

NON-INTERVENTION NATIONS CALLED FOR FULL REVIEW

Britain, France to Furnish Spanish Government Munitions Unless Germany, Italy Change Attitude

(By the Associated Press) Europe's "hands-off Spain" conference, stated over opposing proposals for isolating the civil war...

Officially labeling such action as a "resumption of normal commercial relations," persons close to Foreign Minister Yvon Delbos indicated that Spanish Foreign Minister Jose Giral Perola had come to Paris to make arrangements for delivery of war materials...

New Proposal Italy and Germany, still flatly opposed to an Anglo-French neutrality patrol of all Spain's coasts, proposed today that both sides of the Spanish civil war be given belligerent rights.

The plan was offered jointly at a second critical meeting of the non-intervention sub-committee dealing with the withdrawal of Germany and Italy from the four-power neutrality naval patrol.

It was submitted as a counter-proposal to the Anglo-French plan and left still unanswered how Europe was to save its peace from possible Spanish explosion.

Earlier, Britain and France formulated what was regarded as a firm stand against Italy and Germany on the issue. British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the house of commons there could be no agreement on belligerent rights at the moment.

French Foreign Minister Delbos was reported in Paris to have told the chamber of deputies foreign affairs committee that France and Britain might over-ride Italo-German objections and jointly patrol Spain's coasts. There also was the possibility of complete abandonment of the non-intervention scheme.

Britain Prepares Britons, meanwhile, received fresh reminders of their empire's defense preparations. Warnings were posted against suspicious aerial photography. A drive was announced for 8,000,000 tons of scrap iron and steel for armaments. Military officials of British-occupied Egypt plotted strong defenses along the border of Libya, Italy's North African colony.

Insurgent troops in northern Spain said they had invaded the province of Santander. Generalissimo Francisco Franco's major northern objective. But government advisers said the insurgents failed to break through Basque-Asturian defense lines.

Insurgent bombers destroyed several houses and wounded many inhabitants of Santander in an air raid, the sixth in two days. A government air fleet bombed the insurgent airbase at Seville.

Baker Pioneer Dies. BAKER, July 2.—(AP)—Mrs. Martha Mason, 82-year-old Baker county resident, died Thursday following an illness extending over a period of several months. Mrs. Mason came to Baker county with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas J. Vernon, in 1863 and located at Auburn, the first county seat of Baker county.

JUNE NOTABLE FOR RAIN AND CLOUDS

Cloudy, rainy weather predominated during the month of June. It was revealed in month-end statistics compiled by the weather bureau. A total of 17.7 inches of rain fell during the month, an excess of .98 of an inch above normal.

Despite the June excess, a seasonal precipitation deficiency of .93 inches remained on June 30. Seasonal total was 16.55 inches.

Cloudy weather prevailed during half of the month, with 10 clear days and five partly cloudy. Measurable precipitation fell on 13 days, the wet period extending from June 8 to 22. Heaviest 24-hour precipitation occurred June 9, when .81 of an inch was recorded.

A seasonal high temperature was recorded June 27, when the thermometer registered 100 degrees. Mean temperature of the month was practically normal, although minimums were uniformly higher than usual, weather officials state.

JAIL FUGITIVES REMAIN HIDDEN

No new clues were reported today to the whereabouts of Leo M. Schroder and Leo P. Hicks, both under prison sentences, who fled from the county jail Tuesday afternoon by way of roof air vents and trapdoors. Schroder was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary, Tuesday morning, on a plea of guilty to check forgery. Hicks was under a two and one-half year sentence for larceny of a saddle and cowboy outfit belonging to E. W. Kubli of the Applegate.

Both men have previous prison records and are "three-time losers," facing possible prosecution under the habitual criminal act. Schroder served time in San Quentin and Hicks in the New Mexico state penitentiary, the fingerprint records show.

Hicks is a cowboy and sheepherder, and the authorities believe he will endeavor to reach the wide open spaces. Schroder is well known in southern California, where he is wanted on check charges.

\$150 AWARDED IN SUIT OVER FARM LAND RENT

A circuit court jury, after nearly four hours' deliberation, returned a verdict awarding Mrs. Emma Wahlers the sum of \$150 in her action against Jay I. Williams, for money due for farm land rental and other claims. The defense set up counter claims. The land involved is located in the Dry creek district. The hearing lasted two days.

SEN. ELLIS TO BACK U. S. BALLENTINE IN RACE WITH PIERCE

PORTLAND, July 2.—(AP)—State Senator Rex Ellis of Pendleton denied here today he would be a candidate for congress from the second district against incumbent Walter M. Pierce, but said he would throw his support to State Senator U. S. Ballentine of Klamath Falls, whom he said will make the campaign. Ballentine, a Republican, served

his first term in the state legislature in 1937. Ellis, also a Republican, filled the unexpired term of Senator Jack Allen of Pendleton. Ellis said he would seek re-election.

Ellis, who is credited with starting the move for a special session of the legislature to "provide adequate support for the aged," declared he was "in earnest" because the "old people of my district are not even getting half the \$30 maximum as provided under the state old age assistance act."

The Umatilla county legislator said that while he had the support of the Townsend clubs in his election to the state senate, he was not prompted in urging a special session by "so-called Townsend leaders." He said he requested the governor to call a special session because the old people were not receiving care.

JUNIOR ATHLETES COMPETE TONIGHT

MILWAUKEE, July 2.—(AP)—Youngsters with their reputations still to be made will run, jump and throw for junior titles tonight in Marquette stadium where tomorrow their elders will battle for senior championships in the Amateur Athletic Union's 30th track and field meet.

Foremost among the juniors is Bob Peoples, a brawny youth just out of Oklahoma City's Classen high school, who has thrown the javelin far enough to indicate he may whip

his elders tomorrow in the senior games. Peoples has thrown the weapon 225 feet, five inches in prep school competition, a mark less than four feet short of the American record of 229 feet, 2 1/2 inches owned by Alton Terry of Texas.

The senior championships figure to produce a brilliant, thrilling show. The field of 300 athletes includes defending champions, Olympic title winners and world record holders, giving the senior division all the elements necessary for record performances, provided the weather behaves.
