

Budge Blasts German to Win All-England Singles Tennis Title

YANKEE'S TRIUMPH CLIMAXES BRIGHT WIMBLEDON PLAY

Von Cramm Defeated in Straight Sets—Both Players Introduced to Queen Mary at End of Match

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 2.—(AP)—Don Budge, lanky red-head from Oakland, Calif., today won the all-England singles tennis championship, blasting Germany's Baron Gottfried Von Cramm off the courts in straight sets, 6-3, 6-4, 6-2.

The American Davis Cup star's decisive triumph climaxed a brilliant performance by Budge throughout the famed Wimbledon tournament. En route to the title relinquished by Fred Perry, now a professional, Budge dropped only one set and that to his Davis cup teammate, Frankie Parker of Milwaukee.

For Von Cramm it was his second successive trouncing in Wimbledon's final. He lost to Perry last year, 6-1, 6-1, 6-0.

Match Is Short. Budge required only an hour and five minutes to annex the title. Immediately after the match both went to the royal box to be introduced to Queen Mary.

Both Budge and Von Cramm shook hands with the smiling queen mother who, wearing dark glasses, had watched the last two sets with the greatest interest.

Budge bowed slightly and beamed all over his face as he backed out of the box after receiving Queen Mary's congratulations.

Asked what the queen mother said to him, Budge replied: "I don't think it's proper to tell that. Just say that she congratulated me."

"I was lucky to play probably the finest tennis of my life just when I wanted to," he added. "I couldn't believe it when I reached that match point."

Von Cramm is a great player and a great gentleman.

Not to Turn Pro. "No, I am not going to turn professional."

Later Budge returned to the royal box and sat with Lady Samuel Hoare, watching a doubles match from the front row with Queen Mary, but not in chatting distance.

Von Cramm, who was soundly whipped by Fred Perry in the 1936 finals, 6-1, 6-1, 6-0, wasn't discouraged.

"I was playing the best I knew how," the German said. "But I don't think any man who ever played at Wimbledon could beat your American today."

Von Petra and Mme. Simone Mathieu of France reached the finals of mixed doubles by defeating Daniel Penn of Germany and Beverly Dekman of England, 6-2, 6-4. The winners will meet Budge and Alice Marble of San Francisco in the finals tomorrow. Budge and Miss Marble won their semi-final round match yesterday.

The Carter-Lutman squabble is being billed as a grudge affair. Both heavies are reported to hate each other with plenty of gusto and, as both can punch like a mule can kick, the battle is expected to end shortly by a knockout.

Deby Max Baer, whose real name is Barney Wilder, is a former Grants Pass boy who went to California, where he produced a long string of knockouts. Considerable difficulty was experienced in procuring a suitable opponent for him, but Don Lyons, Medford flash, agreed to, and fans are expecting a spine-tingling battle.

LOUIS, FARR FIGHT SIGNED FOR FALL SOMEWHERE IN U.S.

Action Cancels Negotiations for Schmeling-Farr Go in London — Claim Max Failed to Take Offer

By JACK CUDDY (United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK, July 2.—(UP) Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis and Tommy Farr, champion of the British empire, were matched today for a title fight "somewhere in the United States" in August or September.

This cancelled European negotiations for a Schmeling-Farr fight in London on September 1.

The other agreement was concluded by trans-Atlantic telephone and cable conversations between promoter Mike Jacobs of New York and Farr's manager, Ted Broadbribb, who will leave England for America within two weeks.

Max Muffed Chance. Jacobs explained that he closed with Farr today because Schmeling had refused to accept or reject his offer for a September title bout with the Brown Bomber. "I gave Schmeling 30 hours in which to answer my cable," Jacobs explained. "And when he didn't even give me the courtesy of an answer, I decided not to monkey with him any longer."

In my cable to Schmeling, I informed him that the New York commission had recognized Louis as champion and desired Schmeling as Louis' first title opponent."

Farr is the young Welsh heavyweight who, in the past year, beat Walter Neusel, Maxie Baer, Jack Peterson, Tommy Loughran and Bob Olin. If he actually gets his title shot with Louis, he will be the first British heavyweight to fight for the title since Tom Heeney of New Zealand met Tunney in 1928.

Plan Four Title Fights. Promoter Jacobs announced that he was completing negotiations for four title fights on one card in Yankee stadium on August 25 or 26. Marcel Thil of France, recognized in Europe as world middleweight champion, has agreed to defend his title that night against Fred Apostoli of San Francisco.

The other three bouts would bring together Lightweight Champion Lou Ambers vs. Pedro Montanez of Puerto Rico; Welterweight Champion Barney Rosa vs. Cefeferio Garcia of Los Angeles and Bantam Champion Sixto Escobar vs. Harry Jeffra of Baltimore or K. O. Morgan of Detroit.

Billy Hulen Says: Heavyweight Crown Hollow Honor While Schmeling Unbeaten

On the face of things, that agreement reached yesterday between promoter Mike Jacobs of New York and Ted Broadbribb, manager of Tommy Farr, the first vertical English heavyweight in many years, for a title bout between said Farr and Champion Joe Louis for "somewhere in America" in August or September, seems just like another successful attempt to give Max Schmeling the cold shoulder, run-around, or whatever you want to call it.

Schmeling, who knocked the Brown Bomber goodly not long ago in 12 rounds, was first shouldered out of his well-earned championship squabble with the then champ, Jim Braddock. Louis got the shot, and made good. Now this Farr-Louis brawl knocks the German out of his previously scheduled battle with Farr, which was being billed as a "world championship" match, and loud will be the wails from Herr Schmeling's think lips when he gets things all figured out.

It certainly appears to be a "run-around" alright, but from what Mike Jacobs says, Schmeling got his chance to accept a bout with Louis, himself, and didn't even bother to answer the promoter's telegram. If that's true, if the German ignored the offer (if it was made) after howling about a chance to fight Louis again, then the cancellation of the Farr-Schmeling fight to make way for the Englishman to argue with Louis is no more than Schmeling deserves.

It's a cinch there is no man in the world who more deserves a crack at the Detroit Bomber's crown than does Schmeling. In fact, it is considered by most fight followers that Schmeling was done plenty of dirt when he was pushed aside by big shots in favor

of Louis in the last battle. This department agrees. But, if Schmeling had his chance to get at the present champion again, and didn't care enough about the matter to answer one way or the other, then little sympathy should be wasted on him.

George Harrington, one of Medford's own athletic products who returns next fall to take over all coaching duties at the Junior high school, believes in being prepared when he steps out into the wolf-laden coaching world.

George, star Linfield college athlete for the past four years, said that he was tentatively planning to attend the coaching school at Catalina Island the middle of August with Bob Wood, Phoenix, high school mentor the past few years.

The school will be under the supervision of Sam Barry, basketball; Howard Jones, football; Dean Cromwell, track, and other noted college coaches, the new junior high head man said. He figured it would be a great opportunity for him, not only in assimilating knowledge from masters, but in talking over actual problems with the many junior high and high school mentors who will be enrolled.

A football and basketball man at Linfield for four years, George should be pretty well qualified to guide the destinies of future Medford high athletes. Only one thing has him worried a bit, he admitted, and that was the ability to teach tackle and guard play to his junior high football line-men.

There are some things I don't understand about guard and tackle blocks and defensive maneuvers," he said, "but Bowerman will straighten me out on those points."

Although Harrington was offered the job vacated by Russ Acheson when the latter moved up to the high school staff, he signed his contract only the other day. Reason for the lapse of about one month between the offer and dotted line business was that George was investigating an offer he had received from Redmond regarding the head coaching position in the high school.

George, it is understood, could have made more do-rem by accepting the eastern Oregon post—\$60 more a year—but turned it down in favor of the local position after some sleuthing around. In the first place, athletic material in Redmond didn't look so hot; secondly, he would be buying as his chief rival, Bend high, one of the toughest in the state, and third, he figured it would do him more good to start at the bottom of the coaching game and climb and learn through experience.

That second point can't be too strongly over-emphasized in making a choice of coaching jobs, and Harrington fully realized the odds that would be piled against him. No matter how smart a coach is, it's an axiom that he can't produce without material on a par with his rivals.

In a small school like Redmond, there would be absolutely no chance for Harrington or anyone else to make a record or record impressive enough to draw offers from larger schools, at which all coaches aim their guns. There would always be that huge Lava Bear of Bend high blocking the way, and George would languish and suffer in an institution where there was no chance of an undefeated season. He realized it, and Medford gets a swell coach because he did.

"I'M GOING TO FIGHT LOUIS," SAYS DULCET-VOICED DOYLE

By Robert Myers LOS ANGELES, July 2.—(AP)—Jack Doyle, who wouldn't like to be called the Irish Thrush anymore, reached for a high note today when he announced in dulcet tones:

"I'm going to fight Joe Louis in London the last week of August or the first in September. You can bet on it."

Doyle climbed out of a transcontinental plane early this morning, posed for a cameraman with a straight-stemmed pipe in his hand and a romantic gaze in his eyes and said he knew of no confusion in the world's heavyweight boxing scene.

"It's all set, I tell you. I shall fight Joe Louis." Prodded for details, he said Mike Jacobs of New York would promote the affair.

"It will be staged just before the Max Schmeling-Tommy Farr bout," he said, "I'll cut in on that one." He laughed easily, took another puff and continued:

"Louis will get 43 1/2 per cent of the gate, I'll get 32. And take it from me, we will draw \$1,500,000. Yes, \$1,500,000."

A year ago Doyle couldn't get a fight in Los Angeles. The promoters said he wouldn't draw a draft of air, and besides, he might get hurt.

Then Doyle went to England and thrashed King Levinsky of Chicago—who, incidentally, couldn't get another fight here, either. The Levinsky triumph apparently "made" Doyle an attraction there.

Doyle said he came here to dispose of some property and to buy some. His most immediate acquisition will be his own baggage, which was held at the airport—canary-colored coats and all—over excess baggage charges of around \$15. Doyle left it there, explaining that all his pocket money was in English currency.
