

### PLANS ARE MADE TO HANDLE CROWD AT SKY CARNIVAL

State Police and National Guard to Aid at Field — Early Arrival Is Asked of Public at Big Circus

Arrangements were completed today with state police and Medford national guard units for the handling of the crowd that is expected to attend the airplane exposition and sky show at municipal airport Friday.

There will be sufficient help available to facilitate the parking of motorcars and the policing of the grounds to keep spectators out of danger zones. It was stated by Max Peiro, president of Medford chapter of the National Aeronautic association, sponsor of the show here. The Medford carnival will open a ten-day aerial tour through Oregon.

Because a large throng is expected, spectators were advised to get their tickets in advance if possible. It was feared that some delay in getting onto the field may result if there is too great a rush for tickets at the last minute at the airport.

Early Arrival Asked  
Every effort, Mr. Peiro said, will be made to handle the crowd expeditiously. Twenty-five members of the Eagles lodge, under supervision of William Peck, will sell tickets at the various airport entrances. They will be on hand when the exposition opens at 8 a. m. To assist the management in avoiding delays, spectators were asked to get to the field as early as possible.

Tickets, which are red lead buttons, may be obtained at Heath's drug store, The Club, Hubbard Brothers, Yellow Cab company, Hotel Medford and Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

One ticket will admit the holder to the day-long carnival. The holder, however, does not have to remain at the field all day. He may, for example, take in the plane exposition in the morning, go home or back to town and return for the sky show in the afternoon without buying another ticket, Mr. Peiro explained. All that is necessary is to show the ticket each time the spectator returns to the field, he added.

### FOREST AREA SHUT TO GUARD ASHLAND

Ashland creek watershed will be closed for the season tomorrow, it was announced today by Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue river national forest.

The area supplies Ashland with its water and the closure is to protect the city, Mr. Janouch explained, the district being highly inflammable. Closure is authorized by federal regulations and violations are subject to fine and jail penalties.

The closure prohibits anyone going into or being upon the area without a permit, Mr. Janouch said. Permits may be procured from any forest officer. The only persons exempt from the permit requirements are bona fide settlers living in the area. All trails and roads leading into the district are posted.

The closure does not affect the Ashland scenic loop drive which is just outside the closed area.

### FRENCH SENATE GIVES CHAUTEMPS POWER TO RIGHT ECONOMIC ILLS

PARIS, June 30.—(AP)—The French senate today granted Camille Chautemps' government the sweeping powers it had demanded to save the nation's money structure.

The vote was 167 to 82. The chamber of deputies already had approved the measure.

Enactment of the "decrees power" measure permits Georges Bonnet, financial dictator-designate, to let the franc seek its own lower level in world markets, take steps to conserve France's sapped gold supply, stop speculative abuses, control prices, try to balance the budget and attempt economic recovery.

Passage of the bill had been foreshadowed early in the day when the senate finance committee, by a vote of 20 to 3, approved the grant of power.

Decree abolishing the present limits on the range of the franc, inflating the currency by loans of from 12 to 15 billion francs from the Bank of France to the government and imposing new taxes were expected following passage by the senate itself of the decree power bill.

### OREGON ASSURED GRANT TO BUILD TWO STRUCTURES

\$450,000 Federal Help With No Strings to Finance New Office and Library Construction, Is Word

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—Oregon became assured today of a \$450,000 federal grant without relief labor strings to construct new state office and library buildings.

Senator Charles McNary said "the way has been cleared" for government assistance to finance 48 per cent of the construction cost of the proposed structures.

The senator said an order of the PWA cancelling requirements that the grant be made only on a basis of relief labor cost plus 15 per cent would enable the state to spend the money in the most advantageous manner.

Action of the PWA followed upon a protest of state officials through Ralph Moody, assistant attorney general, who went to Washington. The state said that to construct the

buildings on relief labor cost would impose prohibitive expenditures. Besides the federal grant, the state will put up \$550,000 for construction of the library building and the state highway commission is expected to furnish additional funds for its structure.

SALEM, June 30.—(AP)—Governor Martin said today he expected work to begin soon on the new state highway and library buildings, since Senator McNary announced in Washington the federal public works administration would give the state \$450,000 to finance 48 per cent of the cost.

"We'll move very fast now," the governor said. "We will start soon either to buy the necessary property or to condemn it."

He said he expected Ralph E. Moody, assistant attorney general who went to Washington to obtain the grant, to return to Salem in a few days.

### NYA Students Paid \$204,494 in State

PORTLAND, June 30.—(AP)—Karl W. Onthank, director of the National Youth Administration in Oregon, said that 5,127 high school, college and graduate students in the state earned a total of \$204,494 through participation in the 1936-37 NYA program.

Earnings of 2,961 students in 200 high schools through part time employment averaged \$4 a month for nine months. The 2,166 college and graduate students in 23 institutions of higher learning averaged \$11.43 a month.

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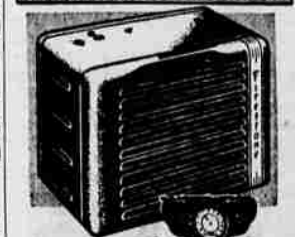
