontage of 70 feet and a depth of 36. The exterior will be made of shake siding with a rough lumber trim. Completion of the second-floor interior will be deferred until later.

"It will be a lovely structure in a beautiful setting," Mr. Janouch said, explaining that forest service architects cooperated in designing the building. Mr. Janouch and C. M. Ross, architect on the staff of the regional forester in Portland, went over the plans with Mr. Regnier yesterday. Preliminary construction was begun Monday.

The grounds also include a number of cabins which were untouched by the fire. These are still in use and were filled to capacity yesterday, Mr. Janouch said.

LA ROCHELLE, France, June 30. — (AP) — A police guard was placed over 15 Spanish child refugees from the government city of Santander today after the children had fought nuns and nurses in an attempt to escape from a hospital here, where they had been quarantined. Police said the children, aged 10 to 15, sang revolutionary songs and struck the attendants with fists, shoes and belts. Then they swarmed through the windows and climbed gates to the street where police rounded them up.

THREE BIG DAYS OF CELEBRATION AT ROGUE RIVER

Expecting the largest influx of visitors in history, the Rogue River Townsend club and Chamber of Commerce, sponsors, are rapidly completing plans for the huge three-day celebration to be held in that city July 3, 4 and 5.

Packed with thrilling stunts, contests and amusements, the festival will get under way at 11 a. m. Saturday, July 3 when the city dedicatas its large new Neon sign at the south end of the bridge spanning the Rogue river. A. H. Banwell, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, will give the dedicatory address, it was announced today by F. K. Dover, president of the Rogue River Chamber of Commerce and president of the Townsend club.

Following the sign dedication, various athletic events featuring foot races by children for cash prizes will be staged the afternoon of July 3. At eight o'clock Saturday night, the new open air dance pavilion overlooking the Rogue river will be dedicated, with a gala carnival dance following.

The Townsend club of Rogue River will serve free barbecued meat from its kitchen at noon July 4, with everyone invited to take advantage of the offer. The official parade and Independence Day speech will take place in the morning, with Col. E. E. Kelly of Medford a nominee for the address.

Featuring the Sunday afternoon entertainment program will be the rodeo, with bucking and roping contests, relay and Roman races and a one-half mile horse race on the bill. Highlight of the rodeo will be the musical rope contest with a \$5 cash prize awarded the winner.

Willis Mahoney, state political figure, will give an address at 7 p. m. July 4. At 8 p. m., a boxing and wrestling card will be staged, with two gripping bouts slated and five fights, the latter to consist of three four-round bouts and two six-rounders.

A cash prize of \$25 will go to the winner of the rock drilling contest to be staged the afternoon of July 5. Runner-up will receive \$15. A log-sawing contest will also be held Monday afternoon, winner of which will

Public Is Warned to Quit Handling Cubs and Fawns

SPOKANE, June 30. — (AP) — Picking up and fondling of fawns and bear cubs in the forests "is becoming a serious problem," a game department official said today, "and may necessitate drastic protective measures."

C. H. Shields, assistant chief patrol officer, said the practice of "befriending" the animals was more common this year than usual. "Five fawn deer now at the Spokane game farm at Mead might be roaming the forests today if the people who found them had realized they weren't lost, and, above all, shouldn't be touched by a human hand," Shields said. "A mother deer will have absolutely nothing to do with a fawn after the latter has been touched by a human."

"Ultimate starvation, or the rest of its years on a game farm, is the prospect for the fawn."

Slayers Of G-Man In Topeka To Die

TOPEKA, Kas., June 30. — (AP) — Death sentences were pronounced today upon Robert J. Suhay and Glen J. Applegate, convicted murderers of Federal Agent Wimberly W. Baker. Federal Judge Richard J. Hopkins denied their motion for a new trial.

Suhay and Applegate shot it out with Agent Baker when he sought to arrest them April 16 in the Topeka postoffice for the \$18,000 robbery of a Katonah, N. Y., bank. They had called there for a letter.

NEW DRIVING LICENSES NEEDED AFTER TODAY; RENEWALS MADE EASY

All present Oregon auto driver licenses will expire at midnight tonight and by tomorrow motorists must be in possession of the new 1937-39 licenses.

To assist those who have not yet procured the new licenses, however, two state employes will continue to receive renewal applications at city hall daily to the end of the week. Upon acceptance of the applications they will issue official receipts showing that the new licenses have been applied for.

Applications may also be sent directly to the secretary of state's office in Salem, full instructions for applying being contained in the renewal blanks which may be procured at city and state police headquarters, sheriff's office, Jackson County Chamber of Commerce or the Mail Tribune office. The new license costs \$1 and is good until June 30, 1939.

The police emphasized that beginning tomorrow it will be unlawful to drive automobiles without the new license. Drivers lacking the new license will be subject to the usual penalties, they pointed out.

WOMAN LACKED FISHING PERMIT

Mrs. Irene A. Krch, of Klamath Falls, charged with fishing in Fish lake without a license, had her sentence suspended in justice court this morning upon condition she procure an angling license as soon as possible.

Mrs. Krch was a member of a party of four fishing in Fish lake, and according to the testimony of the state police game warden, took the pole of her son, six, and started fishing. She made no effort to pass the pole to another, at the approach of the trooper, and when called upon to show her fishing license had none.

Cornelius W. Doty, charged with driving a truck with an obstructed view, entered a plea of not guilty. After hearing the testimony of the arresting officer and Doty, the court found Doty guilty and assessed a fine of \$5 and costs. He was given until July 15 to pay.
