

### 1936 ACCIDENTS TAKE HUGE TOLL IN LIVES, MONEY

CHICAGO, July 2. —(AP)— Accidents cost the United States a grim toll of 111,000 lives and a staggering bill of \$3,700,000,000 in 1936, the National Safety Council estimated today.

The annual summary of accident facts said such fatalities of all types exceeded by more than 10,000 the 1935 total—30,967.

It noted 10,750,000 persons were injured accidentally, one every three seconds last year; 400,000 were permanently disabled, and an accidental death occurred every five minutes.

Approximately half of the increase was ascribed to last summer's severe heat wave.

Although traffic deaths were counted by the safety council at a new high total of 87,800, fatal injuries to 38,500 were blamed upon carelessness in the home.

The safety council calculated that two billion dollars in wages were lost in 1936 by accident victims, that hospital and medical expense amounted to \$400,000,000, insurance costs were \$200,000,000, excluding claims paid; property damage in motor vehicle accidents were \$820,000,000, and fire losses \$293,000,000.

Arizona had the highest fatal accident rate—165.3 deaths per 100,000 inhabitants; Rhode Island's rate was lowest—39.8 per 100,000.

### TRAVEL PEAK SET AT CRATER LAKE

CRATER LAKE, July 2. —(Sp.)— Nearly 55,000 persons have visited Crater Lake national park so far this year, setting a new early season attendance record. The previous high mark came in 1931 and had not been equaled since.

Travel has been averaging approximately 1000 visitors a day, with over 2000 on Sundays. The majority are from out-of-state points, especially California, arriving mainly over the Klamath Falls and Medford entrance highways.

The north entrance highway, connecting with Diamond Lake and The Dalles-California highway, is now open to travel. This route brings Bend within 106 miles of Crater Lake. The rim road, around the lake for a distance of 35 miles, is still closed by snow for 15 miles on the north and northeastern sides. It will probably not be open for another week or so. The rim camp ground remains partially closed, with some camping possible. It will probably be completely open within a few days.

### ADVOCATES MORE USE OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS

DETROIT, July 2. —(AP)—Prof. Lyman Bryson of Columbia University advocated use of school buildings for any public purpose during periods when they are not in educational use, in an address to the National Education Association today.

"In the past," he told the teachers, "we have lost millions of dollars in deterioration of buildings and equipment while they stood idle."

The N. E. A. representative assembly voted 585 to 462 to abandon the practice of retaining past presidents of the association on its board of directors.

**STRAWBERRY JAM**  
4 cups (2 lbs.) prepared fruit  
7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar  
1/2 bottle Certo

To prepare fruit, grind about 2 quarts fully ripe berries or crush completely one layer at a time so that each berry is reduced to a pulp. Measure sugar and prepared fruit into large kettle, mix well, and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 3 minutes. Remove from fire and stir in Certo. Then stir and skim by turns for just 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Pour quickly. Paraffin at once. Makes about 10 glasses (6 fluid ounces each). All measurements are level.

### ANTI-LIQUOR LEADER WILL SPEAK SUNDAY AT FIRST CHRISTIAN

Howard H. Johnson, newly elected superintendent of the Anti-Liquor League of Oregon, and director of the widely heralded temperance drama, "Prisoner at the Bar," will speak at the Medford First Christian church Sunday at 11 a. m. on "Day Before Yesterday, Yesterday, Today and Day After Tomorrow."

Johnson, who recently came from Kansas where he helped lead the dry forces of that state to their 89,000 dry victory in the last election, says "Kansas has carried on a great temperance educational program all through the years, even during the days of prohibition. Temperance education is the foundation for the solution of the whole liquor problem. Before repeal the wets fostered the idea that the dry advocated and, through prohibition, substituted force for education. The temperance educational program that preceded adoption of national prohibition was virtually discarded in many states when the law went into effect, and this fact doubtless figured in the bringing about of repeal."

Johnson further stated that "the league's new objectives would include a program (1) to promote temperance education, (2) to eliminate liquor advertising, (3) to make the liquor traffic pay its damages and (4) to outlaw liquor traffic in Oregon."

### FUNDS ALLOTTED FOR PUBLIC LAND SURVEY

WASHINGTON, July 2. —(AP)—The public works administration announced today allotment of \$500,000 to the general land office of the interior department for survey and re-survey of public lands in 19 states and Alaska.

The allotment included: Oregon, \$25,000; Idaho \$30,000.

The land office said surveys and resurveys within grazing districts will facilitate land classification and administration of the Taylor grazing act while surveys within national forest areas will facilitate administration of those areas.

It was estimated 80 per cent of the money would be used to employ labor.

### WALLIS' EX-HUSBAND FREE TO WED AGAIN

SAN DIEGO, Calif., July 2. —(AP)—Commander Earl Winfield Spencer, U. S. N., first husband of the Duchess of Windsor, today was granted a final decree of divorce from his second wife, Mrs. Marjiam J. Spencer, and was free to enter into a third marriage.

Commander Spencer and Mrs. Norman Reese Johnson, wealthy Detroit widow, are to be married aboard the U. S. S. Ranger at Santa Monica July 4.

### RECKLESS DRIVER GETS FINE AND TERM IN JAIL

BAKER, July 2. —(AP)—Harland Jeffords of Baker, who was involved in a double automobile accident that resulted in the fatal injury of Mrs. Cornelia Brown Mitchell on the Baker-Haines section of the old Oregon Trail this week, was fined \$250 and sentenced to 90 days in jail this morning in justice court. His driver's license was revoked.

Jeffords pleaded guilty to a charge of reckless driving before the sentence was passed.
