

**KLAMATH LIQUOR STORE LOCATION IS PROTESTED**

KLAMATH FALLS, July 1.—(AP)—The Klamath Falls Central Labor Council last night adopted a resolution protesting the location of the new state liquor store here, a half block from the city library.

Copies of the resolution will be sent to Governor Martin and members of the state liquor control commission.

**\$1,500,000,000 RELIEF MEASURE SIGNED BY F.D.R.**

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt signed the \$1,500,000,000 relief bill today. It provides \$1,325,000,000 for WPA, \$100,000,000 for the resettlement administration, and \$75,000,000 for the national youth administration for use in the fiscal year beginning today.

During the current fiscal year, WPA spent approximately \$1,860,000. The reduction in funds will require the dismissal of thousands of relief workers each week between now and July 15. Harry L. Hopkins, WPA administrator, has set an employment figure of 1,665,477 for that date. On June 3 there were 1,980,000 on

WPA rolls, a decrease of 19,000 from the preceding week. WPA officials said that with the new relief appropriation there will be no change in the type of projects undertaken, nor in the average monthly wage, which is about \$54. The quotas provide reductions for every state except Florida, which officials pointed out, has a seasonal employment situation almost the reverse of other states.

**Sardines Appear.**  
NORTH BEND, July 1.—(AP)—Schools of sardines, large enough to assure good catches, have been reported off the Oregon coast, M. F. Kelly, fish warden for the state fish commission, said. Coos Bay plants prepared to start the processing season next week.

**Cloudburst Blocks Road.**  
SALEM, July 1.—(AP)—An estimated 1,000 tons of earth were swept from a hillside by a cloudburst that struck near Pacific highway about seven miles south of Salem yesterday afternoon. A large part of the slide covered the highway, which was blocked for several hours.

**REGULAR SERVICE WITH MAINLINERS IS STARTED HERE**

Medford, which saw the start of Pacific coast air transportation with single-engine, open-cockpit planes just ten and a half years ago, today welcomed the first of United Air Lines' new 21-passenger Mainliner transports to stop here on regular schedule.

Effective with the landing of the great-winged plane at 10:45 a. m., Medford was added as a daily stop on the Mainliner schedule which places this city only three hours from San Francisco, five hours from Los Angeles, one and one-half hours from Portland and three hours from Seattle. Medford's addition as a stop on the

Mainliner service came with United's inauguration of a third daily round-trip Pacific coast schedule. To this city, the move brings the largest and most luxurious transports ever to serve southern Oregon.

It was only as far back as September 15, 1926, that Medford helped inaugurate airmail service over the Pacific coast airway. As contrasted with the 90-mile-an-hour, open-cockpit planes used at that time, United's new Mainliners cruise at 190 miles an hour with a full load of 21 passengers, crew of three, baggage, mail and express, while using only 65 per cent of their available horsepower.

N. B. Rader of Portland, district traffic manager of United Air Lines, arrived on the inaugural southbound flight of the mainliner this morning.

**Crab Deaths Mystify.**  
PORTLAND, July 1.—(AP)—Dead crabs continued to collect by the thousands on Clatsop county beaches as M. T. Hoy, master fish warden for the state fish commission, expressed the belief some strange marine malady was causing the mortality. A fish commission investigator counted 516 dead crabs on a 50-yard stretch of Cannon Beach.

**FATHER DIVINE'S AIDE CONVICTED ON CHARGE VIOLATING MANN ACT**

LOS ANGELES, July 1.—(AP)—John West Hunt, fast follower of Father Divine, was under conviction today on charges he violated the Mann act in transporting Comely Delight Jewett, 17, from her Denver, Colo., home to Beverly Hills, Calif. The jury which last night found Hunt guilty returned a verdict acquitting his co-defendants, Mrs. Agnes Gardner, Mrs. Elizabeth Peters and H. B. Smith.

Federal Judge Leon Yankwich set next Friday as a date for sentencing Hunt and hearing plea for a new trial. Hunt faces a maximum sentence of five years in prison. "I doubt if there is anything in the record to warrant granting a new

trial," Judge Yankwich told Hugh McBeth, Hunt's negro attorney. When the verdict was returned, Hunt, whose attitude has been one of great confidence and nonchalance, asked rhetorically: "Why cannot these poor unfortunate individuals understand me?"

McBeth referred to the defendants in his closing arguments as "these four saps." He frankly admitted they might be guilty of violating state laws, but contended the evidence in the trial did not show interstate commerce of the girl.

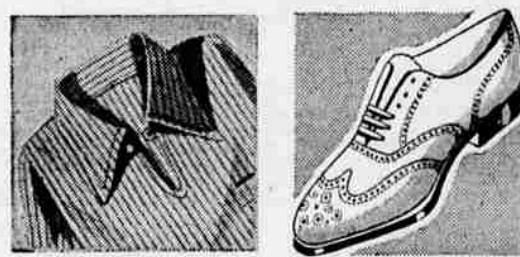
